Mobility Airmen take C-5M on first direct Arctic overflight to Afghanistan

BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan (AFNS) -- Fourteen mobility Airmen teamed together to fly a C-5M Super Galaxy on a direct, non-stop mission from Dover Air Force Base, Del., here June 5 and

The flight was the first time a U.S. Air Force plane flew this northern route from the U.S., over Canada and into the Arctic Circle, then back down through Russian and Kazakhstan airspace to Afghanistan.

"Everyone involved with this mission worked very hard to make it happen," said Lt. Col. Thomas Loper, the pilot and aircraft commander for the mission. "We're also very proud to be a part of the historic

Whiteman undergoes firsttime compliance checks

The room was filled with 25 men wearing polo shirts and khaki pants, high and tight haircuts and stern faces. Small creases formed as they pulled their eyebrows together, in thought at various points during the training.

The police officers from Whiteman and the surrounding communities meant business while they trained on compliance investigations at this Air Force Global Strike Command base June 9.

Compliance investigations check to see if alcohol sellers are effectively preventing alcohol sales to people under the age of 21.

"Compliance check investigations are a costeffective way to control youth's access to alcohol from retail outlets," said Lt. Mike Pryor, Tucson, Arizona, Police Department consultant and training instructor. "They involve the use of underage buyers by law enforcement agencies as 'volunteers' to test retailers."

June 9 was the first time in Air Force history that compliance checks have been able to be performed on base, said Lieutenant Pryor.

There are three ways youth obtain alcohol, according to Lieutenant Pryor. They can steal it, have it given to or purchased for them by an adult, or by purchasing it themselves with the help of retailers or the use of a fake ID.

'Our ultimate goal for this training and exercise is to promote responsible adult behavior," he said. "If retailers are responsible, we can limit the ways in which youth obtain alcohol."

Once the compliance training for the officers was complete, a group of underage volunteers were selected to begin the exercise investigation. If any retailers on base sold them an alcoholic beverage, the 509th Security Forces Squadron wouldn't take legal action, but instead left it up to the establishment managers to provide corrective action.

The first step in the investigation was to age-verify the volunteers to ensure that the operation was conducted fairly, with all underage participants.

'Retailers may suggest that the volunteer looked older than 21 and that's why their employee didn't ask for identification," Lieutenant

Every Airmen plays a role in the mission

The 509th Bomb Wing and the B-2 Spirit have never had a problem with putting bombs on target in combat. I have been fortunate enough to be part of our war fighting team during the "Shock and Awe" campaign for Operation Iraq Freedom in March 2003 and during our most recent efforts for Operation Odyssey Dawn in March 2011. There are a lot of moving parts and processes that take place in order to put bombs on target, but without our Airmen it would never happen. So what is your role?

Every Airman can claim a piece of the puzzle that leads to bombs on target. For some, the piece of the puzzle fits easily into place. In the Munitions Squadron the pieces are easily defined, our ammo technicians assemble the bombs and our armament technicians maintain the aircraft release equipment that the bombs attach to and release from.

For others, their piece of the puzzle is not so easily defined and it may take time to see where it fits into place. The point I'm trying to drive home is: every Airmen has a role and a piece of the puzzle to mission accomplishment.

I would like to share a story on how an Airman in the Operations Group, not directly involved with bomb building operations, had a major impact with putting bombs on target. Earlier this year the 509th BW was

tasked to support an exercise that involved dropping penetrator bombs for testing. During the test, several of the bombs did not explode. Although they were on target, the desired effect was not obtained.

The Airman investigated why the bombs did not detonate on impact and discovered there was an issue involving the kevlar extension lanyards that allow the

bomb to arm and detonate. He was fairly sure what was wrong. However, since he is not an expert in building bombs, he voiced his concerns. Initially his concerns were not heard because he was outside of his lane and he was not considered an expert – this was not his piece of the puzzle.

Fortunately for the Air Force and the mis-

sion, he was persistent and eventually heard. Subsequent investigation by the experts determined the lanyards had been installed backwards, which did not allow the bombs to arm and detonate as designed.

The follow-up led to a technical order change on the procedures for assembling the penetrator bombs, proper training for our Airmen, and additional quality control checks were instituted into the bomb assembly process. This piece of the puzzle will help ensure our penetrator bombs will detonate when they are put on target for combat operations.

How can you make a dif-

ference? Communicate...ask the right questions, listen and think outside of the box. Each and every day we should all challenge subordinates, supervisors, peers, and most importantly, ourselves to strive for excellence in all we do. Look at all the pieces of the puzzle. All of us can make a difference in putting bombs on target!

Does win-win really exist?

"Don't find fault. Find a remedy." -- Henry Ford

Has a situation of this nature occurred to you or someone you know? A disagreement between two individuals becomes a heated discussion. The dispute might be with a co-worker, a supervisor, a customer or with a neighbor. Each person cites the flaws of the other individual. This bitterness continues to fester without any resolution. Depending upon the scenario, individuals start to recruit volunteers to justify their mistreatment; or hearsay becomes the preferred weapon. The conflict is now an impasse.

The Air Force views this as having a "workplace dispute." A dispute is either a formal or informal divisive claim or issue that arises out of an existing or probable employment relationship between the employees, applicants for employment, or military members, for which a remedial process is authorized by law, regulation, or policy.

Alternative Dispute Resolution is the preferred method used to diffuse conflict in the workplace. ADR is strictly voluntary. The discussion is facilitated by a neutral third party whose sole purpose is to ensure a productive dialogue. ADR techniques include mediation, facilitation, and other collaborative problem solving techniques. These methods along with other early collaborative dispute resolution processes have been shown to be highly effective in settling conflicts while conserving resources.

Statistics from the General Counsel of the Air Force reflects since 2007, over one-third of Air Force workplace disputes have used ADR, and nearly three-quarters of those disputes were resolved. In fiscal year 2009, more than 91 percent of the parties were satisfied with the process. These statistics include feedback from members in the Whiteman AFB community.

Behavior inconsistent with Air Force policy that normally results in Uniform Code of Military Justice violations and/or criminal behavior should not be mediated. Examples include fraud, waste, abuse, physical or sexual assault, security violations, and alcohol/drug abuse.

If you are experiencing a work related concern, ask yourself one of the following questions. One - "Do I wish to continue working or living with conflict or communication problems impacting the mission, productivity or helping others?" Two - "What is the worst case situation that could happen if I allow these predicaments to continue between this other individual and myself?"

Officials release new selective re-enlistment bonus list

FORCE BASE, Texas
(AFNS) -- Enlisted members
now have 77 Air Force specialties from which they can
receive a selective re-enlistment bonus.

Officials said this fiscal year's program retains a heavy emphasis on retaining Airmen with 17 months to six years of service, and made adjustments in the 6 to 10 and 10 to 14 years-of-service zones. There were no adjustments in the 18 to 20 years-of-service zone.

"Balancing the enlisted force is a constant challenge; using SRBs is certainly one of the most effective retention tools the Air Force can employ to retain our number one priority ... our Airmen," said Michael McLaughlin, the chief of Air Force re-enlistments at the Air Force Personnel Center.

Officials added no Air Force specialty codes to the list and increased 13 AFSCs in at least one zone. Thirty-six AFSCs had a zone eliminated or decreased and 13 AFSCs SELECTIVE RE-ENLISTMENT BONUS

All increases and additions went into effect May 16 and all decreases and deletions went into effect June 15. Any re-enlistments or extensions of any length were completed prior to the official message

release will remain valid. These bonuses do not apply to Air Force Reserve or Air National Guard members.

To determine eligibility for re-enlistment with an SRB entitlement, members should contact the career development element at their local military personnel section.



Do you remember when you were in high school, nothing was kept a secret and everyone found out by lunch time? The Air Force has a system that does just that but in a lot less time.

The single-channel, anti-jam, man-portable terminal is a quick way to up- and down-channel reports at this Air Force Global Strike Command base, just as high school students tell each other what event happened last weekend.

The SCAMP terminal uses the military strategic and tactical relay and other satellite systems to provide four full duplex user channels of worldwide secure, survivable, covert voice and data and imagery communication.

"The SCAMP terminal is one of the two survival nuclear command, control and communication systems that serve as a command and control function for this Wing," said Master Sgt. Jennifer Lyons, 509th BW command post, NCO in charge of command and control operations. "Not only day-to-day here at Whiteman, but at deployed locations."

The primary mission of SCAMP is to provide survivable extended-range communications to Corps and Division tactical units for command and control.

"It is the communication squadron's main objective to provide maintenance and set up the terminal for the command post's personnel to secure the computer and receive the messages that come from the network," said Senior Airman Allen Idol, 509th CS radio frequency

transmission systems technician.

"Using the terminal is one of the primary ways to receive the emergency action messages to support U.S. Strategic Command taskings and war orders," said Airman 1st Class Joseph Lee, 509th CS radio frequency transmission systems technician.

The terminal will automatically acquire the satellite and then establish, maintain and control communication links. SCAMP consists of only three major functional components: the receiver/transmitter, a hand-held control device and the interface unit.

The receiver/transmitter, with its built-in collapsible reflector, contains all the signal processing, waveform generation/detection, terminal control and signaling conditioning hardware, according to Airman Idol.

"The SCAMP is controlled from a small hand-held keyboard device," Airman Idol said. "In its most simplistic application, the operator merely selects connectivity parameters from a menu of mission presets that were previously programmed."

The SCAMP terminal was intended to be set up or torn down in 15 minutes 90 percent of the time. The terminal is required to transmit and receive voice and data messages legibly with a 90 percent call completion rate on a first attempt basis in a wartime mode of operations.

SCAMP draws on the unique capabilities of the MILSTAR system and enables our forces to maintain information superiority during conflict and enhance full-dimensional protection by using anti-jam and low-probability of intercept technologies.

Sexual Assault Victim Advocates: The truth behind the name

(Editor's note: Due to the sensitivity of this topic, the woman in this article asked to remain anonymous.)

In 1986, at the young age of 15, her world was turned upside down by a heinous crime which took not only her innocence but also her peace of mind.

"One night, I was driving in a car with my boyfriend," she recalls. "We went to a park and started to make out. Before I knew it he was forcing my clothes off while I tried to stop him. I continued trying to push him off and yelled, 'NO. STOP', but his force overpowered mine. He continued to ignore my pleading and after he was finished, he drove me home and that was the last time I saw him."

At the time, she did not know she had been a victim of a date rape, but as shame, fear and confusion overcame her, she knew she had been part of something dreadful.

"Fear was my main emotion," she said. "I feared that if I told my mom I would get in trouble. And even worse, I feared being pregnant."

During this time, she felt more alone than ever and didn't know what to do or who to talk to. She opted to bottle up her feelings in hopes that they would disappear but they never did.

"I didn't feel like myself for a long time after that," she said. "I felt like anyone who saw me could tell what had happened to me and judge me. I felt responsible for

The memory alone still brings tears to her eyes, but she doesn't let it cripple her. She found light in the midst of havoc as time went by. She then became a victim advocate at this Air Force Global Strike Command base three

She understands the importance of having someone there to provide a shoulder to cry on, since she didn't have someone there when she needed. She became the shoulder she wished she would have had to diminish the suffering that victims face.

When a victim is being questioned or examined, she is there to hold their hand and offer support.

The victims she helps can see that she is now a happy, strong, successful woman even after going through a similar situation, which gives them hope.

"I want to do anything I can to help victims feel better," she said. "I will be there for them when they need me."

Her reason for volunteering as a victim advocate was not to receive an enlisted performance report bullet or to boost an award package, she said. She did it because she wants to help people deal with the pain associated with

"Being a victim advocate is not a glamorous job," she said. "We wish we were not needed, but that's not the case. Sexual assault happens and there needs to be somewhere or someone people can go for help."

In 2005 the Department of Defense established the

Sexual Assault Response and Prevention program after realizing there was not a consistent confidential way to assist and provide advocacy to victims of sexual violence, according to Ann Beem, 509th Bomb Wing Sexual Assault Coordinator.

"When reporting to the SARP program, the victim will have the option to do a restricted or unrestricted report," Ms. Beem said. "Under both reporting options the victim will receive the medical and psychological care they need. Under the restricted report an investigation will not take place and the report will be confidential between the SARC and the victim and the individual will be offered to be assigned a victim advocate.

Since 2005 when restricted reporting was instituted, the DoD has had a significant increase of people reporting their assaults in order to get help, according to Ms. Beem.

'Given that sexual assault is one of the most under reported crimes, with 60 percent still being left unreported, the impact to the people and the mission of the Air Force is huge," Ms. Beem said. "For each person who is victimized, there are many other lives affected by their trauma: spouses, children, family members and coworkers."

"I think that if a military member was assaulted the mission would suffer greatly because that person would be withdrawn and unable to focus on their job," the victim said. "They would probably just not be the same, maybe even scared to be alone with someone of the opposite sex when there was no problem before.

"We are not counselors, but we can be there to help provide strength when you have none," she said.

Victim advocates will keep cases confidential and will not discuss the assault to anyone. Those with questions, concerns or who need help regarding sexual assault, call (660) 687-7272.

The open road can lead us to many places, but it's not every day we are faced with challenging conditions with every turn of the key. Currently facing this issue is Airman 1st Class Corle Ryle, 509th Logistics Readiness Squadron, who is deployed from this Air Force Global Strike Command base.

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. -- Four squadrons stepped into the boots of Barksdale's bravest to compete in the third annual 2nd Mission Support Group Fire Muster outside Barksdale's Airman Leadership School June 10.

The 2nd Force Support Squadron, 2nd Contracting Squadron, 2nd Communications Squadron and 2nd Civil Engineering Squadron squared off in a competition of firefighting skills.

"The competitive environment gave the Barksdale Fire Department an opportunity to give hands-on experience to Air Force members who may never have the chance to see some of the training and skills required to be a firefighter," said Staff Sgt. Steven O'Brien, 2 CES fire crew chief.

"The event is also a morale booster," Sergeant O'Brien continued. "Anytime the opportunity to intermingle with the base community is presented, it's a positive experience. The Fire Department demonstrates some of the practices used in their day-to-day operations, and the community gains a better understanding of the skills needed to be a firefighter."

The muster was made up of five competitive events that provided the participants a variety of challenges.

Teams competed in search and rescue, an exercise in which firefighters in full gear move through a smoke-filled house to retrieve a 175-pound dummy. In the hose connection relay event, teams unraveled, connected and used a hose to knock over a traffic cone as quickly as possible. For the midnight alarm event, teams simulated receiving an alarm while sleeping. They had to get out of bed and get their gear on as quickly as possible. The self-aid buddy care event required team members to strap a dummy to a litter and navigate several obstacles to reach safety. The final event was the hose joust, which is described as a 'reverse tug-of-war.' Two teams with a hose try to push a suspended target toward the other team.

All the teams had their individual triumphs, but in the

end, the 2 CONS emerged victorious.

"Instead saying we participated, I would say we conquered, because 2 CONS came out on top," said Senior Airmen Jennifer Coffin, a contracting specialist.

Airman 1st Class Daniel Speed, 2 CONS contracting specialist, felt the event was a productive distraction from everyday tasks.

"It was good to get everyone out here, have a good time and take a break from the mission for a second, so we can be refreshed going back into it," he said.

While the muster only touched on a small number of the skills necessary to be a firefighter, it simulated actual events and conditions, which created a real-world feeling and experience for those from other squadrons.

Iraqi airmen learn to protect leaders

NEW AL MUTHANA AIR BASE, Iraq (AFNS) -- Prompted by assassinations of Iraqi military leaders, Iraqi airmen are receiving personal security operations training from members of the U.S. Air Force Office of Special Investigations here.

According to the April 2011 Special Inspector General for Iraq Reconstruction quarterly report, between January 18 and April 15, there were more than 30 assassination attempts on Iraqi officials, more than 20 of them resulting in the official's death. In order to curb this trend, Iraqi air force officials sought out experts in the field of personal security and turned to OSI for advice.

Special Agent Masashi Yamazaki, an OSI personal security adviser, led the PSO training, which was facilitated by the 447th Expeditionary Security Forces Squadron's Iraqi trainers. Eight Iraqi students were chosen for the special course in addition to more than three months of recent training with the 447th ESFS.

"I'm hoping to share basic knowledge for PSO so they can come up with their own personal security program," he said.

Agent Yamazaki drew on his past training and personal experience with OSI, which is the executive office that provides protective services to Air Force

senior leaders.

"We're trying to build up assets as opposed to just learning skills," said 1st Lt. Jacob Stephenson, assigned to the 447th ESFS.

previous training they had with the 447th ESFS, but also explores how the Air Force protects its own leaders.

The training covered a wide range of topics, such as an individual protecting The assets taught not only drew on a distinguished visitor to a whole squad providing vehicular security for transportation.

"I want them to adapt it, change it, revise it and then make it fit to accommodate their needs," Agent Yamazaki said.

Since they graduated the course June 8, it is now up to Iraqi air force officials to develop their own security program and start protecting their leaders, Lieutenant Stephenson said. That leaves a huge responsibility for the Iraqi security forces, one that Lieutenant Stephenson believes they are more than capable of handling.

"This group that we've worked with for the last three months, they are ready to go," he said.

The Iraqi security forces members will provide security for Iraqi air force leaders, providing stability by protecting their lives and ideals.

"That stability may make the (Iraqi air force) stronger and be able to self sustain rather than rely on other nations," Agent Yamazaki said.

The 447th Expeditionary Security Forces Squadron is a subordinate unit of the 321st Air Expeditionary Wing, which is the wing responsible for the Iraq Training Advisory Mission-Air. Members of ITAM-Air train, advise and assist the Iraqi air force to develop as a professional and credible regional airpower partner, with the ability to maintain internal security and defend against external threats.

sustainment operations in Afghanistan.

"Our mission is to provide the right effects, to the right place, at the right time through global reach," said Gen. Raymond E. Johns Jr., AMC commander. "This historic proof-of-concept flight is the embodiment of that mission. It provides a valuable new option that allows us to be effective to those we serve."

AMC's 618 Tanker Airlift Control Center planners at Scott AFB tasked and built the mission plans for the effort. It's part of TACC's continuing effort to support and control airlift and air refueling missions around the globe.

"This mission validates all the hard work TACC planners do every day," said Lt. Col. Matthew Ahern, a C-5 pilot with Dover AFB's 9th Airlift Squadron. Colonel Ahern was also a member of the aircrew for the mission.

AMC officials said the flight was a culmination of months of diplomatic efforts and operational planning, and further illustrates the military's commitment to finding innovative new ways to operate with increasingly constrained resources.

Maj. John Rozsnyai, a planner in US-TRANSCOM operations at Scott AFB, said his command worked with the U.S. State Department, regional combatant commands, AMC, TACC and numerous other agencies to get this historic mission under way.

"This partnership was especially important in coordinating transit agreements with Russia and Kazakhstan," Major Rozsnyai said, "While civilian airlines have been using the airspace, this was the first time an AMC plane took this direct delivery route."

To make the entire 15-plus hour flight to Afghanistan, the C-5M was refueled by a KC-135R Stratotanker from the New Hampshire Air National Guard 157th Air Refueling Wing at Pease Air National Guard Base. The refueling took place over northern Canada.

'It's cool to be a part of a mission like this," said Master Sgt. Sam Blackwell, an in-flight refueling craftsman from the 157th ARW, who refueled the C-5M to full capac-

USTRANSCOM planners said this flight is just the beginning of understanding new ways to strengthen the northern corridor.

'There will most likely be other flights that will originate from the western U.S. and won't require the use of tankers," Major Rozsnyai said.

"This route used by the C-5M may also be useful for swap-outs of deployed tankers and crews and for redeploying troops. The benefit might also allow for quicker trips saving days at home for deploying Airmen as well as requiring less stops for aircraft."

The aircrew for the mission combined active-duty and Reserve Airmen.

Site FT-02 was a former fire protection training area that consisted of two burn pits, storage tanks, and unlined ponds used for fire training. Records indicated that Site LF-12 was operated as a landfill for disposal of routine Base refuse for less than 1 year. However, no evidence of landfilling was observed during investigations. Site SS-44 was identified when trichloroethene was detected in soil and groundwater samples collected near the old runway/taxiway.

Proposed Remedy: USAF, in coordination with Missouri Department of Natural Resources, recommends no further action for these sites. Evaluation of Sites FT-02, LF-12, and SS-44 indicates that there is no risk posed by residual contamination based on site conditions. The Proposed Plan describes the background and rationale for the remedy recommendation as a result of a series of environmental studies and risk as-

Pryor said. "The purpose of the investigation is not to trick employees."

The volunteers were taken to crowded base locations where they asked 10 random people how old they thought each volunteer looked. If the age-range of a volunteer was lower than 21, the volunteer was used for stage two of the investigation.

Once the younger-looking volunteers were selected, they were told they would go into one of the base facilities and try to purchase an alcoholic beverage. They were allowed to carry one form of identification stating their real birth date and if the clerk asked their age, they were not allowed to lie.

One volunteer was told he looked 17 years-old average, making him an ideal candidate for the testing operation. When he entered the base retail outlet, he headed toward the aisle with beer, grabbed a six-pack and proceeded to check-out.

The clerk asked for his ID and looked at it, but after giving it back to the minor, she continued with the transaction.

The minor then told the clerk he had left his wallet in his car and left, to avoid having to actually buy the product. Meanwhile, several officers were observing the operation.

The manager pulled the clerk aside and told her of the mistake she had made and the how serious it was. Following the incident, an

officer informed the manager of the situation.

This was not the only incident where a clerk failed to verify the age of the purchaser.

"Although this is not an ideal situation, knowing is half the battle," said Lieutenant Pryor. "Now we know we need to conduct training on 100 percent ID check procedures at base facilities."

Checks will be held on an ongoing basis to ensure compliance, identify training needs and promote responsible sale of alcohol.

"Compliance checks send a message to our community that law enforcement cares about responsible and lawful sales of alcohol," he said. "Publicizing the results of the investigation raises community awareness and helps to change or reinforce community norms about underage drinking."

By assessing the level of underage availability in the community, military supervisors can lower the number of Article 15s. This also lowers the amount of personnel removed from mission critical positions until criminal or alcohol issues are resolved, according to Lieutenant Pryor.

This project was supported by funding made available through a Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act Grant Program administered by the U.S. Department of Justice and the Missouri Department of Public Safety.


