Team Whiteman ‘embracing community and family’ through volunteerism

More than 100 members of Team Whiteman volunteered as part of the United Way Day of Caring, Sept. 29, 2018, in Sedalia, Missouri.

Volunteers helped to renovate a house for use as a shelter for homeless youth and also cleaned several neighborhood blocks, along with setting up tiny food pantries and libraries nearby.

In total, 600 volunteers worked with shared a goal of community improvement – something Whiteman’s Airmen have long been a part of, said Staci Harrison, the executive director with Pettis County United Way.

Range Recognition

“Whiteman has always been a strong partner of ours, especially throughout the Day of Caring,” Harrison said. “This is our fourth annual Day of Caring and it was overwhelming the number of teams that came from Whiteman – 22 percent of the total volunteers at pre-registration.”

The Airmen did not shy away from the dirty jobs and began by removing waste and hazardous items from the house. Most items, including furniture, appliances, carpeting and plumbing were removed before repairs, such as patching the walls, began.

Airman 1st Class Connor Harrington, a pavements equipment apprentice with the 509th Civil Engineer Squadron at Whiteman AFB and also a member of the United Way Day of Caring Council, was one of the volunteers who spent the day transforming an abandoned house into a shelter for homeless youth.

Exceeding Expectations

“The work we all did was like true military fashion – it was fast and efficient,” said Harrington. “We were able to get everything, if not more, accomplished than they wanted. We all were excited and happy about the results.”

Like they do in their respective squadrons, the Airmen volunteers worked together and used their collective military skills to carry out their projects.

Adapt and Overcome

“All of the Airmen I had the chance to speak to seemed to have a good time and were able to get accomplished everything they wanted to accomplish for the day,” Harrison said. “And, for our United Way, it is about embracing community and family – and Whiteman is part of the Pettis County family. We’re so excited that we had the chance to be able to come together as a community and take care of the projects that we did today.”

Firing range opens with STEP promotion of on-target Airman

Members of Team Whiteman attended the grand re-opening of the renovated Combat Arms Training Maintenance indoor range at Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri, Oct. 1, 2018.

A vast improvement to the existing facility, the new 25m qualification range offers a brand-new target retrieval system and air ventilation system to protect practicing shooters and allow non-stop training without time limits. The range now offers 18 lanes, a closed-off observation tower and new PA speaker system – all resulting in better and faster training for Airmen.

While range will serve as reliable training location for security forces, deploying Airmen and other weapons-trained support personnel, the opening event allowed wing leaders to recognize top performers for their contributions to the management and revitalization of the combat arms program.

None were recognized more than then-Staff Sgt. Michael Boutte, the Combat Arms Training and Maintenance NCO in charge, who was surprised by the vice STEP promoted to the rank of technical sergeant.

“It was a complete surprise and one of my biggest accomplishments,” Boutte said. “It was great to see that my leadership showed this kind of recognition for the hard work I’ve done and have my back.”

As the installation’s CATM subject matter expert, he has filled two NCOIC positions, both traditionally reserved for technical sergeants.

In 2016, he was placed as the NCOIC of the Security Forces Armory, where he led nine personnel and 30 flight armorers, ensuring accountability of 3,000 weapons and 225,000 rounds of ammunition.

“I completely love my job,” Boutte said. “We train every Airman at Whiteman and get to meet personnel

from every agency on the installation, including the reserve and guard units. It’s great to have such a large impact on the mission and feel proud of what I do. Our combat arms team is like a family and we take care of each other.”

Boutte also oversaw delivery of the advanced M320 grenade launcher, solved storage limitations, and managed the simultaneous phase-out of aging M203 weapon systems. Additionally, he was selected for the base Police Week shooting team, where his small-arms prowess was evident when the team was recognized as the competition’s “Top Agency.”

“Staff Sgt. Michael Boutte is a prime example of one who has consistently performed their primary duties commensurate with those of a higher rank,” said Senior Master Sgt. Shane Sudman, the 509th Security Forces Squadron superintendent of logistics and resources. “This matched his leadership ability made him the unit’s top choice to fill yet

another technical sergeant position as the NCOIC of Combat Arms.”

Boutte’s ability to innovate was put to the test when the base firing range was shut down without warning for emergency repairs. His direction and networking savvy were critical in developing both on and off-base solutions and sustaining weapon qualifications for 4,000 total-force members at Whiteman AFB.

Lastly, during the range repair project, Boutte was first on-scene to a collapsed steel support structure, where he identified a severely injured contractor. He sprang into action pulling the individual from danger and began rendering first-aid. For his life-saving actions, he was coined by wing commander and the Air Force Global Strike Command command chief.

“Sergeant Boutte is the epitome of an Air Force professional, and more than worthy of a STEP promotion to technical sergeant.” Sudman said.

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Spirit Chapel fosters fun, connection at Stealth Lounge

The lounge is open from 5-9 p.m., Thursdays through Saturdays.

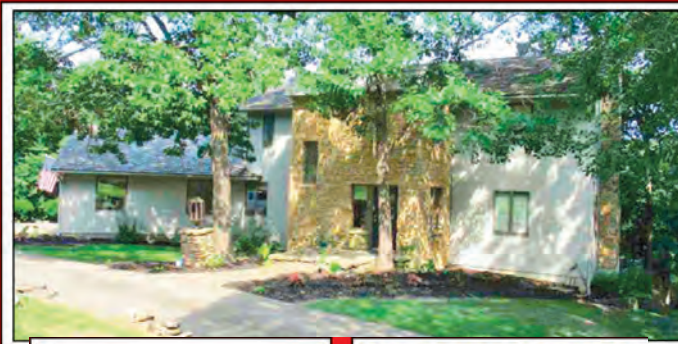
A free dinner is offered on Thursday and Saturday nights, and the Spirit Chapel team also plans to host other social

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First B-2 deployment to Hawaii proves strategic flexibility to ensure free, open Indo-Pacific

JOINT BASE PEARL HARBOR-HICKAM, Hawaii – Three B-2 Spirits and approximately 200 Airmen completed their first deployment to Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam (JBPH-H), Hawaii, in support of the U.S. Strategic Command's Bomber Task Force (BTF) deployment, Aug. 15 - Sept. 27, 2018.

Though bombers regularly rotate throughout the Indo-Pacific, this marked the first deployment of B-2s to JBPH-H.

"The B-2 Spirits' first deployment to JBPH-H highlights its strategic flexibility to project power from anywhere in the world," said Maj. Gen. Stephen Williams, director of air and cyberspace operations, Headquarters Pacific Air Forces. "The B-2s conducted routine air operations and integrated capabilities with key regional partners, which helped ensure a free and open Indo-Pacific. The U.S. routinely and visibly demonstrates commitment to our allies and partners through global employment and integration of our military forces."

Despite the deployment taking place in the middle of hurricane season, the B-2 pilots accomplished hundreds of local and long-duration sorties and regional training. Each mission focused on displaying the bomber's flexible global-strike capability and the United States' commitment to supporting global security.

One of the key integrations involved the B-2s and F-22 Raptors assigned to the 199th Fighter Squadron, a unit of the 154th Wing under the Hawaii Air National Guard. Like the B-2, the F-22 is virtually invisible to threats. This makes them the perfect match for escorting the stealth bomber and providing situational awareness. The training helped polish the cohesion between the pilots.

"The Bomber Task Force is a total-force integration deployment," said Lt. Col. Nicholas Adcock, Air Force Global Strike 393d Bomb Squadron commander. "Our active-duty and guard members worked seamlessly together with their counterparts here in Hawaii to determine the best way for the B-2 to operate from this location in the future."

The 154th Wing also supported the B-2 with the 203d Air Refueling Squadron's KC-135 Stratotankers. Although the B-2 is capable of flying approximately 6,000 miles without refueling, the KC-135s provided aerial refueling for long-duration missions.

"The training with the Hawaii Air National Guard was invaluable," Adcock said. "Together we refined and exercised multiple tactics that are crucial to the Indo-Pacific Command area of responsibility."

In addition to air operations, the deployment also focused on hot-pit refueling. During this technique, the pilots land and continue to run the B-2's engines while fuels distribution technicians refuel the aircraft. The pilots are immediately able to take off again with a full tank and maximize the amount of time they are in the air versus on the ground. One B-2 conducted hot-pit refueling at Wake Island, a coral limestone atoll in the mid-Pacific, west of Honolulu, Sept. 14, 2018.

Finally, weapons load crews exercised loading BDU-50s, inert 500-pound, nonexplosive practice bombs, into B-2 bomb bays on the JBPH-H flightline.

"This weapons load is the first stepping stone to loading live munitions from this location," said Master Sgt. Nicholas Lewis, 393d Aircraft Maintenance Unit weapons section chief. "Furthermore, it provides pilots and load crews valuable training necessary to accomplish future BTF missions."

From air to ground support, the first BTF deployment at Hawaii has allowed each member to determine what it would take to operate the B-2 from JBPH-H and execute strategic deterrence, global strike and combat support at any time.

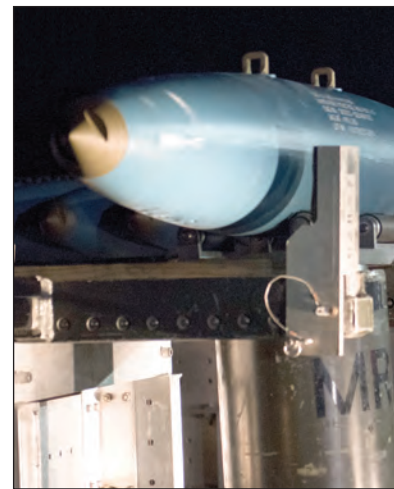
"I am very proud of every Airman who was a member of the 393d Expeditionary Bomb Squadron," Adcock said. "We flew to a forward operating location that the B-2 had never operated out of and overcame numerous challenges."

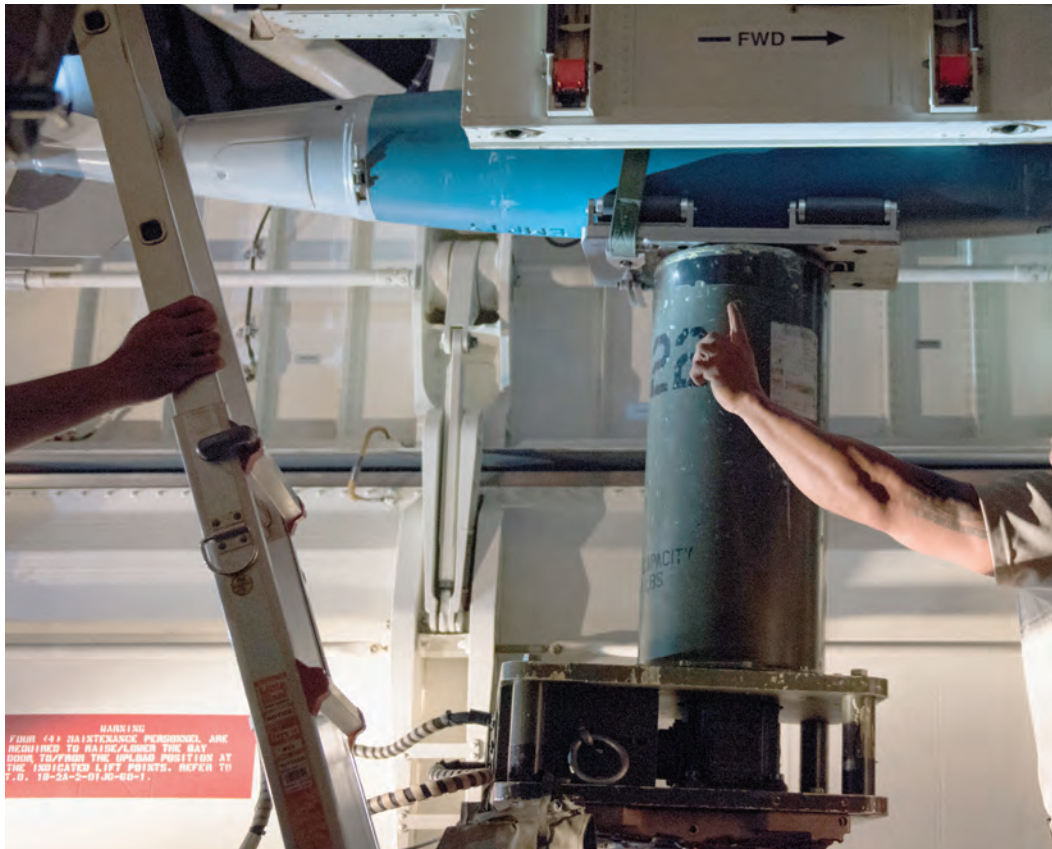

Keeping them safe: Why B-2 pilots don't take their helmets home

JOINT BASE PEARL HARBOR-HICKAM, Hawaii – U.S. Air Force pilots do not take their helmets home – this responsibility lies in the hands of aircrew flight equipment (AFE) technicians.

AFE Airmen are fully qualified personnel who maintain life-sustaining equipment.

“There is a level of professionalism and trust in each other needed to maintain equipment that will potentially save someone’s life,” said Tech. Sgt. Germaine McCall, an aircrew flight equipment NCO in charge with the 509th Operations Support Squadron. “Unwavering focus, attention to detail, training and quality assurance are the keys to a successful AFE program that results in the ability for a downed pilot to come on home.”

Three B-2 Spirit deployed from Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri, to Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawaii, for six weeks in support of the U.S. Strategic Command Bomber Task Force mission. As soon as the pilots arrived and stepped off the aircraft, their five-person Whiteman AFE team was there to greet them.

Before and after every flight, the technicians follow inspection checklists and procedures to the T. For example, the matte-grey aircrew helmets, carried in custom protective carrying bags, are just one item on a list of more than 100 that the Airmen inspect, clean and store.

“Routinely speaking, we equip our aircrew members with their HGU-55/p (fixed-wing) flyers’ helmets, oxygen masks and harnesses, which integrate with the Advanced Concept Ejection Seat parachute system within the aircraft, and any other items that will make their flight safer and more comfortable, if possible,” McCall said.

Once pilots turn in their helmets and survival gear after a flight, the technicians lay out every item on a table. After a thorough inspection, they cleanse the masks and helmets with an approved cleaning solution and disinfect them with 70 percent isopropyl alcohol. Every inch on every item is then carefully checked for cracks, tears and other defects and discrepancies that could cause the gear to malfunction.

“The number one priority for AFE is to ensure aircrew survivability with life sustaining equipment and search and rescue assets, in case of an aircraft emergency egress or escape and evasion scenarios,” McCall said.

Once the team members finish their check, they properly store each item until the next flight or scheduled inspection.

“AFE operations will always follow the flying schedules of the aircraft we support,” McCall said. “Our hours of operation are dictated by the need of the aircrew members, the amount of support and preparation each mission requires, and the inspection and maintenance of life support and survival equipment.”

This is the first time the B-2s and support Airmen have deployed to Hawaii and the AFE team has been closely evaluating their capabilities in the new environment.

“Pilots’ lives depend on using equipment that functions when needed,” said Col. Justin Grieve, commander of the Operations Group at Whiteman AFB and a B-2 pilot. “When I ejected from my aircraft during an emergency in 2008, the equipment provided to me by AFE professionals saved my life. As aviators, every time we put on our oxygen masks, parachutes or any other piece of equipment, there’s no doubt in our minds that it is 100 percent reliable. We have our AFE partners to thank for that.”

Whiteman Fire & Emergency Services encourages fire prevention safety

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Look. Listen. Learn.

509th Civil Engineer Squadron Fire and Emergency Services flight

In a typical home fire, you may have as little as one to two minutes to escape safely from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Knowing how to use that time wisely takes planning and practice.

The Whiteman Fire and Emergency Services flight is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years, to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign: "Look. Listen. Learn - Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere." The goal of the campaign is to educate the public about basic, but essential, ways to quickly and safely escape a home fire.

NFPA statistics show that the number of U.S. home fires has been steadily declining over the past few decades. However, the death rate per 1,000 home fires that are reported to fire departments was 10 percent higher in 2016 than in 1980.

"These numbers show that while we've made significant progress in teaching people how to prevent fires from happening, there's still much more work to do in terms of educating the public about how to protect themselves in the event of one," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of Outreach and Advocacy. "This is particularly critical given the increased speed at which today's home fires grow and spread."

Carli also notes that although people feel safest in their home, it is also the place people are at greatest risk to fire, with four out of five U.S. fire deaths occurring at home. That over-confidence contributes to a complacency toward home escape planning and practice.

"Working in the fire service for many years, we know that people often make choices in fire situations that jeopardize their safety or even cost them their lives," said Master Sgt. Justin Pederson, assistant chief of prevention of the Whiteman Fire and Emergency Services flight. "We need to do a better job of teaching people about the potentially life-saving difference escape planning and practice can make and motivating them to action."

Pederson said this year's "Look. Listen. Learn." campaign highlights three steps people can take to help quickly and safely escape a fire:

Look for places fire could start.

Listen for the sound of the smoke alarm.

Learn two ways out of every room.

While NFPA and the Whiteman Fire and Emergency Services flight are focusing on home fires, these fire safety messages apply to virtually anywhere.

"Situational awareness is a skill people need to use wherever they go," Pederson said. "No matter where you are, look for available exits. If the alarm system sounds, take it seriously and exit the building immediately."

The Whiteman Fire & Emergency Services Flight is hosting a series of events in support of this year's Fire Prevention Week, including events at Whiteman AFB's Base Exchange, Youth Center, elementary school and Commissary, in addition to an on-base parade.

Off-Duty Employment

Oftentimes, active-duty Airmen may choose to seek off-duty employment as a source of supplemental income. However, several factors must be considered before doing so. The first step an Airman must take is to obtain his or her supervisor's recommendation using the AF IMT 3902, Application and Approval for Off-Duty Employment. This form has relevant sources and also documents the approval process. Once the form is completed, the member is approved for off-duty employment.

approve off-duty employment requests. Before an Airman engages in off-duty employment, there is a formal process for obtaining a commander's approval. The first step is to complete an AF IMT 3902, Application and Approval for Off-Duty Employment. This form has relevant sources and also documents the approval process. Once the form is completed, the member is approved for off-duty employment.

A few things are taken into consideration when approving off-duty employment, include: the member's current duty hours, mission requirements and whether the employment opportunity would discredit upon the Air Force. The DoD 5500.07-R, Joint Ethics Regulation, is used to determine whether the potential for ethical issues exist and to ensure that there is no conflict of interest with the Department of Defense or U.S. government. It is up to the member and his or her commander to analyze all aspects of the request when determining whether to

Keep in mind that certain career fields, like medical practitioners, may have additional requirements before they can begin working (see AFI 44-102, Medical Care Management, and MGI 44-18, Off-Duty Employment). In the end, off-duty employment amounts to additional work hours and responsibility. Because of this added responsibility and stress, commanders are charged with the final approval on off-duty employment.

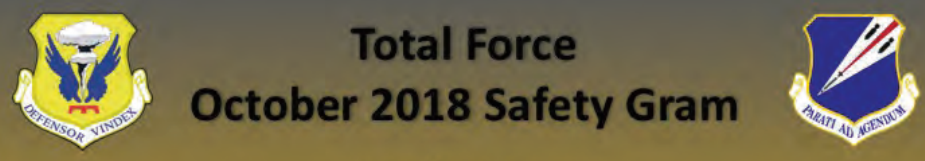

Halloween Safety Tips*

- To keep homes safe for visiting trick-or-treaters, parents should remove from the porch and front yard anything a child could trip over such as garden hoses, toys, bikes and lawn decorations.
- Restrain pets so they do not inadvertently jump on or bite a trick-or-treater.
- Only go to homes with a porch light on and never enter a home or car for a treat.
- Wait until children are home to sort and check treats. Though tampering is rare, a responsible adult should closely examine all treats and throw away any spoiled, unwrapped or suspicious items.
- Plan costumes that are bright and reflective. Make sure that shoes fit well and that costumes are short enough to prevent tripping, entanglement or contact with flame.
- Small children should never carve pumpkins. Children can draw a face with markers and then parents can do the cutting.
- Consider using a flashlight or glow stick instead of a candle to light your pumpkin. If you do use a candle, a votive candle is safest.
