From the Frontlines: Staff Sgt. David Hernandez

A Whiteman vehicle mechanic is scheduled to receive a purple heart following return from his deployment. Staff Sgt. David Hernandez, 509th Logistics Readiness Squadron vehicle mechanic, returned to this Air Force Global Strike Command base as a wounded warrior from his fifth deployment.

He left Whiteman March 5, when his youngest of five children was two-weeks old, and returned Aug. 19, three days after getting injured.

He said his job as a mechanic was basically the same as it is at Whiteman except for being at a bare base with different vehicles and in a high ops-tempo environment.

"The Army Soldiers I worked with went on a convoy into town and I decided to go with them," Hernandez said. "At about seven in the morning our left flank took fire and we met with our main element going

True story: My cousin was killed by a drunk driver

December has been designated National Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Month, a time to raise awareness about the consequences of driving under the influence of alcohol and drugs.

A month before he was scheduled to leave for Air Force Basic Training, Jacob Forbes was killed in a single drunk driving accident in Carroll County, Mo. May 17, 2008.

According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol accident report, Forbes, a passenger traveling in a 2008 Ford, was heading westbound on U.S. Highway 24 at about 8:25 a.m. when the accident occurred at County Road 287.

The vehicle went off the left side of the roadway, overturned and struck a utility pole, coming to rest on its wheels, police said.

Forbes' life was cut short and today the tragedy of the fatal automobile accident continues to weigh heavily on his friends and family.

"His mother and my mother are twins so our families have always been really close," said Megan Moore, Jacob's cousin, and wife of Chief Warrant Officer 3 Marcus Moore, Army National

Guard, 1-135th Attack Reconnaissance Battalion Apache pilot. "I don't have any brothers, so Jacob was like a little brother to me."

"The morning I got the call from my cousin, Jacob's sister, I was at the St. Louis Zoo with my family," Megan said. "One of the hardest things I've ever had to do is hold it together for the rest of my family and contact my mother to send her to the hospital without knowing how bad it would be."

Jacob's aunt had already gone through a similar experience when her parents' best friends' son died in 2001.

When Jacob's friends learned about the car crash, they too had learned the hard lessons about drinking and driving.

Megan said Jacob's funeral was packed because so many people cared about him.

Take a look in the mirror before complaining about 'today's Airmen'

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RANDOLPH, Texas (AFNS) -- As I go about my business around Joint Base San Antonio--Randolph, whether attending meetings or speaking at the Noncommissioned Officer Professional Enhancement Seminars, I often hear NCOs and senior NCOs discussing some of their work issues. Undoubtedly part of the conversation revolves around the question, "What's wrong with these Airmen today?"

My answer is, "Us!" We NCOs and senior NCOs need to take a good look in the mirror!

No matter where I am on base, picking up uniforms at the cleaners, the Exchange or the commissary, I am constantly wondering what happened to us as NCOs. Why are so many Air Force and military standards not being followed or enforced? Where's the discipline and accountability?

I was in the exchange looking at the new DVDs and noticed a staff sergeant at the other end of the aisle looking at the video games. As I got closer, I noticed he had a pair of sunglasses on top of his head, his airman battle uniform shirt pocket and cargo pocket were unbuttoned, and his hat was sticking halfway out of his cargo pocket. As I continued to get closer to this individual, two NCOs walked right by him and did not say a word. I was

dumbfounded; I thought for sure they would have corrected him. I approached the staff sergeant and told him exactly what he needed to fix and, by the expression on his face, he was shocked someone corrected him. The staff sergeant quickly corrected his uniform as I carefully explained the errors of his ways.

I see these types of violations everyday all over JB Randolph and, more often than not, I find myself correcting NCOs and senior NCOs, not the junior enlisted Airmen. I can understand correcting some of our newer Airmen, but not our NCOs and senior NCOs. What has happened to our core values? Integrity, doing what's right when no one is looking and excellence in all we do?

When I teach at the NCOPE Seminar and the First Term Airman Center, we talk about standards and discipline and I always ask the class who has seen uniform violations at the exchange and food court and inevitably everyone raises their hand. Then I ask how many of them corrected the violation, and most hands go down -- and this is in both forums. I always ask why they failed to do their job and make the corrections. I get many answers, such as, "I don't want to be the bad guy," or, "The person out-ranked me," etc. I then remind them of Air Force Instruction 36-2618, the Enlisted Force Structure, that states, "Airman should correct personnel who violate military standards."

As supervisors and leaders, it is our job to exemplify the highest standards in maintaining self-

discipline and to correct those who fail to uphold the standards of discipline. We must get "back to the basics of discipline." As NCOs and senior NCOs we must set the example by exhibiting professional behavior, military bearing, customs and courtesies, and the highest standards of dress and appearance. In my opinion, we aren't setting the example and we aren't enforcing or maintaining standards.

Airmen are desperately seeking leadership. In an "exit poll" of Airmen leaving the Air Force after their first term, the number one reason for getting out is "lack of leadership." I see more and more senior NCOs waiting for retirement and NCOs who just don't seem to care about our airmen. The airmen pick up on this attitude and that attitude is then reflected in our Airmen.

The next time we NCOs and SNCOs start to question the quality of "today's Airmen," we need to take a long, hard look in the mirror. We should question the quality of our leadership, dedication and the sincerity we provide to our young Airmen and junior officers. We NCOs and senior NCOs are charged with the influential development of our Airmen, and by using the term Airmen, I mean every Air Force member. As a prior military training instructor of 10 years, I can honestly say there is nothing wrong with our Airmen; they simply need our attention and mentorship on a daily basis.

Our most precious resource is our Airmen. We, as leaders, must never forget it!

Use your Eagle Eyes

509th Bomb Wing Anti-Terrorism

The Eagle Eyes program is an Air Force antiterrorism initiative that enlists the eyes and ears of Air Force members and citizens. Eagle eyes teaches people about the typical activities terrorists engage in to plan their attacks. Armed with this information, anyone can recognize elements of potential terror planning when they see it.

The program provides a network of local, 24-hour phone numbers to call whenever a suspicious activity is observed. You and your family are encouraged to learn the categories of suspicious behavior and stay attuned to your surroundings. If you observe something suspicious on or around Whiteman AFB, call the Police Services Desk at 660-687-3700.

These are categories of suspicious behavior:

☐ **Surveillance:** Someone recording or monitoring activities. This may include the use of cameras (either still or video), note taking, drawing diagrams, annotating on maps or using binoculars or other vision-enhancing devices.

☐ **Elicitation:** People or organizations attempting to gain information about military operations, capabilities or people. Elicitation attempts may be made by mail, fax, telephone or in person. Examples could include being approached at

a gas station (or mall or airport or library) and asked about what's happening at the base; getting a fax (or an email or a telephone call, etc) asking for troop strength numbers... or the number of airplanes on base... or deployment procedures... or how a trash-collection truck gets on base... or the location of the headquarters building... or how many people live in a certain dorm... or where the commander lives... or how many people hang out at the base club at night... or which nightclubs or restaurants off base are highly frequented by military people... or the workings of the base's network firewall.

☐ **Tests of security:** Any attempts to measure reaction times to security breaches or to penetrate physical security barriers or procedures in order to assess strengths and weaknesses. Examples: a person grabs the base fence and shakes it and sees how long it takes for police to respond; a driver approaches the front gate (without ID and/or car sticker) and pretends to be lost or to have taken a wrong term, just to learn the procedures of how he is dealt with. In addition to seeing how far into the gate he can get before being turned around; a person places a "smoke bomb" near the fence or throws it over the fence, just to learn how quickly police respond and what effect that has on front-gate operations.







"Jacob knew no stranger," Megan said. "He had friends everywhere and was very well liked."

A close friend of Jacob even named her son after him in his memory.

"As you can imagine, it was very hard for all of us to see him in a casket," Megan said.

"It was also very difficult to pick out clothes to dress their son for his funeral," she said. "They picked out the suit jacket that he bought and wore to our grandmother's funeral because he was so proud of it."

Now that Jacob has passed, the Forbes' name legacy can no longer be carried on because he was their only son.

"Although we cannot turn back the hands of time we can only move forward and tell others about it in hopes that they will make different choices," she said.

Everyone in the vehicle was wearing their safety belts. The Ford was declared totaled and towed from the scene, police said. The two survivors received moderate injuries.

The driver pled guilty to three counts and sentencing assessment of involuntary manslaughter, a class C felony, assault in the second degree, a class C felony, and minor in possession of alcohol by consumption, according to www.courts.mo.gov.

She also served 120-days in jail, had five years of probation, lost her license for five years, and was ordered 50 hours of community service. She was ordered to enter drug and alcohol counseling and have an ignition interlock system on any car she operates. She was also discharged from the U.S. Army National Guard.

Every year at Christmas, Megan said her family chooses something to honor Jacob's memory and raise awareness about the dangers of drink-

ing and driving. Last year, they raised money to have a sign posted on the highway where the accident happened, reminding people of the real life dangers drinking and driving causes.

Jacob was a student at the University of Central Missouri and was the lead singer for the band "The Lights go Out in Georgia."

Editor's note: The interview was conducted on Jacob's birthday Dec. 2; he would have celebrated his 24th birthday.

What safety steps can individuals take?

If your social plans involve alcohol, make plans so that you don't have to drive after drinking. For example:

- Prior to any drinking, designate a non-drinking driver.
- Don't let your friends drive impaired. Take their keys away.
- If you have been drinking, get a ride home or call a taxi.
- Or, call Airmen Against Drunk Driving at 660-563-1178.
- If you're hosting a party where alcohol will be served, remind your guests to plan ahead and designate their sober driver; offer alcohol-free beverages; and make sure each guest leaves with a sober driver.
- Do not get in the car with someone who has been drinking and driving.





into town. Before I could make it to them I got shot through the wrist.”

That day changed Hernandez’s life forever.

“I can’t move my wrist or hold my baby when she gets cranky,” he said. “It takes me forever to do everyday things and I haven’t been able to turn a wrench since that day, which is extremely frustrating.”

On top of his own frustrations, he said his wife was hoping to get help from him with their five children when he returned and now he can’t do much to aid.

Fortunately, the Air Force is doing everything they can to ensure he gets proper care by sending him to Texas every six weeks to see his doctor. He said he also receives occupational therapy here three times a week.

Even after everything Hernandez has experienced, he doesn’t think of himself as a hero.

“As long as military members go, I think the only heroes are the ones who don’t come back,” he said. “I don’t think a hero refers to only military though. Everybody is a hero at

some point or another; I think anyone who does anything to improve the lives of others is a hero in their own right.”

Air Force lifts hiring freeze

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas (AFNS) -- The hiring freeze implemented in August will be lifted Thursday, Air Force Personnel Center officials announced.

The freeze, preceded by hiring controls, was one of several measures implemented in 2011 to bring manning down to mandated 2010 levels. In addition, voluntary separation incentives were recently offered, with employees expected to separate by Dec. 31.

“We have made significant progress in reducing manning levels through various programs,” said Michelle LoweSolis, the AFPC civilian force integration director. “But in some areas we are still short of the goal, so the freeze was extended in those targeted areas to help us work toward that end.”

“Even with the hiring freeze being lifted Dec. 15, budget and funding issues are still fluid, so major command and wing leaders must be alert to changing conditions as they’ll have the responsibility to control hiring to stay below targeted levels,” LoweSolis explained.

Since the spring, nearly 9,000 positions have been trimmed from Air Force manning levels, but an additional 4,500 are necessary to reach required levels. Many of the positions identified for elimination are already vacant, and the hiring freeze resulted in more vacant positions, which will help the Air Force reach its goals, the director said.

“Nevertheless, our nation faces significant challenges and we all must remain firmly focused on force management,”

LoweSolis said. “Toward that end, a second round of voluntary separation measures is anticipated in January (2012).”

Voluntary separation incentives are “effective tools to help reduce our footprint without resorting to involuntary measures,” LoweSolis said.

Once current voluntary early retirement authority and voluntary separation incentive pay actions are complete, Air Force leaders will be able to fully assess the manning situation and determine if additional measures will be implemented, she said.

Who will be able to apply for VERA and/or VSIP during the next round has not yet been determined.

“We at AFPC are committed to assisting the personnel strategic advisors in the field, and our benefits and entitlements team has been working round-the-clock to ensure Air Force employees get the best care possible,” LoweSolis explained.

“There are many moving parts involved in this effort, and we are all working to ensure employees whose positions have been targeted for elimination are quickly placed in positions vacated by those who accepted VERA and/or VSIP, while keeping in mind the fact that we have a variety of mandatory placements to handle as well,” she said.

Mandatory placements include people returning from overseas and outplacing centrally funded interns and employees in professional military education, LoweSolis said.

“In this difficult and challenging time, we are committed to making placement decisions that will benefit both our invaluable civilian employees and our critical Air Force mission,” she said. “Nothing less will do.”

She runs, runs and never stops

When it comes to running, there isn't anything that can stop U.S. Army Staff Sgt. Michelle Elliott, 1-135th Attack Reconnaissance Battalion crew chief in charge of aviation life support equipment.

Elliott's proudest achievements include the 2006 winning of the Air Force Marathon, being the first runner to cross the finish line during an Appalachian Mountain 50 mile run, two weeks ago.

Rewinding to 1996, where her story begins, her husband and son died in the same year.

"That's when I started running," said Elliott. "It just kind of took me away and I haven't really stopped since."

During her runs, Elliott imagines her son, Derrick, and husband, Mike, are running with her. She uses this reflection to fuel her fire and it keeps her going when she feels too tired to continue.

"I've had some pretty rough 50Ks lately," said Elliott. "And when think, 'I can't do it anymore', I look up and just know that I have got to pick myself up and keep going."

"There's going to be falls but you just have to pick up and keep going," she said. "It's like life."

Today, as a single parent of two daughters, running helps Elliott cope with the stresses of life. With the responsibility of caring for her 12-year-old and 20 month old daughters, she remains dedicated to her marathon running, pushing her younger one in a stroller when necessary.

"I do a lot of pushing of the jog stroller," Elliott said. "We've ran two-half marathons, a 20-miler and then, we won the Pilgrim Pacer full marathon three weeks ago."

Elliott said she received weird looks being the first competitor to cross finish lines pushing a baby stroller. Some of the things that keep her going is thinking about situations and hashing them out during her runs.

"When I run, I think about everything that's happening and what I've been going through and it helps me sort some things out," Elliott said. "I can be really grumpy in the morning and I'll go for a run and feel better afterward."

One of the best parts about running, according to Elliott, is 'runner's high'.

"It's a point where you feel like you can't do it anymore, and then it feels like you can't stop because you're just floating and you feel great," Elliot explained.

Although the balance between training for marathons, taking care of two children as a single mother, taking online college courses and working with her Army Reserve unit presents challenges, she still manages to make everything work out. Elliott said being busy keeps her from sitting and thinking.

"I'm not one that likes to sit still," Elliott said. "I like to keep going. I don't like having time to think."

"I run before and after work and anytime I can push the baby in the jog stroller," she said. "If the weather is bad we'll just go to the gym."

Elliott said she also has a supportive team at work and said she loves her job and the people she works with.

"They're really understanding about everything," she said. "They give me time to go on runs and support me 100 percent."

As the master of physical training for her company, Elliott said Soldiers, Airmen and other armed forces members should remember to do what they can to stay in shape, regardless of the time of year or how cold the weather is.

At times when Elliot does not feel motivated to run, she encourages herself to dig deep and remembers how good she will feel once she is done.

"You just have to get up and force yourself to do it," she said.

Elliott is currently planning to complete three full marathons this year before training for a 100 mile run in Arizona in April 2012.

Acquiring supplies: Purchasing or stealing explosives, weapons, ammunition, detonators, timers, etc. Also includes acquiring military uniforms, decals, flight manuals, passes or badges (or the equipment to manufacture such items) or any other controlled items.

Suspicious persons out of place: People who don't seem to belong in the workplace, neighborhood, business establishment, or anywhere else. This category is hard to define, but the point is that people know what looks right and what doesn't look right in their neighborhoods, office spaces, commutes, etc, and if a person just doesn't seem like he or she belongs, there's probably a reason for that.

Dry run: Putting people into position and moving them around according to their plan without actually committing the terrorist act. This is especially true when planning a kidnapping, but it can also pertain to bombings. An element of this activity could also include mapping out routes and determining the timing of traffic lights and flow. Take note of people moving around from place to place without any apparent purpose and doing it, perhaps, many times. The appropriate example here is the 9/11 hijackers, who are now known to have actually flown on those exact flights several times before Sept. 11. Their purpose was to

practice getting their people into position, working out arrival times, parking, ticketing, going through security, boarding, etc. By taking note of everything around them, in one sense they were conducting surveillance and testing security, but they were also doing a dry run of the actual activity.

Deploying assets: People and supplies getting into position to commit the act. This is a person's last chance to alert authorities before the terrorist act occurs. Look for people loading up vehicles with weaponry/explosives, etc, and/or parking that vehicle somewhere, or people in military uniforms (who don't look right) approaching an installation or getting into a vehicle, or people who seem out of place standing by at a certain location as if waiting for something to happen. One fairly good example of this is the attack on the Khobar Towers in Saudi Arabia. When the explosives-laden truck pulled up to the fence line (which was the "deploying assets" step) and the driver jumped out and ran away, that was seen by a spotter on the roof of the dormitory, who recognized this as suspicious activity. He then sprinted down stairs and began pounding on doors, rousting people out of bed and getting them out of the building. Because of that, he saved many, many lives, and it's all because he recognized the "deploying assets" element.
