Your oath, your duty, go vote

"I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same ..."

As Servicemembers, we share many bonds, but one peculiar universal bond is the oath we share. We all recite it, are obligated by it, and tasked with carrying out its demands. While certain core demands of our oaths are prescriptive obligations, meaning lawfully enforced, there are several obligations that inure that are not prescribed. One of those obligations, not prescribed, yet imbedded within our oath, is a duty to vote. By voting, we act to support the functioning of the Constitutional design our forefathers envisioned and which we now defend by blood, sweat, tears, and a vote.

Our forefathers became experts in governmental design before drafting our Constitution. Their research took them to antiquity where Polybius, a Roman, argued that a mixed government was most beneficial to society. Polybius characterized three parts to a mixed government: democracy (the people), aristocracy (the nobility), and monarchy (the king). John Adams, in Thoughts on Government in 1776, endorsed the idea of mixed government stating, "there was never a good government in the world, that did not consist of the three simple species of monarchy, aristocracy and democracy."

This idea carried forward into the Constitution itself. To serve the democracy element, the people were given the task of electing the lower house ("The House of Representatives"). To serve the aristocracy element, the Supreme Court would be filled by appointment of the President, and the Senate appointed by state legislatures. Finally, the monarchy element was fulfilled by a single executive to oversee the function of the government.

James Madison, discussing the assignment of functions in the Constitution, stated the essential requirement that the "government [be] derived from the great body of society."

He further stated that as long as certain elements of the government are appointed by the representatives of the people, there is no concern regarding the republic's true standing. Thus, the essentiality of the people in the function of our Constitution was acknowledged both before and after its creation.

How does this create a duty to vote? To truly accomplish a mixed government, the foundation of the Constitutional design, the people must take their role. We, along with our fellow citizens, do this by casting our vote for federal offices every two years. Thus, because we all took an oath that obliges us to support and defend the Constitution, we should take our part in fully ensuring its proper function. We should give support by carrying out a simple yet, hard-fought for, act -- a vote.

MFH finds a caregiver in the community who is willing to take a veteran into their home and provide 24-hour supervision and personal assistance. This care includes everything from meals to medicine, as well as personal attendance. It is not free, but is cheaper than other 24-hour care facilities. The veteran pays money directly to the caregiver, ranging from \$1,200 to \$2,500 a month depending on the level of care. Following dad's footsteps to Iraq

SATHER AIR BASE, Iraq -The apple doesn't fall far from the tree. The saying couldn't be truer in Iraq this past Father's Day half a world away from home for father and son vehicle mechanics. They were able to spend some family time together touring palaces and other sights of the Victory Base Complex.

Senior Master Sgt. CJ Slifko, 447th Expeditionary Logistics Readiness Squadron, vehicle fleet manager, had a tough decision to make toward the end of his six month tour -- whether to approve a waiver on the deployment of his 3-level son, Airman 1st Class Ryan Slifko, a vehicle mechanic, to Iraq.

Slifko should deploy.

"I had 3-levels on the deployment I'm on," the Hubbard, Ohio, native said. "I pretty much took their records and what their supervision said and laid that next to what his supervision said and left it strictly at that, and gave my recommendation to my commander."

Six weeks later, Airman Slifko was on his way to his first deployment, from Whiteman AFB, Mo., only to be met by none other than his dad at the military passenger terminal here.

"It was a good thing and a bad

thing ... everybody knows my dad is here, knows we're father and son, so I'm going to get picked on about it." Airman Slifko said. "I guess it's a good thing because it's a deployed location so it's kind of nice having someone over here right now."

Sergeant Slifko had the same thoughts on meeting his son here, especially on the ribbing he will surely get. He was even approved to stay a few extra weeks to see his son get in.

She was the eyes and ears of forward deployed bases, providing security for the information held within.

She is Airman 1st Class Lindsey Jaxel, 509th Force Support Squadron force management operations member, who deployed for four months to southwest Asia as an escort flight member until late May.

"As an escort, I had to watch thirdcountry nationals anywhere they went on base and everything they did," she said.

Duty ranged from escorting TCNs to a myriad of construction projects to landscaping, sewage removal, grounds cleaning, trash removal and maintenance.

"We had to have constant vigilance in overseeing the TCNs," said Airman Jaxel.

Airman Jaxel had to stay within a 150foot distance of the TCN vehicles and maintain a line-of-sight at all times.

"If a third-country national broke those measurements, we would have to report it to our chain who would then call the Air Force Office of Special Investigations to handle it," she said. "We never had that problem while I was deployed, thankfully."

She said she liked her job, but the 12-hour shifts could become repetitive. Airman Jaxel took the opportunity to volunteer for a group of escorts, the "tango crew," that followed the trash removal TNCs route.

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"We were responsible for not only the normal escort duty, but also watching for suspicious activity and removing operational security violations from the dumpsters prior to the TCNs taking the trash off-base," she said. "The security violations ranged from uniforms being thrown out to papers with social security numbers to folders of missions and flight information."

Airman Jaxel said it wasn't always violations she found while "dumpster diving."

"I found a set of police-like lights," she said. "My team and I drove around with them on our truck. It was a nice break in my routine."

Finding oddities in the trash, Airman Jaxel said, was only one way to enjoy the little things while deployed.

"I was able to explore the downtown area a few times while I was there," she said. "It allowed me to see some of the local culture."

Overall, Airman Jaxel said she enjoyed her deployment, "I would love to go back. I was never bored and there was always something to do."

said. "I was really hesitant about even staying. Just because he is a young Airman, it is his first deployment and I didn't want him to have to listen to, 'your dad this, and your dad that' for the entire deployment. But by the same token, I'm glad I got to see him. I'm looking forward to maybe spending a couple hours with him before I get on the plane out of here when we're both off-duty."

Turning back the clock a little bit, it's really no surprise the younger Slifko followed in his father's footsteps to end up side-by-side with his dad in Iraq. He grew up working on cars with his dad --it was built into him.

"The first time his dad let Ryan and his brother, Christopher, have an old carburetor to play around with, I knew they were going to be just like dad," Mrs. Slifko said. "They were covered with grease and loved every minute of it. Before long they were both asking dad for their own engine to rebuild. At that point I knew I should just learn to live with it."

Cars were in his blood, and he even got a '63 Falcon Station Wagon before he could drive it. He spotted the car for a friend of his dad's when he was 11 years old

"My friend went out and bought it," Sergeant Slifko said, who also has family in Biloxi, Miss. "Ryan had been in love with it ever since. When he turned 14, he actually saved enough money to buy the car back. He's done everything on it himself with a little bit of help."

"We've actually done all of it together," said the younger Slifko. "First thing we did was replace the roof on it. It was rusted pretty bad so we cut the whole roof off of it and put a new roof on it. We went out and bought another car, cut the

roof off of that one and put it on there. We also put a new engine in it."

Airman Slifko likes working on his Falcon because it gives him the opportunity to get his creative juices flowing, where in his job he has to stick to the technical order and everything has to go back to the way it was.

"You never know what happens there, and you can kind of do what you want to it," the Derby, Kan., native said. "If you don't like it, scrap it, do it over again. It's not like here where everything's got to be back how it was. It's kind of nice to be able to do things your own way."

Doing things his own way on cars with his dad was something he loved and with the combination of his whole family being in the military, a bad economy and no luck finding a job, the younger Slifko turned to the Air Force and lucked into his father's career field.

"(It was) sheer luck," said Sergeant Slifko. "When he went to the recruiter, he actually tried to get this job guaranteed, and it didn't work out. He ended up going in open mechanical and he was sure he was going to get it. Sure as anything, four out of the five jobs, I think that they offered him, ended up being in this careerfield. So he got what he wanted "

Airmen Slifko did get what he wanted, which may turn out to be more than something to get by with until the economy picks up. He plans on making a career of the Air Force and he aims to pass his dad, who hopes to make chief and stay in a little longer.

"I'm very proud of him in every way," he said. "It's kind of tough. I have a lot of respect for the fact that he's doing it. It's hard enough to be in our career field. And it has to be really hard on him to have a dad that's a senior that he has to follow around everywhere he goes, but I'm very proud of him."

NEVADA, Mo. –Airmen from the Missouri the 131st Bomb Wing will deploy with about 59 Missouri Army National Guard Soldiers and two other Missouri Air National Guardsmen to Nangarhar Province, Afghanistan.

Senior Master Sgt. Jerry Blankenship, Senior Master Sgt. Stephen Counts and Master Sgt. Robert Weber are currently receiving training at Camp Clark in Nevada, Mo., in preparation for their deployments in leadership roles in support of the fourth Agribusiness Development Team.

The group of Citizen-Soldiers and Airmen come from all over the state and from many different backgrounds to make up the unique team that will facilitate agricultural reconstruction and development in Nangarhar Province.

The team's focus is on irrigation and water issues, energy, education, resource management, value added enterprises, and food safety. The group of Soldiers and Airmen, all volunteers for the mission, will help bring infrastructure to a wide variety of agricultural projects in Afghanistan.

While training at Camp Clark, the Airmen must abide by the same standards to deploy as the Army Guard.

Sergeant Blankenship said the Army training the Airmen are receiving is good even if it consists of very long days.

"I like it," he said about the long days of training. "It's real stuff."

According to him, the Airmen's jobs at their home unit include mostly book work and very little hands-on field training.

Sergeant Blankenship continued to say the maneuvers they were being trained on are very helpful. The battle drills they are doing in the next few days will be beneficial as well.

"This is what you can come across over there," he said.

"They are fitting in extremely well," said Col. Michael Fortune, ADT IV commander. "They are all hard charging guys.

The main difference in this particular deployment is that Sergeant Blankenship is in the noncommissioned officer in charge of all the enlisted members deploying.

Colonel Fortune said that Sergeant Blankenship has exceeded his expectations as a senior noncommissioned officer in charge.

"He has some things to learn, but he is really picking up quickly," the colonel said.

Sergeant Blankenship hasn't been around the Army much so this deployment will be a learning experience.

"It's been really good," he said. "The Army and Air Force are different as night and day."

He said the best and hardest part about the deployment with the Army National Guard is learning the Army ways.

"I'm the first shirt and responsible for the enlisted," Sergeant Blankenship said. "I have to learn their ways. We have become a tight knit group, which promotes teamwork. They help me learn, and I can help them with different views on the matter."

Sergeant Blankenship said his goal as the noncommissioned officer in charge is mentorship. He tries to hand-off tasks to younger enlisted personnel for them to learn since they are the next leaders.

"It's been exciting so far," he said. "It's a great group of follog."

The team will relieve the third Missouri Agri-business Development Team, which is currently in the region, later this summer

Missouri's National Guard pioneered the Agribusiness Development Team model. Missouri became the first National Guard in the nation to deploy this particular type of team in 2007.









Lab techs find what lies beneath

Technicians from the 509th Medical Group laboratory dig deep to ensure military members and dependants are healthy under the skin.

The team of seven technicians performs more than 100 different analyses to help doctors treat their patients.

"If Airmen aren't healthy, they can't complete their missions," said Tech. Sgt. Jason Levine, NCO in charge for the 509th MDG clinical laboratory technician. "If dependants aren't healthy, the Airmen are distracted from the mission because they are worried about their dependants."

Sergeant Levine said the laboratory technicians help about 40 individuals per day. They do this by following a specific sequence of events.

"Once we collect the sample, whether it's blood, urine or another fluid, we prepare it to be analyzed," said Sergeant Levine. "We test it for different illnesses ranging from anemia to cholesterol. Then we send samples to reference laboratories.

Reference laboratories are off-site labs that assist by performing extensive tests that the lab techs are unable to perform on base.

"The reference laboratories then check for thyroids and other illnesses once all the basic routine checkups have been performed," said Sergeant Levine.

Frequently, the well being of an individual lies in the hands of a lab technician.

"Our job can be difficult when 99 out of 100 of or patients are sick and you're the person who's supposed to help them, said Sergeant Levine. "The last thing they want is to be poked with a needle, but it's cool when you do something that you know will help the person become well or help the provider find a way to get them healthy."

The lab technicians don't only help medical providers find out what's wrong with a patient, but they also help the bio environmental unit.


"We have a dual mission," said Sergeant Levine. "We test for biological warfare material. If there is a suspicious package, we can assist our bio environmental department detect things such as anthrax."

Thanks to these behind-the-scenes Airmen, more than 40 patients each day can rest assured they will receive the best care possible.

"We send our patients to the lab frequently," Tech. Sgt. Kenneth Hampton, 509th Medical Operations Squadron family practice medical technician. "They are very timely in getting us results and always have great customer service.

"For us to test and see what's wrong with our patients we need the lab," said Sergeant Hampton. "They can get us just about any tests.

With the lab in the premises we can often have the lab results while the patient is still here," Sergeant Hampton
