WAFB personnel lend a hand in tornado cleanup at Elm Hills Trailer Park

SEDALIA, Mo. - The owners of Elm Hills Trailer Park got some much needed help cleaning up debris from the May 25 tornado Saturday courtesy of about 70 Whiteman Air Force Base personnel.

The park, located just east of U.S. 65 Highway, saw about half of the 46 trailers located at the park destroyed by the May storm. The park's owners, Ken and Pat Miller, have had a difficult time with cleanup after the majority of trailer owners who leased space there left the tangled mass of shingles, aluminum siding, and splintered lumber behind after they received payments from insurance companies and the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

"We have a few people who have worked with us to clean up their mess, but for the most part we got left pretty much holding the bag," said Pat Saturday as WAFB Airmen and family members from the 509th Security Forces Squadron and other units filled two large commercial trash containers with about six tons of debris.

Pat expressed frustration with former renters, eaving "they act like it just isn't their problem"

saying, "they act like it just isn't their problem."
"I am glad the help was there for people who

needed it, but it didn't seem to teach them very much about being responsible," Pat said.

Some eight weeks after the EF-2 tornado tore through a portion of south Sedalia, much of Elm Hills still looks the way it did directly after the storm hit, with the twisted husks of trailers still sitting where the storm deposited them, and large sheets of siding wrapped around the branches of trees not uprooted or snapped in half by the storm.

The Millers, who are both in their 70s, spend the better part of each day trying to deal with the numerous piles of debris. Pat said they don't have a clear estimate yet of how much cleanup at the park will cost, and noted that the loss of income from lost tenants and debris-covered sites is their real concern.

"It could be 10 years before we really recover what we have lost and are losing every day in income. When you get used to having a certain amount of money coming in, it is hard to adjust when that gets cut in half," Pat said.

The Whiteman personnel were organized by Dianne Simon, chairwoman of the Sedalia Area Chamber of Commerce Military Affairs Committee. Simon said she had expected about a couple dozen

Whiteman housing battles

Now that summer is fully upon us, so is the grass. The base housing area represents approximately 12 percent of Whiteman's total acreage and that's a lot of grass that housing occupants are collectively responsible for mowing and maintaining.

The efforts by everyone to maintain the landscaping are appreciated during this extremely hot summer. However, there are important policies and standards that every base housing occupant needs to be aware of with respect to grounds care.

Housing occupants are responsible for:

- ☐ Maintaining and mowing 100 feet from your home or reasonable natural boundary.
- ☐ Mowing as necessary to maintain a neat appearance; not to exceed 3.5 inches.
- ☐ Edge sidewalks, curbs, driveways, etc.
- ☐ Removing grass from cracks, driveways, curbs and doorsteps.
- ☐ Trimming grass around foundations, fences, timbers and decorative lawn items.

In order to allow occupants to plan ahead; the Whiteman Housing Office has set weekly yard inspection dates for the following neighborhoods:

- ☐ Tuesdays Woodview
- $\hfill \square$ Wednesdays Midland and Lakeside

☐ Thursdays - Ridgeview and Bear Lake Yards that are not in compliance with the previously listed standards will be issued tickets. The first deviation from the standard will result in a hint. The second and third deviations will result in notices with a copy sent to member's squadron. The fourth deviation will be escalated to the 509th Mission Support Group commander.

The common areas within housing are maintained by the housing maintenance contractor. These areas are maintained to the standard of four to six inches and have been pre-identified and negotiated through contracting process. (See page 10 or Whiteman Base Housing for maps of the common areas).

There are a many tips that can help each occupant transform their yards from "ok" to "excellent".

- ☐ Water grass as needed to ensure it receives a minimum of one inch of water per week from either rain or applied water. Early morning and evenings are the best times for watering; mid day and overnight watering are not recommended.
- ☐ Mowing should not be done when yard is wet due to potential of rutting and soil compaction. Set mower to height of three inches (especially during hot, dry summer) to help conserve soil moisture, prevent weeds from germinating and put less stress on the grass.

Mowing the lawn too short or mowing too much during a single cut may cause damage and makes the lawn more susceptible to drying out during the hot summer months. Edge around house foundation and fence and remove weeds from flower beds.

Team Whiteman,

Things are starting to heat up on base, and I don't just mean the temperatures outside – last week our operations squadrons took off to fly their portion of this year's Global Strike Challenge, a multispectrum competition between the wings under Global Strike Command and the two remaining bomber bases in Air Combat Command. Last year, during the first Global Strike Challenge, the 509th and 131st Bomb Wings took home the Fairchild Trophy for best bomb wing.

As this paper goes to press our maintenance professionals are starting their portion of the competition. Everything from checklists to toolboxes, crew chiefs to bomb builders, are being inspected and graded to determine if we'll get to keep the trophy for another year. I have seen our maintainers at work, flown in the jets they fix, and



dropped the bombs they prepare, so I have no doubt that they will perform exceptionally well today.

In a few months the final part of the competition will challenge our Defenders, the men and women of the 509th Security Forces Squadron. These Airmen have been through

some tough tests and inspections over the past year, and I look forward to seeing their pride and professionalism on display when they compete.

Competitions like Global Strike Challenge help us hone our warrior spirit and keep it sharp until our nation's leaders call for us to act. This past March, we had almost no notice before being asked to fly combat missions over Libya as part of a UN-sanctioned no-fly zone. At any time we could be tasked with carrying out our nuclear mission. Simply put, our unique mission doesn't give us the luxury of slowly preparing for an operation – we must always be ready. This applies to every Airman in the wing, regardless of whether they have a personal role in Global Strike Challenge.

For those interested, the Fairchild Trophy is in a glass case just inside the entrance of the Wing headquarters building. I know we have the talent and expertise to keep it there for another year.

Finally, congratulations to our newest staff sergeant selectees. Making the transition from Airman to non-commissioned officer is one of the biggest steps in an enlisted career, and means taking on new authority and responsibility. Frequently asked...

Two frequently asked questions I get are, "Do you ever tire from hearing people complain and what is the most common complaint?"

My response to the first question is "Absolutely not!" I thoroughly enjoy having the opportunity and ability to assist. Of course I don't enjoy that people are in distress, but what I do enjoy is having the opportunity to lighten their load when they have or feel they have been wronged. Obviously not every complainant gets the results they are seeking, but more often than not, they leave knowing they were heard and their issue was fully addressed.

My response to the second question is there are no 'common' complaints; however, failure to communicate or lack of communication appears to be pervasive in the majority of complaints. The comments most commonly stated are, 'supervisors just don't want to be the bad guys,' or 'supervisors don't want to take the time or would rather avoid possible negative reaction.' There could be many reasons for the breakdown of communication--but the key is to not let it build and result in bad performance ratings or complaints that could have been prevented had communication taken place from the onset.

A supervisor once told me of an experience they had: their subordinate who was mature and well educated lacked motivation and did not appear to be performing to their potential. Months after the initial feedback and adequate period of supervision, the mid-term feedback was given. The supervisor tactfully and professionally informed the subordinate of areas that needed improvement and offered recommendations. The otherwise passive employee erupted; took extreme offense to the feedback and subsequently shut down after the exchange. The supervisor said the feedback session 'backfired,' not only did the feedback take an adversarial turn; it affected their working relationship from that point on. The supervisor never gave feedback again. I realize this is extreme, but sometimes one bad experience can have longlasting negative effects.

During my education and training opportunities I stress the importance of exercising good communication skills and the absolute need to respond to those who seek us out for assistance.

I close with these two points: We can all benefit from improving communication and it's a privilege for me to be in a position of service to military and civilian personnel who believe they have been ignored or wronged or have been given a "can't do anything for you...NEXT" response - a position where I can effect change.

people to turn out for the day's cleanup, and both she and the Millers said they were "overwhelmed" by the nearly 70 people who ended up at the park on Saturday.

The group met at about 8 a.m. for what was expected to be a full day's work, but the sizable crew filled both available trash containers in about an hour

Pat said commercial-sized trash containers are still in short supply as cleanup and recovery efforts continue in residential and business

areas affected by the storm — yet another frustration that hampers their attempts to deal with debris.

Lt. Col. Ken O'Neil, 509th Security Forces commander, which is partnered with the city of Sedalia, said base personnel were glad to lend a hand to their adopted community.

'Sedalia is our squadron's sister city," said Colonel O'Neil. "It is part of our mission to be good stewards of our neighboring communities and we try to encourage our personnel to

embrace our motto of 'Service before self,'

"We have a lot of great young Americans who were more than willing to step up and help the people of Sedalia."

The group plans to return for a second day of work at Elm Hills in about three weeks.

We are overwhelmed by all of your help and we want to thank all of you from the bottom of our hearts for what you did today," Pat told base personnel as the day's work wrapped up a little after 9 a.m.







Whiteman is currently projected to privatize our Military Family Housing late fall/ early winter. With privatization will come some nice perks and mowing relief; a comprehensive yard service will be provided to include mowing, edging and removal of debris in all common areas, front yards, and non-fenced backyards (within first three years of privatization, fences will be installed at all units that do not have fences at time of closing). The private owner will also prune shrubs and maintain tree canopies at safe height. Residents will only be responsible for mowing lawns inside the fenced areas and maintaining landscaping that they install themselves.


