August 2013 Courts-Martial, Article 15s and Discharges

In August 2013, 10 members were punished under Article 15; Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ), five members were administratively separated from the Air Force, and no court-martials completed during this month.

ARTICLE 15s (10)

An airman first class from the 509th Security Forces Squadron received an Article 15 for procuring acts of prostitution and larceny. Punishment was reduction to airman, forfeiture of \$200 pay for one month (suspended) and a reprimand.

A staff sergeant from the 509th Security Forces Squadron received an Article 15 for dereliction of duty. Punishment was reduction to senior airman, forfeiture of \$400 pay per month for two months (suspended), 45 days extra duty and a reprimand.

A staff sergeant from the 509th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron received an Article 15 for dereliction of duty and signing a false official statement. Punishment was reduction to senior airman, forfeiture of \$576 pay (suspended), 30 days extra duty and a reprimand.

A senior airman from the 509th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron received an Article 15 for being absent without leave. Punishment was forfeiture of \$300 pay for one month, 15 days extra duty and a reprimand.

A senior airman from the 509th Maintenance Squadron received an Article 15 for willful dereliction of duty and failure to obey a lawful order. Punishment was reduction to airman, forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for two months, 15 days of extra duty and a reprimand.

A staff sergeant from the 509th Maintenance Squadron received an Article 15 for dereliction of duty. Punishment was reduction to senior airman and a reprimand.

A senior airman from the 20th Reconnaissance Squadron received an Article 15 for signing a false official statement. Punishment was reduction to airman first class (suspended), forfeiture of \$500 pay for 2 months and a reprimand.

A senior airman from the 509th Logistics Readiness Squadron received an Article 15 for wrongful use of marijuana. Punishment was reduction to airman first class, 15 days extra duty and a reprimand.

A senior airman from the 509th Force Support Squadron received an Article 15 for wrongful use of marijuana. Punishment was reduction to airman first class and a reprimand.

A staff sergeant from the 709th Munitions Squadron received an Article 15 for willful dereliction of duty, making a false official statement and signing a false official statement. Punishment was reduction to senior airman and a reprimand.

DISCHARGES (5)

An airman first class from the 509th Security Forces Squadron received an honorable discharge for failure to meet fitness standards.

An airman from the 509th Maintenance Squadron received an honorable discharge for failure to meet fitness standards.

An airman first class from the 509th Force Support Squadron received an honorable discharge for failure to meet fitness standards.

An airman first class from the 509th Force Support Squadron received an honorable discharge for conditions that interfere with military service (mental disorder).

An airman first class from the 509th Munitions Squadron received an honorable discharge for unsatisfactory performance.

Balfour Beatty Communities to kickoff 2013 Housing Survey

Since the 2012 survey, BBC has completed many home renovations. All neighborhoods will be fenced by the end of the summer, and various neighborhoods have received new trash pad storage, storm doors, garage keypads for home access and sheds in the backyard. Currently new patio covers are being installed, providing 120 square feet of covered area. In addition to the renovations, several new amenities have been added to the Whiteman community, such as bus shelters, park shelters and barbeque grills, along with several new 'tot lots,'which are playgrounds specifically designed for smaller children with child-sized hands and feet. In addition, the new stateof-the-art BBC Community Center is slated to open in late 2013, offering a fitness area, zero-entry pool and Olympic-sized lap pool.

"We truly strive to exceed our residents' expectations and hope that every resident enjoys their home and the services that we provide," said Sonnier.





For one Missouri Air National Guardsman, life as a Citizen-Airman is far from the wilds of her civilian career.

Airman Casey Self, a zookeeper at the Kansas City Zoo, joined the 131st Bomb Wing to expand her resume from taking care of animals on land and water to people in the sky, as well.

"When I moved to the Kansas City area and learned more about Whiteman Air Force Base through friends stationed there, I realized that I had a great opportunity right in front of me," Self said. "That's when I decided to enlist in the Air National Guard. Serving my country and being a part of such a great team, I feel like I will help make a difference in people's lives."

Self, who enlisted as an aviation resource management technician with the 131st, has already demonstrated the potential for a long and successful career, said her recruiter, Tech Sgt. Jason Jones.

"Airman Self has shown herself to be an outstanding addition to the 131st through her strong work ethic and dedication," Jones said. "She has demonstrated leadership qualities that will be strengthened throughout her Air Force training and benefit the Missouri Air National Guard for years to come."

While Self's dream was to work with animals, she had another goal: to serve her country. Self said she has wanted to serve since she was a child, and participated in Junior ROTC during high school. She considered enlisting during her senior year, but ultimately decided to take another path.

An Illinois native, she knew from a young age she wanted to spend her life working with animals.

"It wasn't until I started to study applied animal behavior that I realized that I

wanted to be an animal trainer," Self said. "In the zoo world, the zookeepers are the animal trainers so that's why I decided to pursue a career in zoo-keeping."

She graduated from the University of Illinois in 2009 with a degree in animal science. From there, Self began a series of internships and jobs that moved her around the country, gaining experience along the way. Almost a year ago, she accepted a position at the Kansas City Zoo.

The new job came with a significant amount of responsibility.

"My responsibilities as a zookeeper encompass everything that has to do with the welfare of the animals in my section, the Ruwenzori area," Self said. "We are responsible for the section of the African exhibits that house the chimpanzees, hippos, leopard tortoises, African wild dogs, baboons and slender-snouted crocodiles."

The years spent working in her current civilian career field will make her a better, more responsible Airman, Self said. Though her specific civilian job responsibilities may seem far out of the realm of military tasks, Self said the environment she works in has prepared her well for her duties as a Citizen-Airman.

"My job in the Air National Guard will be aviation resources management, where I will be supporting the pilots [as they] fly the B-2s," Self said. "We have a very labor-intensive, fast-paced, high-tempo job that is also very rewarding."

Going from the zoo to Missouri Air National Guard blue, Self's story is a testament to never giving up on a dream. She is currently awaiting dates for basic training and technical school, and is excited for the challenges ahead of her.

"I'm thankful for the flexibility that being in the Air National Guard provides for reaching all of my career goals," Self said. "I feel like everything has fallen into place and this is where I have always wanted to be."

Vietnam Wall gives veterans a moment to reflect





The traveling Vietnam Memorial Wall has stopped in Concordia, Mo., Sept. 4-8 to honor Service members who gave the ultimate sacrifice during the Vietnam War. Ceremonial guardsmen from the 509th Bomb Wing Honor Guard were on hand during the opening ceremony, Sept. 4, 2013, to present the colors and lay a wreath in front of the granite panels. Retired Air Force Chief Master Sgt. Melvin Bockelman was recognized during the ceremony for enlisting in the Army Air Corps in 1944, serving in World War II and then retiring from the Air Force in 1967. The wall is one of four traveling walls in the U.S. and is nearly three-fifths the size of the original wall in Washington D.C. It stands six feet tall at the center, stretches to nearly 300 feet and has approximately 58,000 names engraved into it.







Paper, aluminum, plastic and cardboard are necessary resources used on a daily basis to complete tasks that would not be possible without them. Once used, they are usually thrown into a bin to await the process of recycling.

The 509th Force Support Squadron recycling center plays an important role in ensuring Whiteman is free of waste, and that base personnel help contribute to a cleaner environment, said Mark Davis, 509th FSS recycling center supervisor.

"Our job is to reduce the amount of material waste hauled by oil and fuel," said Davis. "Last year, we diverted 41 percent of the base's trash. Increasing the percentage of recycled material is ideal and can only be achieved with full participation. Our goal is to reduce the amount of waste the base has to send to the landfill."

Recycling can save any organization a great

deal of money when compared to other disposal methods

"Earlier this year, it cost a \$100 a ton for the base to haul trash to the garbage contractor," said Jeff Willming, 509th FSS material examiner and identifier. "So for every ton that we recycle, we save the base a \$100. Last year, the whole recycling program diverted 1,045 tons, which include waste, oil and scrap metal. We made \$216,000 for the base. Another part of our mission is to recycle as much paper, plastic, cardboard and aluminum as possible."

The recycling center also plays a key role in providing the base additional money by turning in recycled materials to companies for compensation, said Willming.

He added that this process must be accomplished in a way that keeps costs to a minimum.

"After all of our payroll and extent expenses have been covered, the rest of the money is returned to the base," said Willming. "It stays right here in Whiteman, and is used to improve certain aspects and areas such as the rubber run-

ning track, batting cages and some of the restrooms at the baseball fields."

This serves a major benefit to Whiteman because with current budget cuts, the base has very limited options in acquiring these additional funds but through recycling. The more people recycle, the more money Whiteman receives.

The recycling center crew average 30 bales of cardboard, 6 bales of newspaper, 4 bales of office paper and a bale of plastic a month. When they have a truck-load of cardboard, newspaper and office paper bales, they have to take at least three bids from commodity brokers. The highest bidder will then send in a truck to get the bales and ship them to a purchasing company.

The recycling center crew operates heavy machinery and equipment, ranging from fork-

lifts to conveyor belts, which can result in serious injury if used improperly.

"When dealing with machines, there is the possibility of getting crushed hands from working with large, metal bins," said Davis. "There is also the possibility of getting hit by an operating forklift if not aware, or the possibility of slips and falls from ladders and spillage from liquids within cans."

Despite the hazards, the recycling center crew enjoys assisting with bringing in money to the base to help make renovations for Airmen and their families, said Davis.

"I enjoy seeing the results of our job leading to the renovations that are being made to Whiteman," he said. "It lets me know that what I'm doing is giving back to the base and its Airmen"

The Falcons come into the season having convinced TE Tony Gonzalez to return for another season, and added running back Steven Jackson to fortify the ground game. The Falcons need Jackson, who has a lot of mileage on his legs, to stay healthy for them to have a chance to return to the NFC Championship Game. Matt Ryan will have his dual outside weapons, Roddy White and Julio Jones, once again this year. The offense will be great as long as they stay healthy, but the defense will be the key to the Falcons' season-long success or failure.

In this match-up, with Graham and Sproles, as well as receivers Marques Colston and Lance Moore, I see the Saints taking the first game of the season at home 38-33; however, the Falcons will end the season with a better record and the division crown.

Green Bay Packers at San Francisco 49ers: This is a rematch of last year's high-scoring NFC divisional-round game in which San Fran quarterback Colin Kaepernick torched the Packers defense to a tune of 263 yards and two scores through the air and a record-setting 181 yards and two scores on the ground. This opening game will not be short on offense - expect another high-scoring game and inflated fantasy points. The key to this match-up will be Kaepernick, who lost his favorite target from last season in WR Michael Crabtree. Anquan Boldin, who beat the 49ers in the Super Bowl with the Ravens, will now be Kaepernick's likely number-one target. The Redskins come into their first game of the season after winning the division last year, with the electrifying Robert Griffin III returning from major knee surgery. His health is the key to the Redskins' season and future, so he must stay on the field for the Redskins to excel.

This new Eagles team comes with several question marks, as new head coach Chip Kelly tries to bring his fast-paced spread offense to the NFL. 
