# Under Secretary praises Global Strike Command at symposium

**SHREVEPORT, La.** — Detailing the significant commitment of Air Force senior leaders to the nuclear mission, Under Secretary of the Air Force Erin C. Conaton told a packed convention hall here Nov. 17 that the nuclear and global strike mission is critical to the United States.

"What you do matters; it matters to the Air Force and to our nation's security," Ms. Conaton told more than 400 Air Force Global Strike Command Technology and Innovation Symposium attendees and Global Strike Challenge competitors at the Shreveport Convention Center here. "Your contributions are why we have a safe and secure nuclear enterprise, and an effective strategic deterrent."

Ms. Conaton emphasized that for the Air Force, strengthening the nuclear enterprise is a top priority.

"Your work is on the front pages of papers around the country and on the table for discussions at the highest levels of our government," she said. "What has not changed, nor will ever change, is that this mission demands a level of attention to detail and constant vigilance beyond all others in the Department of Defence."

After becoming the Air Force's under secretary, the first base Ms. Conaton visited was an Air Force Global Strike Command installation. Since then, she has toured both B-52 Stratofortress and B-2 Spirit bombers, and visited a missile launch control center. Ms. Conaton lauded the work of the Airmen associated with those missions.

"These Airmen, though not always deployed to overseas locations, spend large amounts of time away from their homes and families in order to keep us safe." she said.

Since the strength of the Air Force's nuclear enterprise lies within the hands of Airmen to maintain a safe, secure and effective nuclear deterrent, a

lot is expected of them, she said.

"And we can be proud that we've taken some significant steps over the past few years to ensure we remain a credible strategic force both at home and abroad," Ms. Conaton said.

As one example, the under secretary commended Air Force Global Strike Command for reaching full operational capability Sept. 30, on schedule and less than 14 months after the command's official activation.

Ms. Conaton pointed out that Air Force Global Strike Command's firstever Global Strike Challenge is "a continuation of a long history of vigorous competition between Air Force nuclear professionals that serves to improve our readiness. I know that the fierce competition brought out the best in you."

The under secretary concluded her remarks with the following words for the Airmen of Air Force Global Strike Command:

"We're celebrating the first year of Global Strike Command, but our nuclear mission has a rich heritage. For more than 60 years in a variety of command structures, our Airmen have done an incredible job of remaining vigilant and prepared to respond, in order to deter the threat of nuclear attack.

"It was brave Airmen like you--missileers and bomber crews--who helped to defuse the Cuban Missile Crisis, won the Cold War, and even now stand watch to deter aggression from around the globe.

"Because we live in a world where nuclear weapons exist, and we face enemies that seek to do us grave harm, our missileers stand constant alert. Our bombers remain prepared to generate. Our nuclear security forces continually patrol. And our maintainers and force support personnel ensure our weapons systems and operators are always at the ready.

"They do all this while focusing on excellence, adhering to the highest standards, and executing the precise day-to-day operations required of those responsible for our nuclear weapons systems. It is an amazing thing you do, and you serve a grateful nation."

# Real wingmen act: Prevent sexual assault

LAJES FIELD, Azores (AFNS) — Preventing sexual assault requires a culture change at the grassroots level. Applying President Harry S. Truman's "the buck stops here" motto teaches wingmen to avoid passing responsibility for action to others when witnessing sexual harassment or a situation that may lead to sexual assault.

Leaders, by nature of their actions or inaction, define Air Force culture and establish precedent. Secretary of the Air Force Michael Donley opened up the Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Leader Summit held in Crystal City, Va., Nov. 4. His message to wing leaders made clear that "there is no tolerance for sexual assault in our Air Force," and that "leaders at all levels must be engaged."

The research of Dr. Dorothy Edwards', the Green Dot, Inc. executive director, revealed the three most notable reasons why bystanders do not intervene. They are diffusion of responsibility, evaluation apprehension and modeling.

The "passing the buck" example above exemplifies diffusion of responsibility. In this case, responsibility for action is transferred to someone else who may or may not act. Evaluation apprehension refers to the notion of the fear of being embarrassed.

And lastly, modeling is where Airmen set the example and define culture either through their action or inaction. In order to prevent sexual assault, Airmen must overcome these three causes of nonintervention

Leaders must also carve out time to talk to Airmen about their responsibility to intervene. This is another venue where wingmen must act and live up to the Airman's Creed. One of the key themes of the Air Force Sexual Assault Prevention and Response program is that sexual assault is a perpetrator's issue as opposed to a victim's issue.

Too often, institutions focus on the victim and what the victim did or did not do. Attention must be centered on the perpetrator, because according to Dr. David Lasik, a clinical psychologist from the University of Massachusetts, more than 90 percent of all rapes are committed by serial offenders.

This alarming statistic is minimized when the focus is shifted to the victim versus the serial rapist.

Doctor Lasik also outlined the typical sequence of a sexual attack. Perpetrators normally plan their attacks in advance. The first step rapists employ is to identify a vulnerability, such as intoxication, instability and/or being alone. The second step is their attempt to increase vulnerability by, for example, increasing the victim's level of intoxication.

Lastly, the perpetrator seeks to isolate the victim. This can be done by driving the victim home or taking the victim to an unpopulated location.

Faced with these types of situations, wingmen must intervene and proactively prevent this crime from happening.

Having the courage to act prevents that "corrosive thread which shoots through the fabric that is the Air Force as an institution," according to Anne Munch, an American Prosecutors Research Institute faculty member.

During the 2010 Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Leader Summit, Secretary Donley also impressed upon the participants that Airmen should "keep faith with their fellow Airmen."

Real wingmen are not bystanders who diffuse their responsibilities. Real wingmen act!

"We inventoried trucks, supplies, moved sandbags and reorganized trailers," he said. "It was a lot of busy work."


In between convoys, Airman Kohl used his time to prepare for the next mission and relaxation when able.

# **History of Global Strike Challenge Awards**

**Fairchild Trophy** - Awarded since 1951, the Fairchild Trophy is awarded to the best bombardment wing. The trophy is named for General Muir S. Fairchild, former AF Vice Chief of Staff

**The Tibbets Trophy** - The Tibbets Trophy is awarded to the best B-2 squadron. This is the first year for the prestigous award. The Tibbets Trophy is named for the 509th Composite Group's first commander, Col. Paul W. Tibbets.

**Charlie Fire Team Trophy** - This award is presented to the best security forces team. The Charlie Fire Team trophy is dedicated to all security police and security forces members who have given their lives in support of the Air Force's nuclear mission. It bears mention that in past Giant Sword competitions, winning security and weapons load teams shared the Barrentine Trophy which was retired to the Enlisted Heritage Institute at Gunter Air Force Base, Ala., in 1994. The year 2010 marks the marks the first time in AFGSC and Strategic Air Command history that a seperate legacy trophy is awarded to security forces.


