Spiritual fitness: The pure heart

According to the Muslim faith, on the Day of Judgment no one is safe, save the one who returns to God with a pure heart.

Prophet Muhammad (peace and blessings be upon him (pbuh) said "Surely in the breasts of humanity is a lump of flesh, if sound then the whole body is sound, and if corrupt then the whole body is corrupt. Is it not the heart?" (Bukhari, Muslim)

Jesus (pbuh) said "Blessed are the pure at heart, for they shall see God." (Matthew 5:8)

Almost universally, religious traditions have stressed the importance of the condition of the heart. In the Muslim scripture, the Day of Judgment is described as:

"And do not disgrace me on the Day they are [all] resurrected. The Day when there will not benefit [anyone] wealth or children, but only one who comes to Allah with a sound heart." (26:87-89)

The sound heart is understood to be free of character defects and spiritual blemishes. This "heart" is actually the spiritual heart and not the physical organ per se, although in Islamic tradition the spiritual heart is centered in the physical. One of the extraordinary aspects of the modern era is that we are discovering aspects about the heart unknown in previous times, although there were remarkable insights in ancient traditions. For instance, according to traditional Chinese medicine, the heart houses what is known as shen, which is spirit. The Chinese characters for thinking, thought, love, the intention to listen, and virtue all contain the ideogram for the heart.

In nearly every culture in the world, people use metaphors that directly or indirectly allude to the heart. We call certain types of people "hard-hearted," usually because they show no mercy or kindness. Likewise, people are said to have "cold hearts" and others yet are called "warm-hearted." We speak of people as wearing their "hearts on their sleeves" because they do not (or cannot) conceal their



emotions from others. When someone's words or actions penetrate our souls and affect us profoundly, we say that this person "touched my heart" or "touched the core of my being." The Arabic equivalent for the English word core (which originally in Latin meant heart) is known as lubb, which also refers to the heart, as well as the intellect and the essence of something.

The physical heart, which houses the spiritual heart, beats about 100,000 times a day, pumping two gallons of blood per minute and over 100 gallons per hour. If one were to attempt to carry 100 gallons of water (whose density is lighter than blood) from one place to another, it would be an exhausting task. Yet the human heart does this every hour of every day for an entire lifetime without respite. The vascular system transporting life-giving blood is over 60,000 miles long - more than two times the circumference of the earth. So when we conceive of our blood being pumped throughout our bodies, know that this means that it travels through 60,000 miles of a closed vascular system that connects all the parts of the body – all the vital organs and living tissues – to this incredible heart.

We now know that the heart starts beating before the brain is fully fashioned; that is,

without the benefit of a fully formed central nervous system. The dominant theory states that the central nervous system is what controls the entire human being, with the brain at its center. Yet we also know that the nervous system does not initiate the beat of the heart, but that it is actually self-initiated, or, as we would say, initiated by God. We also know that the heart, should all of its connections to the brain be severed (as they are during a heart transplant), continues to beat.

Many in the West have long proffered that the brain is the center of consciousness. But in traditional Islamic thought – as in other traditions – the heart is viewed as the center of our being. Only recently have we discovered that there are over 40,000 neurons in the heart. In other words, there are cells in the heart that are communicating with the brain. While the brain sends messages to the heart, the heart also sends messages to the brain.

The Prophet of Islam spoke of the heart as a repository of knowledge and a vessel sensitive to the deeds of the body. He said, for example, that wrongdoing irritates the heart. So the heart actually perceives wrong action. In fact, when people do terrible things, the core of their humanity is injured. Fvodor Dostoyevsky expresses brilliantly in Crime and Punishment that the crime itself is the punishment because human beings ultimately have to live with the painful consequences of their deeds. When someone commits a crime, he does so first against his own heart, which then affects the whole human being. The person enters a state of spiritual agitation and often tries to suppress it.

The core value of Integrity is paramount. We as Airman must be accountable for all our actions, whether we feel we are being watched or otherwise. The problems we see in our society come down to covering up or suppressing the symptoms of its troubles.

People work very hard to cut themselves off from their hearts and the natural feelings found there. Air Force values enable us an escape from these woes.

That means the profits from that burger you just purchased from Mission's End, the game you just bowled at the Stars & Strikes Bowling Center, the bucket of balls you just hit at the golf course or even the snow blower you just rented from Outdoor Recreation are all given back to Team Whiteman – to all of us – through the NAF process.

The fact that NAF programs and facilities are designed to be self-supporting – meaning they make enough money to support themselves so no extra money from the wing has to be set aside – makes these initiatives even more beneficial.

Why did you join the military?

I came from a small town with a limited future. I knew from a very early age that I wanted more for myself. In most cases, women who pursued a career in the local area were restricted to nursing, as most job opportunities were in the coal mines. I didn't come from a military background and knew very little about it. I always viewed it as tough and not for the weak so I wanted to be a part of that. I knew the day I entered the Air Force that I was committed to serving a full 20 years.

The United States Air Force is the only branch that has never had a gender-segregated force. How do you think this shapes our heritage?

I think it helps to provide further development and growth within the force. I feel this heritage allows pride for women working in the military and having the opportunity to follow whatever career path they choose.

How do you as a woman in today's military find strength from those women that came before you?

The women before me laid the pathways and set standards. My strength comes from knowing I am capable of meeting and exceeding those standards, and then doing it.

What woman inspires you and why? Marie Curie inspires me because she is a two time Nobel Prize recipient and the first woman ever to receive the award for her work in the discovery of radioactive science, before it was generally accepted for women to work in that profession.

What do you think is the most significant barrier to female leadership?

I believe the most significant barrier is being able to be taken seriously. It is easier for a man in a more male oriented career field to give information or orders and have people listen. For women, it means really knowing the job in and out and gaining the respect of everyone around you by exceeding the standard at all times.

What will be the biggest challenge for the next generation?

Their biggest challenge will be to follow military bearing and customs. A lot of younger people joining the military these days do not hold themselves as high as they need to be, to represent our country appropriately.

What does it take to be a female leader?

It takes pride in what you do, respect for yourself and others around you and a huge desire to be successful.

What do you do "like a girl?"

Everything. I am a girl and what I do is 'like a girl' but not in a derogatory manner. I am proud to do things 'like a girl' because I am a successful and very strong female.

What issues have you faced in a predominantly male-career field? And how did you overcome them?

Fitting in. Women are looked at by men mostly as someone who will need to be helped. I make sure I hold my own weight and know the job better than most of my male counterparts. I am respected and taken seriously.

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Secretary of the Air Force Deborah Lee James kicked off Women's History Month by speaking to attendees during the Center for a New American Security "Women and Leadership in National Security" conference in Washington, D.C., March 4, 2015.

"There's simply no country in the world as widely diverse as the U.S." James said, who was the keynote speaker at the event. "Progress has been made, but we (the Air Force) can

She spoke about the steps the Air Force is taking to strengthen its diversity and inclusion by introducing nine initiatives. James along with Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Mark A. Welsh, III and Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force James A. Cody, signed two memos that were sent out to all Airmen to help guide the Air Force efforts.

Air Force leaders want to ensure the service attracts and retains the most innovative, skillful Airmen possible. "Diversity and inclusion help us become more strategically agile," James said.

The initiatives SecAF discussed were career path tool transformation, diversity and inclusion perspective for development team boards, promotion board memorandum of instruction (MOI), Career Intermission Program, increased female officer applicant pool, Reserve Officer Training Corps rated height screening, identifying high-performing enlisted Airmen for Officer Training School, post pregnancy deployment deferment and the use of panels in civilian hiring.

Airfield ops never stops

While the B-2 Spirit soars through the skies, the 509th Operations Squadron Airfield Management team scans the ground ensuring it taxis, takes off and lands safely. Supervising the airfields is a full-time job, but the airfield management team is always up to the

Pilots can perform their tasks with their minds at ease knowing airfield management has done their part. The airfield management crew files flight plans and posts notices to Airmen (NOTAM) for any discrepancies or limitations on the airfields.

Pilots are notified by the NOTAM site of the conditions of the runway prior to boarding their aircraft. They know the proper speed limitations for their aircraft while inbound, out bound and taxiing.

"Whenever sheets of ice result from freezing rain or snow, we will use the runway condition reading system to tell us how slick the airfield pavement is," said Tech Sgt. John Leach, 509th Operations Support Squadron NCO in charge of airfield management. "This is important because we do not want an aircraft operating on slick payement, chancing any damage or hindrance to the mission. We are looking for numbers that let the aircraft commander know what kind of breaking action he or she needs to do. If we have a low number on ice, he or she will taxi slower so he can stop without hitting anything.'

Along with ensuring runway conditions are serviceable, airfield management scans the skies and runways for wildlife activity to ensure they do not interfere with

Another potential threat to aircraft are bird strikes. Bird strikes are caused when aircraft make contact with large flocks of birds which can result in severe damage.

"With our bird and wildlife aircraft strike hazard (BASH) program, we keep an eye out for any wildlife that trespasses onto the airfield," said Airman 1st Class Cody Nelson, 509th OSS airfield management operations coordinator. "If there are any birds posing a potential flight threat, we manage that by the use of pyro pistols and BASH cannons to ward them off. We use the pyro pistol 150 feet out from where the birds are and fire a pyrotechnic in the air to scare them off."

Airfield management keeps a log of all wildlife spotted on the airfield. They also work with the 509th Civil Engineer Squadron to ensure the grass is maintained between 7-14 inches to prevent birds from nesting and feeding in the area.

"We inspect the airfields daily for factors, such as grass heights and ponding (resulting from rain), that will attract birds or other wildlife," Leach said. "Once we find these attractants, we report them to the CES for mitigation. We work with the United States Department of Agriculture to find new ways from other bases for bird mitigation. For instance, polyvinyl chloride piping or spikes have been put in place throughout hangars where bird nesting occurs."

Airfield management also inspects the airfields for spalls, which are cracks in the ground containing foreign object debris (FOD) capable of causing significant damage. Spalls are caused by erosion, aircraft and management team gets the job done.

The AtHoc system: Keeping you in the loop

Living on or near an installation where inclement weather can develop quickly means base closures or late reporting can become a common occurrence. Take the unpredictability of those emergencies and add to it the chance of an on base emergency or a similar unplanned threat to the installation.

In the event that something unexpected happens, members of Team Whiteman need to be notified immediately. Assisting with that need is the AtHoc system.

AtHoc is a network system that pushes important information out in a timely manner. The system is able to send information through computer notifications, phone calls, text messages and e-mails.

However, if an individual has not ensured their contact information is in the system, the message could never reach them

Here at Whiteman Air Force Base, Mo., it is mandatory for service members to have their contact information stored in the system.

Users are able to include a cell and home phone number and an e-mail address.

"As the direct link to the commander, the Command Post publishes alerts on his behalf to ensure the safety of the base populace as a whole," said Senior Master Sgt. Neftali Nieves, 509th Bomb Wing Command Post superintendent. "That's why it's so important to update your contact information in the system.'

The AtHoc system is a team effort between the 509th Command Post and the 509th Communications Squad-

The CP is the operational core of the system. They are the ones who input the actual messages and alerts that are sent out. When an event occurs that may cause delayed reporting or a base closure, they are the ones who input the information that is pushed out through the notification system. The CS is the backbone of the system, ensuring the program is available to all network users. If a member's work computer doesn't have the AtHoc software installed, the CS are the ones to go to.

However, it is the responsibility of the service member to ensure they have the system installed, and their contact information stored in the database.

Each unit should have someone assigned as the AtHoc representative for their shop.

While it is mandatory for service members to have their information in the system, it is also highly encouraged to include your spouse's contact information as

If you are unsure if you are in the AtHoc system database or have any questions regarding the system, refer to your unit AtHoc representative.

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
