# Air Force Global Strike Command reaches full operational capability

#### BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La.

- Air Force Global Strike Command was declared to be at Full Operational Capability on Sept. 30, on schedule, and less than 14 months after its initial activation as a command.

To reach that milestone, the Command accomplished more than 700 action items identified by the Secretary and Chief of Staff of the Air Force in 2009, when they chartered Global Strike Command to strengthen the nuclear enterprise by aligning all Air Force long-range nuclear-capable forces under a single command.

Lt. Gen. Frank Klotz, Global Strike commander, reported Operational Capability status in a memorandum to the Secretary and the Chief of Staff of the Air Force today.

Full Operational Capability status is the final

step in any military unit's stand-up. Air Force Global Strike Command is the first completely new major command the Air Force has activated in over 27 years.

"Our successful stand-up was possible because of the commitment, innovative spirit, and sheer hard work of Global Strike Command Airmen," said General Klotz.

"This talented team of professionals put in place all the functions of a major command while simultaneously executing those functions. This unique challenge was a lot like building an aircraft while actually flying it," he added.

Prior to activation as a major command, what was then Air Force Global Strike Command, Provisional was launched in January 2009, at Bolling AFB, Washington D.C., under the leadership of then-Brig. Gen. Jim Kowalski, now a

two-star general and the Command's vice commander. General Kowalski has been nominated by the President, and confirmed by the Senate, for a third star and to become the next AFGSC commander when General Klotz retires early next year, after more than 37 years on active duty.

The Command was formally activated at Barksdale on Aug. 7, 2009, on the premise that no mission is more important than operating, maintaining, securing and supporting the nuclear enterprise, officials said.

Since then, according to General Klotz's official memo, the Command has established and manned a fully-functional headquarters. It also assumed responsibility for all units of both 20th Air Force, headquartered at F.E. Warren AFB,

Wyo., and 8th Air Force, headquartered at Barksdale.

The Command is fully engaged in long-range planning for the nuclear deterrence and global strike mission, now having in place a strategic master plan that aligns AFGSC with the larger Air Force strategic plan.

Global Strike Command assumes full responsibility for planning, programming and financial management activities on Oct. 1, and will be lead for both sustainment and modernization of the Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missiles operated out of F.E. Warren, Minot AFB, N.D. and Malmstrom AFB, Mont.; the B-52 Stratofortress nuclearcapable bombers here and at Minot; and the B-2 Spirit nuclear-capable bombers at Whiteman AFB, Mo.; as well as UH-1N Huey helicopters.

The Command has also established an inspector general function and has already conducted at least one major inspection at each of the Command's six operational wings, the general said.

Additionally, the Command formed a Crisis Action Team, as well as a Response Task Force to deal with emergency situations and potential incidents.

Other Command missions include targeting analysis at the 625th Strategic Operations Squadron at Offutt AFB, Neb., and the ICBM test launch operations of the 576th Flight Test Squadron at Vandenberg AFB, Calif.

The Airmen's attic is here to help all Airmen. The rules stipulate those who can use the Airman's Attic have to be between the ranks of airman basic to staff sergeant, but if someone is in need, the attic is here for them.

Those interested in donating can leave items at the drop-off spot located behind the attic. To get to the Airman's Attic, follow Spirit Avenue to the first stop light and take a right on Vandenburg Avenue. The first left off Vandenburg is a road between the back of the base-exchange and the left-side of community center, turn onto it. The drop-off is at the end of the street.

# From the Frontlines: Capt. Jordan Clark

"Give a man a fish and you feed him for a day. Teach a man to fish and you feed him for a lifetime."- Chinese

This is essentially what Capt. Jordan Clark, 1-135 Attack Reconnaissance Battalion AH-64 Apache pilot did during the 11 months he volunteered to deploy to Jalalabad, Afghanistan. He returned from his deployment in September. While deployed, Captain Clark was an agricultural specialist assigned to the Missouri Agribusiness Development Team 3.

Their mission was to create stability within Afghanistan through economic opportunity. Captain Clark said since 80 percent of the Afghan economy is based on agriculture, it was the most logical target to improve.

"I was primarily the animal veterinary specialist," he said. "I helped build slaughter facilities, administer the veterinary facilities, provided training and mentored students at the veterinary university and the Nangarhar University."

The ADT taught Afghans different farming and irrigation techniques to aid them in being more efficient with their techniques, time and supplies.

"Teaching and helping the Afghans gave us a chance to look at their livestock and for them to see us in a more assisting role," said Captain Clark. "The Afghans absolutely loved it."

He said they were there to help the Afghans rebuild their economy and to win their hearts and minds. By legitimately helping people, Captain Clark's unit was able to have the Afghans who were on the fence, without a complete devotion for a specific cause to side with

"We tried work with people who are not completely dedicated to one cause or another, who are just trying to find a way of life and feed their families and get them to our side," said Captain Clark. "They're just going with what pays, so we teach them how to fend for themselves."

The advantage that helped the ADT execute so many projects was that they had the civilian educators, but also the added security that allowed them to enter places and execute tasks other organizations couldn't accomplish.

Assisting with security was a joint force of Army and Air Force personnel.

"We were unique because we had 13 Air Force security forces members with us," said Captain Clark. "The guys were



An airman first class from the 509th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron received an Article 15 for missing an appointment, failing to go to work, and underage drinking. Punishment was a reduction to the grade of airman, a suspended forfeiture of \$811 pay per months for two months, a suspended 30

days of extra duty and a reprimand.

An airman first class from the 509th Maintenance Squadron received an Article 15 for falling asleep on duty. Punishment was a suspended reduction to the grade of airman, a suspended forfeiture of \$200 pay per months for two months, actual forfeitures of \$100 pay for two months 30 days extra duty and a reprimand.

An airman first class from the 509th Logistics Readiness Squadron received an Article 15 for not showing up for work on time on multiple occasions and making a false official. Punishment was a reduction to the grade of airman, a suspended forfeiture of \$811 pay per months for two months, actual forfeitures of \$200 pay for two months, restriction to base for 30 days and a reprimand.

A senior airman from the 509th Security Forces Squadron received an Article 15 for displaying pornography on a government computer and disconnecting it from the network without permission. Punishment was a reduction to the grade of airman first class, a suspended forfeiture of \$961 pay per months for two months and a reprimand.

An airman first class from the 509th Civil Engineer Squadron received an Article 15 for driving under the influence of alcohol. Punishment was a reduction to the grade of airman, restriction to base for 30 days and a reprimand.

# Airmen can avoid fraud

Since the first day of basic training, Airmen are instilled with the three core values. Integrity First, Service Before Self and Excellence In All We Do. Integrity First is what ties the other two values together. To Airmen, this value is essential. Unfortunately, not everyone possesses it.

Recently, an Airman, stationed at this Air Force Global Strike Command base, was victimized through an online scam by a person who lacked integrity. He was looking for a car and found one he liked online.

The Airman contacted the seller via email about the car he was interested in. The seller introduced himself as a fellow Airman from another base. This introduction made the Airman feel more at ease about the business deal, falling into the seller's scheme.

After interchanging numerous e-mails, they decided to go through with the transaction. The seller told the Airman to use Google Checkout; a tool that holds payment to the seller until the buyer receives the said

When the buyer sent the money to the Google Checkout, he never received delivery notification and was never able to get in contact with the seller.

Turns out, the seller and alleged Airman was a scammer. The account he gave the buyer to send the money to, wasn't a Google Checkout account.

At this point, the Airman sought guidance

from the legal office here on what his next step should be. The legal office investigated his case and are trying to help him as best as they can, and advised the Airman to seek assistance from the FBI.

"Airmen need to be especially careful in situations like this because not everyone seems to believe in core values," said Capt. Michael Pierson, 509th Bomb Wing assistant staff judge advocate.

A good rule to remember when dealing with online transactions or purchases is if it's too good to be true, it probably is, said Capt. Kevin Normile, 509th Bomb Wing assistant staff judge advocate.

"Online scams are very common," said Captain Normile. "It's easier to make up a back story online when buyers don't know any better. That's why you have to be especially careful."

Captain Pierson recommends Airmen double check every person listed on a transaction to verify they are a credible source. He also encourages them to verify account numbers and try to use a transaction method with live customer support.

"Airmen are probably more willing than civilians to make online transactions since we're constantly on the move," said Captain Pierson. "We are more likely to make a large purchase online because it's more convenient for us."

An Airman who often makes purchases online explains how he avoids being scammed.

# Commanders "eyes and ears" provide solutions for population

Airmen 1st Class Cody Ramirez 509th Bomb Wing Public Affairs

Wing commanders have busy schedules, which can make it difficult for them to find the time to address every Airman's question or problem directly. Serving as the "eyes and ears" of the commander, Rosana Sales, 509th Bomb Wing Inspector General and Air Force Global Strike Command member, is here to assist Airmen of all ranks, family members, civilian employees and retirees and mediate issues to the commander.

Inspector Generals primarily serve their commanders and their assigned organizations by executing the complaint resolution process and by proactively training all members of the organization about IG processes and Fraud, Waste, and Abuse (FWA) issues, according to Air Force Instruction 90-301.

"I love everything about my job, but having the one-on-one access with the commander would have to be on the top of my list," Mrs. Sales said. "If I receive a complaint that requires immediate action, it's extremely beneficial to have unimpeded access.

Mrs. Sales said these IG systems were set in stone to solidify unit morale and productivity.

"I keep the commander informed on areas of concern, or matters that indicate systemic problems that could affect mission effectiveness, through waste management and execution of the Complaints Resolution Program and the Fraud, Waste and Abuse program," Mrs. Sales said.

"I'm continuously analyzing complaint data, and if the complaints reflect trends, I inform the commander of those trends, so the necessary corrective measures can be taken." she said. "The data allows commanders the opportunity to resolve underlying problems that are negatively impacting personnel. The sooner the issue is addressed, the happier the base personnel are, and that's my goal here."

Mrs. Sales compiles a thorough complaint on each issue addressed to her. The analysis is a review of assertions, evidence and validity of a complaint. Depending on the outcome, the IG has five directions to take the issue; assistance, dismissal, referral, transfer or investigation.

Assistance is made when a FWA, or violation of law, regulation or policy is found, and the complaint is dismissed when none is proven. Referrals are made when the complaint can be better addressed by a different base agency. She said investigations are conducted in every direction, but the actual investigation direction leads to the full involvement from the Air Force IG chain. Paperwork is sent up to MAJCOM and Air Force IG channels before an investigation of that scale is allowed

She said no matter which avenue is taken,

Imagine struggling to see the words in a newspaper and not having the help of a visual aid. For some, being visually impaired and severely disabled might pose as a challenge, but others will take the opportunity to work past their disabilities toward aspirations.

In 1988, Congress declared October as National Disability Employment Awareness Month.

In efforts to recognize NDEAM, the Whiteman Envision store celebrated 15 years of supplying base units with mission essential products to execute the Air Force Global Strike Command mission, while employing disable staff members.

The AbilityOne Program is the largest source of employment for people with disabilities, by providing products and services for the Federal government and Department of Defense.

"AbilityOne products available at Envision Xpress, were manufactured by blind or disabled individuals and most of our stores have two or more visually impaired employees," said Max Holden, Envision Xpress general manager.

Envision's mission is to enhance the personal independence of the individuals whose blindness, often accompanied by other disabilities, impacts their opportunities for employment success and integration into the community which is a direct reflection of what the AbilityOne program stands for.

Government customers support the employment of qualified professionals who are blind or have other severe disabilities with each purchase under the AbilityOne Program.

"The Envision store provides customers with office supplies, cleaning supplies, clothing issues, individual equipment, all while meeting the mission's needs and providing job to the visually impaired," Mr. Holden said.

Becky Coombes and Terry Thompson, both visually

impaired employees work as cashiers at the Envision store and share optimism and enjoyment about working at Envision.

"The best part of my job is working with the customers," said Mrs. Thompson. "I've been doing this job for more than 13 years and enjoy it. It's what makes me get up every day because if I had to sit at home I would probably be dwelling about my eye disease. Many people with visually impaired problems can fall by the wayside."

Mrs. Thompson has macular degeneration, an age related progressive disease of the retina wherein the light-sensing cells in the central area of vision (the macula) stop working and eventually die according to Webmd.com.

the problem will be addressed and an answer will be given. Resolving the underlying cause of a complaint may prevent more severe symptoms or costly consequences, such as reduced performance, accidents, poor quality work, poor morale or loss of resources, according to about.com.

"Every day is memorable and I'm honored to be a part of this wing and to help its people," she said.

Any Air Force military or civilian member may file an IG complaint, and any civilian without Air Force affiliation can file a FWA disclosure. For more information, or to file a complaint, call Mrs. Sales at (660) 687-1733.

How to file a complaint

Step 1: A complaint can be filed if personnel reasonably believe inappropriate conduct has occurred or a violation of law, policy, procedure, instruction or regulation has been committed.

Step 2: Complete the personnel data information on an Air Force IMT 102, Inspector General Personal and Fraud, Waste and Abuse Complaints Registration.

Step 3: Briefly outline the facts and relevant background information related to the issue or complaint on Air Force IMT 102 in chronological order.

Step 4: List the allegations of wrongdoing briefly, in general terms and provide supporting narrative detail including chronology and documents later when interviewed, allegations should be written as bullets and should answer:

- a. What violation was committed?
- **b**. What law, regulation, procedure or policy was violated?
- c. When did the violation occur?
- **d**. Who committed the violation?

"Not everyone has integrity like we'd like to believe," said Captain Pierson. "It's essential to take as many preventative measures as possible."





# Whiteman Airmen ensure aircraft safety with FOD checks

As the sun peeked over the aircraft hangers, and the morning dew dripped from the parked aircraft on the Whiteman Air Force Base flightline, Air Force Global Strike Command maintainers, and crew chiefs were found stretched across the aircraft ramp standing side-by-side with plastic bags in hand.

This was a sign of only one thing -- Foreign Object Debris walk, or better known as a FOD walk.

Crew chiefs, maintainers and other personnel working on the Whiteman flightline all take responsibility for eliminating FOD to keep the aircraft safe and the flying mission soaring.

With multiple aircraft taxing across the flightline around the clock, wear and tear on the thick concrete pad is tremendous. It often causes small pebble like chunks of the surface to break off. In the aviation world, these small rocks and pebbles are referred to as FOD and pose a very dangerous threat

FOD mishaps can potentially result in extensive aircraft damage, ultimately hindering the Air Force flying mission and costing the Air Force millions of dollars. These incidents occur when FOD is either sucked into a jet engine or protrudes through an aircrafts tires while taxing.

"FOD is and will always be a dilemma, but it is absolutely one that we keep to a minimum by performing these walks and ensuring we collect even the smallest bits of FOD," said Tech Sgt. Kenneth Prenger, 131st Bomb Wing crew chief.

Since FOD is mostly made up of small rocks and pebbles, it's hard to remove the debris with sweeper trucks, so Airmen and civilian personnel working on the flightline have to physically

"Tuesdays and Thursdays are our day's to perform FOD walks," said Airman 1st Class Nathan Siemns, 509th Maintenance Squadron crew chief. "It's easy to get complacent as we make our way across the flightline in search of debris, but we all realize how important it is that FOD is collected, so we do our best to stay focused."

With several multibillion dollar aircraft operating from the Whiteman flightline, to include twenty B-2 Stealth Bombers, Airmen must remain focused to keep the runway and parking ramps FOD free. This is accomplished by strict attention to detail

"Since the B-2 is one of the main air frames operating from Whiteman, sharp objects that may pierce a tire is one of our biggest concerns," said Airman Siemns. "Because of this, we pay close attention when making our passes during FOD walks, as a punctured tire could lead to an aircraft becoming in operational."

After Airmen perform their FOD walks, the collected debris is combined into one bag and turned into Master Sgt. Michael Kelly, FOD and dropped object monitor. At the end of each quarter, the total amount of FOD collected is weighed. According to Whiteman statistics, 363.1 lbs. of FOD was collected at the end of the May.

Things such as FOD walks, tool accountability, FOD rollover checks and simply paying attention while on the flightline will continue to keep FOD mishaps to a minimum, according to Sergeant Kelly.

"FOD prevention is everyone's responsibility," Sergeant Kelly said. "We are all one team. If anyone sees FOD, it's their job to ensure it gets picked up."

# Youth center shoots for fit children
