Nationwide Emergency Alert System Test

On Nov. 9, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, Department of Homeland Security and Federal Communication Commission will conduct the first national test of the Nationwide Emergency Alert System test. This nationwide test will kick off at 2 p.m. (EST) and run concurrently across all time zones.

This system test is the first of its kind designed to broadcast a nationwide message to the American public. In the history of the country, nothing like it has been conducted on such a level. As you may be aware, there have been tests in the past, but not of this magnitude encompassing all regions of the Nation simultaneously. The three minute test will run concurrently on all radio and TV band stations exceeding the previous messages broadcast which were anywhere from a 30 seconds to 1 minute message.

There is great concern in local police and emergency management circles about undue public anxiety over this test. The test message on TV might not indicate that it is just a test. Fear is that the lack of an explanation regarding the message might create panic. Please share this information with your family and friends so they are aware of the test.

Reducing traffic accidents

Traffic death rates are three times greater at night than during the day, according to the National Safety Council. While there is no certain way of knowing what causes drivers to get distracted, safety remains the individual's responsibility.

Motor vehicle travel is the primary means of transportation in the United States, yet for all its advantages, deaths and injuries resulting from crashes are the leading cause of death for people ages two-to-34; with more than 33,000 in 2009, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

"It is necessary to be familiar with your surroundings to avoid any unfamiliar driving scenarios," said Tech. Sgt. Ryan Dillingham, 509th BW safety ground safety technician.

The 2011 Air Force goal is zero preventable mishaps and fatalities. Therefore, the Air Force is re-emphasizing the importance of fastening seatbelts, driving at posted speed limits and avoiding situations of driving while distracted, under the influence, fatigued or otherwise impaired.

The two most common reasons of accidents on the installation are improper backing-up and inattentive driving, according to documents provided by the 509th Security Forces Squadron reports and analysis section. The 509th Bomb Wing Safety Office believes assessing the situation, consider options to limit risk and take the appropriate action (ACT) will decrease the number

of vehicle accidents

The following are the top 10 risk factors while driving, courtesy of the Air Force Traffic Safety Center:

- 10. Driver distracted by non-driver tasks
- 9. Driving the vehicle beyond the operator's skill level or vehicle limits
 - 8. Inappropriate response to road hazards
- 7. Being part of an at risk age group (E-1 to E-4 are much higher than any other group)
- Refusing to wear a helmet when riding a motorcycle
- 5. Failure to comply with traffic laws other than speed limits
 - 4. Driving when fatigued
 - 3. Using alcohol and other drugs when driving
 - 2. Not wearing a seatbelt
 - 1. Excessive speed for conditions

"You can avoid almost all of the top risk factors by exercising self-discipline and utilizing the ACT process," Dillingham said. "You are able to control how you drive; however, the driving behaviors of other motorists on the road are a different story."

The wing safety office teaches multiple classes to military members such as standard traffic safety course, intermediate and advanced traffic safety and motorcycle training.

Use your most important tool—your brain and keep your full attention to the task at hand.

Enlisted education; here we go again

Continuing enlisted education. It's pretty much drummed into our heads from the moment we step into the USAF that we should, and are expected to, begin or continue to further our education. Eventually the option to wholeheartedly pursue a Community College of the Air Force, associates, bachelors and master's degree will happen.

Now, I know many of you reading this are probably saying to yourself, "Yeah, I know, my supervisor, my commander, even my spouse has been on me to continue my education." Maybe you are that supervisor, commander or spouse who's the one doing the pressuring. Either way, I cannot help but stress this topic even more.

Although there have been and will continue to be articles imploring us to finish our CCAF and continue to move toward a four-year degree, I do not think there can be too many. It's important that as enlisted members we know what options are available, how important for our own personal growth an education is, and how this education will affect our entire lives.

You are already working toward a degree while going through basic training. Why not CLEP, take an online course, attend a lunch-time class or take a weekend class at one of the local colleges.

According to Total Force CCAF data from the CCAF senior enlisted leader update newsletter (April 2011), 25 percent of Active Duty, 15 percent of Air National Guard and 21 percent of Reservists have at least a CCAF degree. The percentages should be higher.

As a Master Sergeant with 19 years in the service I currently have my CCAF degree, an associates and am now working on my B.A. Admittedly, had I been more focused or perhaps pushed more; I would have long ago attained my four-year degree and be presently working on a master's.

Those who are not pursuing their degree, for whatever reasonswork schedule, lack of interest, or other priorities- should consider getting an education that many of us, including myself spent many years working toward.

I finally accomplished my two-year degree in 2006, 14 years after I entered the Air Force. With work, family, friends, community, we often don't feel like we have the time or energy, myself included. With a TDY to Afghanistan and a PCS, I found myself out of school for almost a year. It was a challenge to motivate myself to get back in, but now that I am immersed in my course, I am glad.

To quote my commander, "We all have to leave the Air Force eventually." A post-military career can be more successful, with not only a four, six or 20-year military experience under our belt, but also the skills that a secondary education brings to the table.

Skills learned in a classroom can help us to think, reason, and comprehend oftentimes outside of our comfort zone. The courses we take, whether it is math, art, science or history, may not apply to our lives in the immediate future, but sometimes you can apply those skills during your time in the military.

I'll reiterate. Take advantage of the opportunities to go to school, look at yourself and where you are and where you would like to be, and realize you'll be able to go farther with a college degree.

Airmen help build homes, hope to Joplin

Twenty-five Airmen from the 509th Civil Engineer Squadron at Whiteman Air Force Base volunteered with the Joplin and Tulsa Habitat for Humanity project Nov. 1.

With more than a combined total of 230 hours, the Airmen planned, traveled and spent the day to build 10 homes, for 10 families in a blitz build spanning 16 days.

Their effort to reach out to the Tulsa chapter and volunteer to bring a group from Whiteman was initiated by Master Sgt. Benjamin Huseman, 509th Civil Engineer Squadron operations support superintendent and Johnson County Habit for Humanity board member.

"I saw there was a need to give back to the community and I pitched the idea to my peers," said Huseman. "I was able to get 15 slots from the Habitat for Humanity coordinator and within a day, I was able to fill those 15 slots." Huseman's response became overwhelming as more Airmen heard about the project and offered their skills and expertise; the master sergeant was able to get an additional 10 slots from the project manager in Joplin.

"The opportunity for us to take the skills the Air Force has taught us and help our community is only a minuscule part of giving back," Huseman said.

Like many of his counterparts, Senior Airman Scott Guilfoil, 509th CES paving and construction operations, said he volunteered to be a part of the project because he wanted to reach out and do something good for the community members of Joplin.

Even though six months have passed since the EF-5 tornado destroyed much of the Joplin area, the need to help victims without homes continues, according to www.tenforjoplin.or.

"The Airmen from Whiteman really helped make a difference and we appreciate their work," said Scott Clayton, Joplin Area Habit for Humanity executive director. Community mindedness is one of the backbones behind being a part of the 509th CES and the Air Force, according to Huseman.

He said the best part of the experience was being able to work on the houses alongside the home owner.

"Just hearing the excitement from the homeowner's voice when he talked about how he now had a living room and which room would be his sons, was really the best part about building the house," he said.

The 509th CES presented the homeowner with a B-2 plaque and said he was grateful for the Airmen from Whiteman AFB helping out these families that lost everything in the tornado.

"This experience was awesome and I couldn't have asked for a better group of people to work with," he said. "Everyone was in great spirits and the worked lined up well."

Habitat for Humanity is scheduled to hand over the keys to the new owners Nov. 19 during a dedication ceremony.

From the Frontlines: Master Sgt. Keith Lockard

While many Americans were preparing for the approaching holiday season, Master Sgt. Keith Lockard, 509th Civil Engineer Sqaudron, was preparing to leave his family in support of a deployment to Contingency Operating Station Erbil, Iraq. Lockard departed this Air Force Global Strike Command base Dec. 5, 2010, for his eighth deployment and returned June 17. 2011.

Lockard's mission was to assist in the construction of road ways, fuel stations, and living areas to help safeguard American lives during the troop withdrawal.

The Erbil mission was especially important to the draw-down of American troops and the buildup of Department of State mission personnel.

Sacrificing Christmas with his family was a small price to pay to be a part of setting the stage to bring American troops home from the Iraqi war by Christmas 2011, which was announced by President Barack Obama August 2010.

"The challenges I faced on my deployment taught me invaluable tools needed in everyday life to help me as a leader and as an Airman serving in the military," said Lockard. "I feel it is my duty to serve my country whether it is in the military or volunteering in my community back home."

"The work I did in Iraq was exceptionally gratifying," he said. "It felt great to be able to help rebuild schools and road ways for the Iraqi children. There was so much destruction from Saddam's wrath that he had taken on his own countrymen."

Even though the days were long and temperatures reached the triple digits, he made the best of his time there.

"The Airmen I served alongside with became my family," he said. "I felt safe with them knowing they had my back. I took comfort in small pleasures such as not having to do my own laundry in the desert and eating ice cream with sprinkles on top at the dining facility.

"Working together to get the missions done takes a strong partnership amongst the Airmen you are deployed with," Lockard said. "You get so dependent on limited supplies and equipment that a marriage happens between you and all of those things. If there is no harmony, then it's hard to get the job done."

PLAYpass cards help foster resilience

SAN ANTONIO – The PLAYpass card program is one way Air Force quality of life programs help build a resilient force.

The cards, valued at more than \$500, allow eligible members to participate in Air Force Services activities such as trips, sports and childcare at either a reduced cost or free of charge. Eligible members include: single Airmen returning from deployments; families of deployed members; and families of members at dependent-restricted assignments.

This year, the PLAYpass program was extended to single Airmen, a demographic that represents 40 percent of the Air Force. So far, nearly 1,000 single Airmen have registered for the cards.

"We're excited to expand this program to single Airmen to provide deployment respite and help with reintegration," said Linda Weston, Air Force Services Agency marketing specialist. "Single Airmen can visit their Airman and Family Readiness centers once they return to register for the card."

Additionally, families of members stationed at dependent-restricted assignments were added as eligible participants, Weston said.

"We wanted to ensure all family members left behind – whether due to deployments or dependent-restricted assignments – can take advantage of the many benefits PLAYpass cards offer to foster a sense of resilience," Weston said. "Airmen with families can contact their first sergeant or Airman & Family Readiness center at their home station to get their family members started on this great program."

One Air Force community where PLAY-pass has been popular is Tinker Air Force Base, Okla., with nearly 1,500 participants to date. According to Charlotte "Charlie" Lewis, a caring for people coordinator at Tinker, the program helps ease the pressures and stress associated with deployments, especially for families.

"Families tell me how grateful they are for the program because it helps the time their loved one is deployed pass by a little bit faster," she said.

Lewis said one mother with three school age children took advantage of the discounts over the summer while her husband was deployed. She was able to sign her children up for youth center field trips. Additionally, she was able to have some 'mommy' time and signed up for an arts and crafts center class.

"She stated this has been one of the best summers in a very long time," Lewis recounted. "The children did not complain as often about missing their father because she was able to keep them so busy."

Since the program launched in late May, nearly 23,000 eligible members have participated in PLAYpass. Services officials said the top activities used with the discount cards include youth programs, swimming pools, outdoor recreation, golf, bowling and information, tickets and travel offices. PLAYpass participation runs through Dec. 31, 2012.

Air Force vice chief testifies on readiness

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- The Air Force vice chief of staff provided the Air Force perspective on readiness in an age of austerity to the House Armed Services Committee's Subcommittee on Readiness here Oct. 27.

Gen. Phil Breedlove joined his Army, Navy and Marine Corps counterparts in discussing the challenges expected as the services look to find big budget savings over the next 10 years.

"These are challenging times," Breedlove said. "The Air Force has been at war for more than two decades."

Before joint operations began in Afghanistan shortly after 9/11, the general said the Air Force was already continuously rotating forces to the region to enforce no-fly zones over Iraq following the end of the first Gulf War.

Today, the Air Force operates with 34 percent fewer aircraft and roughly 26 percent fewer people than it had when the first Gulf War started, Breedlove said. Meanwhile, the operations tempo has only increased, with no expectation of lessening in the future.

The increased tempo has stressed the service, leading to a slow but steady decline in unit readiness since 2003, he said.

The Air Force has also had to expand or add additional mission capabilities during the current conflicts, Breedlove said.

"We have been asked to support this joint team in intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance," he said. "We've also been asked to build an increased capacity in special operations, and we will continue to meet both of those requirements." However, doing so is made all the more difficult by the pressing need to recapitalize the aging fighter, tanker and bomber fleets, the general said.

"We are flying the oldest fleet that the Air Force has ever flown," the general explained.

While recognizing that the Air Force will play its part in the nation's economic recovery, Breedlove said the service also "desperately" needs to recapitalize its aging force.

He said his service is reviewing all areas to find ways to operate with fewer dollars while also modernizing systems. This includes operating in a more energy efficient manner in order to lower fuel costs.

However, the general said the Air Force will have a difficult time meeting all of the nation's defense needs if the special committee established by the Budget Control Act fails to reach consensus and triggers additional automatic budget cuts.

"We believe we'll have to then begin to look at what are the capabilities that we'll have to shed and no longer offer to this joint team," Breedlove said.

Such a budget cut would affect the number of bases the Air Force could support, lessen the number of Airmen who could be retained, and affect the industrial base that provides and maintains Air Force equipment and resources, the general explained.

Despite the uncertain budget environment, Breedlove said senior Air Force leaders remain committed to ensuring the readiness of their service.

"Our goal is to do two things: first of all, maintain a credible military force," Breedlove emphasized. "And second, avoid becoming a hollow force."




