AL UDEID AIR BASE, QATAR (AFNS) -- Airmen, Soldiers and Marines joined forces for a leadership course known to the United States Marine Corps as the Corporal's Course June 2 through 17 at Al Udeid Air Base.

A course normally provided to only Marine corporals to educate and cultivate their leadership skills, was made available for Airmen and Soldiers to gain lessons to grow as aspiring NCOs.

The course instructor's goal was to build the students for the future.

"When we have a group of new leaders they only have one mind set," said Sgt. Justin Daniels, a Corporal's Course instructor. "I wanted to present the students new challenges, new ways to do things and new thought processes while developing them for their future roles."

Senior Airman Luke Meister, a 379th Expeditionary Contracting Squadron contracting officer, said he looked at the class as a fortunate way to gain education while abroad.

"It is an insane opportunity," he said. "I have not met another person of my rank to be able to go to another service's PME, especially while deployed."

The course encompassed lessons from the Marine Corp Warfighting Publication 6-11, which features material on the Marine ethos, foundations and challenges of leadership.

Cpl. Charles Hall, a Marine Tactical Electronic Warfare Squadron electronic interceptor operator analyst in the course, wanted to gain as much knowledge as possible to be a standout leader.

"Going into the course I wanted to learn how to be an effective leader," Hall said. "I want to be able to convey information in a way where my subordinates will emulate what they are taught positively."

Not only did the course teach the E-4's about leadership skills, but it also showed them they have more in common with their sister services than they thought.

"I learned how to set the example and how to lead people," Hall said. "I also saw that we are not as different from other E-4's in other services as I thought we were.'

As the course wrapped up, Daniels realized that as the instructor he had learned a lesson in adjusting his leadership style as well.

"This course actually helped me a lot," Daniels said. "Working with the different branches showed me the branches work differently from each other, and that having the many personalities and different ways of doing things helped my versatility as a leader."

If you have not yet gotten a chance to spend time with our new command chief as he zig zags around base meeting Airmen, brace yourself. CMSgt Shawn Drinkard, 509th Bomb Wing command chief, is a very passionate, extremely energetic and highly motivated leader who loves to get shoulder-to-shoulder with Airmen while they provide strategic deterrence, global power and combat support.

"Everything I do will fall into three caveats," Drinkard said. "To ensure the 509th Bomb Wing is highly trained, highly motivated and highly disciplined, all while developing future leaders and taking care of Airmen and their families."

Drinkard has been in the military for 19 years. He made chief at his 15-year mark and assumed responsibilities as our command chief on June 16, 2014.

"I never really realized I wanted to become a command chief," Drinkard said. "It was never a want or aspiration. I just focused on my Airmen and the job in front of me. I truly believe we are always where we are supposed to be."

Drinkard grew up in the shadow of the B-52H Stratofortress in Bossier City, Louisiana. The patriotism the city had drew him in.

"I was exposed to the Air Force at a young age and I wanted to be part of it," Drinkard said. "My grandfather was a retired air policeman and it inspired me to join the Air Force."

Drinkard would scoot up his chair, lending an ear to his grandfather's descriptive stories about his time around the world.

"He would tell me stories of the air police deployments when he would forward deploy with the SAC bomber fleet," he said. "I am extremely proud that I too am an American Airman who continues to stand watch to defend freedom like so many before me."

"I surprised myself," Drinkard continued. "I

never thought I would be here."

Drinkard came in as an Airman Basic. He was on the job with nothing on his sleeve for four months.

"This particular moment in my life was a proud and humble experience," he said. "At that time, I was thirsty for something, at least one chevron. It is an essential symbol of the enlisted force and I didn't have one at all. I suppose it was a pride thing."

He reminisces looking at his mosquito wings [Airman Chevron] and thought they were huge.

"It looked so much bigger than what was there before, which was nothing," Drinkard said. "To this day that promotion was the most important promotion to me because it meant I was an Airman. That single chevron meant I was on my way to bigger and better things."

Drinkard speaks highly of his first supervisor, as he feels he made him the Airman he is today.

"Someone truly cared for me and where my career was going," Drinkard said. "If I didn't have Tech. Sgt. Robert Springs, I would not even be close to where I am right now. I am here not because of me, but because of others' belief and faith in my leadership potential; they lit a fire in me that still burns bright."

Every Airman has the ability to inspire someone to accomplish something they did not think was possible.

"I met Shawn when he was assigned to my flight as an Airman Basic, straight out of technical school," said Robert Spring, Drinkard's first supervisor. "Since I have known him, he has always been motivated."

When he completed training to earn his first certification, Drinkard wanted to start on his next certification right away.

"With Shawn, there was no sitting around," Spring said. "He always wanted to be productive. He has the 'what's next?' attitude."

When Drinkard was an E-2 with only a year in the Air Force, he deployed alone, without a team or team leader, to Saudi Arabia. His first day in country was the day of the Khobar Towers terrorist attack. This first deployment taught Drinkard that every Airman is a leader and each day will present an opportunity to lead; each Airman must be ready.

Later on, when Drinkard was an Airman 1st Class, he saw eagerly anticipated earning the rank of Senior Airman -- highly proficient, technical, knowledgeable.

"They [SrA] were it," he said. "Senior Airman was highly respected. When they spoke, you listened. When they did something, you watched. I thought that was the coolest thing. They carried so much weight and I feel that holds true today, we just need to help Senior Airman believe it too."

Every member of Team Whiteman should have goals and aspirations but Drinkard believes our goals should align with the Air Force core values, family responsibilities, and a commitment to develop tomorrow's leaders; when our commitments line up, we hit our professional and personal targets.

Drinkard and his wife, Master Sgt. Sarah Drinkard, 509th Medical Operations Squadron registered dental hygienist, have been married for 13 years. They have three daughters, Shannen, 7, Sidney, 4 and Skylar, 2.

"My family keeps me grounded, especially knowing Sarah somewhat sacrificed her career for mine," Drinkard said. "She could have easily been the chief in this family."

As their careers evolved, Master Sgt. Drinkard supported Chief Drinkard and eagerly followed her husband where his career took them -- as long as the family remained together.

"My husband has always been motivated and hungry to inspire Airmen and hunt for the next challenge," Sarah said. "We are very competitive and we push each other in everything we do."

With every opportunity to learn, Drinkard is there to sweep it up.

"He has always been dialed in and very selfdisciplined," Sarah said. "For each rank, he studied one year before each test date. Airmen encouraged to review vRED

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RANDOLPH, Texas (AFNS) -- When Airmen go through major changes in their life, such as marriage, a permanent change of station, or having a child, one of the first things that should come to mind is, "I have to update my Virtual Record of Emergency Data," or vRED.

While this is not always the case, it is imperative Airmen update their emergency data when major changes occur and at least annually to ensure their family is taken care of during a time of crisis.

The DD Form 93, Record of Emergency Data, is the official source document required by law for Airmen to provide emergency contact information and beneficiary designations to the Air Force in the event an Airman becomes a casualty. The vRED, accessible through the Virtual Military Personnel Flight, satisfies that requirement.

"It is vital for Airmen to understand the purpose of the vRED and understand the importance of its accuracy," said Todd Rose, the Air Force Personnel Center casualty matters division chief. "Delays in next of kin notification are most often associated with incomplete or outdated information.

"Completion and annual validation of the vRED is mandatory and is the responsibility of each Airman," Rose said.

Airmen can access their vRED thru the myPers website at https://mypers.af.mil. Once at the myPers' home page Airmen should click the "Update my Virtual Record of Emergency Data" link. This will take them to a page directing them how to access their vRED.

"When important life-changing events such as marriage, divorce, or a change in address occur, the vRED should be updated as soon as possible," said 1st Lt. Brian Meredith, the AFPC casualty services officer. "Having a complete and accurate vRED ensures the Air Force Casualty Services Branch can provide prompt and accurate casualty reporting, dignified and humane casualty notifications, as well as efficient, thorough and compassionate follow-on assistance to surviving families."

Chapter 7: On the Waterfront

Air Force Summer Boating/Water Sport Losses: (Jun-Sep) 2009-2013

- 3 fatalities

- 51 injuries

- Total cost, injuries: \$878,661

Civilian population risk data:

- In 2012, while operating vessel there was 2454 accidents, with 288 Deaths, and 1,839 injuries.

- Alcohol was involved in 280 of these accidents attributing for 109 deaths and 227 injuries.

- Excessive speed was reported in 310 of these accidents.

Responsibility is a large part of *integrity* – the first of the Air Force core values. Responsible behavior is doing the right thing even when no one is looking. Mishap prevention also depends upon responsible behavior. As you participate in the activities discussed below, always do the right thing.

What better way to enjoy a hot summer day than being in or around the water. Swimming is discussed in Chapter 9 and here we will discuss other popular water activities. Boating, jet skiing, tubing, water skiing, etc., just to name a few, may be in your plans.

According to the Executive Summary of the U.S. Coast Guard 2012 Report:

• In 2012, the Coast Guard counted 4515 accidents that involved 651 deaths, 3000 injuries and approximately \$38 million dollars of damage to property as a result of recreational boating accidents.

o The fatality rate was 5.4 deaths per 100,000 registered recreational vessels. This rate represents a 12.9% decrease from last year's fatality rate of 6.2 deaths per 100,000 registered recreational vessels.

o Compared to 2011, the number of accidents decreased 1.6%, the number of deaths decreased 14.1% and the number of injuries decreased 2.6%.

• Almost seventy-one (71) percent of all fatal boating accident victims drowned, and of those, almost eighty-five (85) percent were not reported as wearing a life jacket.

• Almost fourteen percent (14) of deaths occurred on boats where the operator had received boating safety instruction. Only nine (9) percent of deaths occurred on vessels where the operator had received boating safety instruction from a NASBLA approved course provider.

• Seven out of every ten boaters who drowned were using vessels less than 21 feet in length.

• Operator inattention, operator inexperience, improper lookout, machinery failure, and excessive speed rank as the top five primary contributing factors in accidents.

• Alcohol use is the leading contributing factor in fatal boating accidents; it was listed as the leading factor in 17% of deaths.

• Twenty-four children under age thirteen lost their lives while boating in 2012. Ten children or approximately forty-two (42) percent of the children who died in 2012 died from drowning. Two children or twenty (20) percent of those who drowned were wearing a life jacket as required by state and federal law.

• The most common types of vessels involved in reported accidents were open motorboats (47%), personal watercraft (19%), and cabin motorboats (15%).

• The 12,101,936 recreational vessels registered by the states in 2012 represent a 0.59% decrease from last year when 12,173,935 recreational vessels were registered.

Although the number of fatalities has decreased, even one is too many. Note the causes listed above and be prepared to mitigate the risks by having all the proper equipment and training, do not speed, and do not drink while operating a watercraft. The following example illustrates how important it is to always expect the unexpected:

An Airman rented a jet ski from a local vendor. He was provided a life vest and escorted to the jet ski. He was on it for about 30 minutes when he made an abrupt maneuver at an unknown speed. As he negotiated the jet ski sharply to the right, he was partially ejected. He fell backwards and to the right where his right foot caught the foot well, causing injury to his lower leg. Additionally, as he was ejected, he lost grip of the throttle and the jet ski came to a stop. He sustained a compound fracture to the right lower leg and was placed on three days quarters followed by a month on convalescent leave.

How could this have been prevented? No one will know for sure, but being properly prepared might give you the extra edge you need to avoid an accident.

AFGSC to kick off Striker Trident professional development program

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. -- Nuclear and Missile Operations officers within Air Force Global Strike Command have a new avenue of professional development available through the Command's new Striker Trident program.

Striker Trident is an Air Force - Navy exchange program that supports professional development of company grade officers trained and qualified in similar nuclear deterrence missions, according to a memorandum of understanding between Lt. Gen. Stephen Wilson, AFGSC commander, and Vice Admiral Michael J. Connor, Commander, Submarine Forces.

"The idea for an intercontinental ballistic missile/ submarine-launched ballistic missile officer exchange program has been around for decades, but never came to fruition," Brig. Gen. Michael Fortney, AFGSC director of operations, said. "The recent ICBM Force Improvement Program highlighted the merits of such an exchange to Lt. Gen. Wilson and Maj. Gen. Weinstein, 20th Air Force commander, and they agreed. General Wilson then engaged his counterpart in the Navy, and six weeks later we were selecting candidates."

Competition for this new program was tough, and 13 candidates were submitted to the 13N development team, which ultimately selected the participants. The first 13Ns selected for the program are Capt. Patrick McAfee, 341st Missile Wing, Malmstrom Air Force Base, Montana, and Capt. John Mayer, 20th Air Force at F.E. Warren Air Force Base, Wyoming.



"I am extremely excited for the opportunity to work with our sister service and learn the intricacies of a completely different strategic mission," McAfee said.

McAfee will serve three years with Commander, Submarine Force U.S. Pacific Fleet in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and Mayer will serve two years with Commander, Submarine Force Atlantic in Norfolk, Virginia, where they will be trained in the day-to-day management of the strategic submarine force.

"We want to give our 13Ns the opportunity to gain some valuable cross-service experience in preparation for future joint assignments," said Capt. Tracy Prey, chief of Intercontinental Ballistic Missile Operations Command and Control Programs for AFGSC's operations directorate. "This program will be in line with other high-level professional development programs such as Pathfinder, Weapons School and Top Hand."

Prior to moving to their new assignments, Mayer and McAfee will receive additional professional development that will help with the transition to a naval assignment, including visits to U.S. Strategic Command, the Nuclear Weapons Center at Kirtland Air Force Base, New Mexico, and here to AFGSC Headquarters for senior leader perspectives.

"This additional training will help bolster their nuclear enterprise credentials, and give them a good senior leader perspective on what is expected of them during the exchange program," Prey said.

Naval officers selected for the program, who will begin assignments next year, will serve at 20th Air Force Headquarters and in the Operations Directorate at AFGSC Headquarters.

Fortney said the Striker Trident program is a tremendous opportunity for young missile officers in both the Air Force and Navy communities.

"There will be many a senior ICBM officer who will be jealous that they were not given this opportunity," he said. "This promises to be an outstanding opportunity for our young missileers to experience firsthand how the Navy manages its nuclear forces, learn best practices, and roll those ideas back into the ICBM force. I'm sure the Navy will do the same. It's truly a win-win program all around."


