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509th BW continues Assurance, Deterrence ... 65 years later

Sixty-five years ago today, in the early hours of the morning, on a tiny island in the northern Mariana Island of Tinian, the sound of four B-29 engines roared to life, signaling the beginning of the nuclear age, and the end of the Second World War.

Lt. Col. Paul W. Tibbets, 509th Composite Group commander, and orchestrator of the operational aspect of the original nuclear enterprise, the Manhattan Project, eased the monstrous-flying fortress named the 'Enola Gay' into the dark sky and began the sortie that would change the world.

Preparation:

The 509th Composite Group, born in secrecy Dec. 17, 1944, was created for the sole purpose of delivering the world's first nuclear weapon. Due to the secret nature of their mission, the group trained at Wendover, Utah, and Tinian Island, in the Pacific, ever-perfecting the performance of the crew and craft.

"What I tried to do, initially, was to train individuals – then weld the individuals into a good, cohesive team to fly this B-29 better than anybody else was flying ... that particular day," said Colonel Tibbets in an interview in 1966. "We were after perfection. I wouldn't settle for anything less than a quarter of a mile of accuracy, and I wouldn't stand for anything less than 20 seconds off on time. This became a challenge ... and you'd be surprised at the pride these boys took in being able to qualify."

The early 509ers rose to meet

these demanding standards without question. Only Colonel Tibbets and a select few over him knew of the nuclear mission.

"I kept telling [the crews] that the work they were doing, even though it might seem non-productive to them at the moment ... because their contemporaries ... were overseas fighting a war and they were still training, ... their contribution would be something that had a good strong chance of ending the war," said Colonel Tibbets. "Now, this was enough to raise their curiosity. It didn't violate any security, and it gave them something to go on.

"... with this type of a training program, I think I produced the best B-29 crews in the 20th Air Force," Colonel Tibbets said.

With a squadron of 15 specially prepared 'Silverplate' B-29s and the best-prepared crews in the Army Air Corps standing by, Colonel Tibbets received orders from the White House to bomb Hiroshima.

The Mission:

"We got going down the runway at 2:15 a.m.," Colonel Tibbets said. "After we got the airplanes in formation, I crawled into the tunnel and went back to tell the men. I said, 'You know what we're doing today? This is an atom bomb we're dropping.' These guys were no idiots. We'd been fiddling 'round with the most peculiar-shaped things we'd ever seen."

Colonel Tibbets and navigator Maj. Theodore van Kirk put the Enola Gay over the designated target at 9:15 a.m. Bombardier, Maj. Tom Ferebee sighted his target, waiting for the perfect moment.

Colonel Tibbets said the Enola

Gay lurched as the 10,000 pound bomb, nicknamed 'Little Boy,' dropped out of the bomb bay. He immediately banked the B-29, having only 40 seconds to put as much distance between the plane and the blast as he could.

In less than a minute, 4.7 square miles of Hiroshima were erased from the earth.

Tailgunner, Staff Sgt. Bob Caron watched the shock wave, which looked like a ring of vapor quickly reaching out from the blast sight, overtake the Enola Gay. According to accelerometers on board, the first shock wave rocked the Enola Gay with 2.5 Gs of force. A second, smaller wave hit a few seconds later.

Colonel Tibbets turned the plane back toward the site, to inspect their handiwork. Having been one of the few to see film of the first nuclear

test in the Trinity explosion, the first nuclear test performed in the desert of New Mexico, Colonel Tibbets said he was still amazed by the decimation.

The Results:

President Harry S. Truman's decision to use the atomic weapons was a difficult one to reach. Germany, one of the original intended recipients of a simultaneous strike, had already folded that spring. The war in the Pacific, however, was still raging. Threats of an invasion had little effect on Japanese leaders.

President Truman was faced with adding to the millions who had lost their lives during the course of the war, or use the most powerful weapon known to mankind in hopes of ending it.

"Sixteen hours ago an American airplane dropped one bomb on Hiroshima," said the president in a

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
Running clinic steps up Airmen's performance


CSAF makes Airmen, families priority

3. Develop and Care for Airmen and their Families

Airmen and their families make us a world-class organization and deserve world-class support. The Secretary and I designated July 2009-July 2010 as the Year of the Air Force Family. Our intent is to find better ways to support, develop, house and educate our Air Force Family so all can be given every opportunity to attain their personal and professional goals even as the Air Force sustains a wartime tempo. To do this, we:

- Continue to expand our efforts to strengthen the resiliency of Airmen and their families before and after deployment.
- Instituted targeted professional military education curricula for officers to enhance nuclear, acquisition and cyber expertise.
- Delivered 5,000 new and renovated homes in 2009, awarded 27 housing privatization projects for 44 bases involving nearly 38,000 homes, and eliminating nearly 35,000 inadequate units.

From the Frontlines: Tech. Sgt. Roberto Ramirez Jr.

Aircraft schedulers are like 'coaches' who decide the lineup for the 'big game'. Instead of players, they draw up a list of aircraft best suited to fly, fight and win! These coaches ensure all maintenance requirements needed to make the aircraft operational are met; if not, the schedulers pull the aircraft from the lineup and send in a replacement.

Without 'coaches' such as Tech Sgt. Roberto Ramirez Jr., NCO in charge of plans and scheduling, aircraft wouldn't meet their customary maintenance rotations.

Sergeant Ramirez was the aircraft maintenance scheduler of multiple aircraft while he was deployed to Joint Air Base Balad, Iraq, from January through June.

"My position gave me oversight of five different airframe schedules," Sergeant Ramirez said. "I worked with the F-16 Fighting Falcon, MC-12W, unmanned aircraft system, C-130 Hercules and HH-60G Pave Hawk."

Sergeant Ramirez said some of his responsibilities included assigning aircraft to the flying schedule that is in monthly, weekly and daily increments; and coordinating with the operations and maintenance group, on issues that may arise.

He scheduled 24 F-16C phase inspections, assigning recuperation of 9,600 flight hours, according to 1st Lt. Anthony V. Tuero, 332nd Expeditionary Maintenance Group, Maintenance Operations Flight Commander.

"Aside from scheduling, I also made sure there were enough aircraft to fly when needed," said Sergeant Ramirez. "It helped the flying mission run smoothly."

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public announcement. "It [was] an atomic bomb. We are now prepared to obliterate more rapidly and completely every productive enterprise the Japanese have above ground in any city. If they do not now accept our terms they may expect a rain of ruin from the air the like of which has never been seen on this earth."

After the strike on Hiroshima, Japan was silent for three days. The 509th Composite Group's "Bock's Car," piloted by Maj. Charles Sweeney, struck Nagasaki, Aug. 9.

In his Aug. 9, 1945, radio address to the nation, Truman gave his reasons: "We have used (the nuclear bomb) in order to shorten the agony of war, in order to save the lives of thousands and thousands of young Americans," he said.

On Aug. 15, 1945, in a radio broadcast, Japan's Emperor Hirohito said that "the enemy has begun to employ a new and most cruel bomb, the power of which to do damage is indeed, incalculable, taking the toll of many innocent lives." Japan formally surrendered aboard the battleship USS Missouri, in Tokyo Bay, Sept. 2, drawing the bloody, six-year war to a close.

Defensor Vindex:

Late in 1945, the 509th Composite Group moved to Roswell Army Air Base, N.M., and was renamed the 509th Bombardment Group, where it became the core of the newly formed Strategic Air Command.

After the Air Force became its own branch on Sept. 18 1947, the 509th BG was assigned to the newly activated 509th Bombardment

Wing at Roswell that November.

CCAF required for career progression

LANGLEY AIR FORCE BASE, Va. – Although having a Community College of the Air Force degree is important for all Airmen, Air Combat Command is encouraging its technical sergeants to achieve this educational goal.

Currently, the command is seven points below the Air Force average of 42 percent, but the goal is to have 50 percent of its technical sergeants degreed before being eligible for promotion to the senior NCO ranks.

"For NCOs and career progression, a CCAF degree is a requirement for senior rater endorsement, and that is a key factor and a weighted factor on the senior master sergeant promotion board," said Chief Master Sgt. Mark Cormier, ACC Public Affairs functional manager.

According to the chief, today's Airmen are better educated, and to be leaders who lead by example, Airmen should have a CCAF degree. That education can help Airmen achieve a special unit job or further their Air Force career.

"Your CCAF degree is essentially free," Chief Cormier said. "Back in the day when I was an Airman, it was 75 percent paid, but now it's 100 percent, so there's no reason not to go to school."

Enrolling is automatic upon completion of basic training, fulfilling the four-semester-hour requirement of physical education.

"CCAF has 67 degree programs in five general areas of study, and you need a minimum of 64 semester hours

to complete your degree," said Alice Jessup, ACC director of education and training.

Additionally, members can earn up to 24 semester hours through their technical school. More credits are awarded when earning five- and seven-skill levels.

Professional military education, comprised of airman leadership school, NCO academy and Air Force Senior NCO Academy provide another six semester hours, fulfilling the leadership and management training requirements.

To accelerate the degree acquisition process, Airmen can go to their education center to earn up to 30 semester hours through CLEP and Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support exams.

"When you talk to a counselor they will tell you what tests apply," Ms. Jessup said. "You schedule and take the test and it's added to your progress report."

Airmen can log onto <http://www.au.af.mil/au/ccaf/index.asp> <<http://www.au.af.mil/au/ccaf/index.asp>> to see the checklist for their career field and visit with a counselor at the education office to develop a plan to complete their CCAF.

"It's important for an Airman to get their CCAF degree because education develops critical thinking skills, and in the Air Force we need Airmen who can see problems and find creative ways to fix them," Chief Cormier said.

Shots for health

We live in a world of germs where viruses and bacteria surround us, and we can't seem to be able to escape these microscopic infectors. Not only do they sicken people, they have the potential to impact the mission and ultimately take a life.

Not to worry though, with the help of the immunization clinic here, Airmen and their families can get the required immunization shots to be healthy.

"Immunizations maximize readiness for our troops, they help give us a little peace of mind by at least not worrying that they will get infected," said Master Sgt. Louis Desomma, 509th Medical Operations Squadron Public Health Clinic NCO in charge.

Vaccines work like a bubble protecting an individual from a specific enemy that's trying to invade. According to Staff Sgt. Adam Whiffen, 509th Medical Operations Support Squadron allergy immunizations technician, vaccines are preventative. They shun away of as many illnesses as possible to avoid any illness from endangering the population.

"If you can prevent an illness before it happens, it's better for the patient's health. For active duty population, it puts off any mission interruptions," Sergeant Whiffen said. "It also lowers medical cost for Whiteman and the Air Force by eliminating the number of people who get sick and need extensive treatment."

Sergeant Whiffen said he not only gives shots, but also does flu lines, reviews shot records for inspections, reviews deployment records, and does mobility lines and no-notice deployments.

"We make sure all of our active-duty individuals are ready to go for deployment with their vaccinations, as well as keep them healthy and safe while they're deployed and stateside," said Sergeant Whiffen. "We protect their families with vaccination while members are deployed, and get children ready for school by keeping them up to date with their shots."

"With this day and age with everyone deploying all over the world as much as we do, we are more prone to

getting illnesses from food, and bugs," said Sergeant Desomma. "We need as much protection as we can."

With the start of school around the corner, it's crucial for children to get their indispensable 'bubbles' such as tetanus shots, MMR, and varicella.

"We maintain our child immunization status to make sure all the children are staying up to date through all their childhood immunizations to make sure they're ready when it comes to school time," said Sergeant Whiffen. "They need their vaccines before they get exposure to viruses."

A returning virus this season is upon us. Every year people who don't get the flu shot suffer from Influenza and expose others, encouraging the spread of the viral menace.

Sergeant Whiffen said he is expecting an Influenza vaccine shipment in September and will start vaccinating shortly after it arrives.

Summer leadership program sharpens youth skills

For many teens, summer months bring on carefree days and study breaks. But for some, warmer days can mean getting involved in extracurricular activities and team building exercises.

Members of the Whiteman Teen Leadership Academy recently returned from a leadership conference in Cincinnati, July 11. There, 10 teenagers, ages 13-18, spent a week learning about leadership skills.

"This year's theme was 'Be Smart, Be Active, Be Giving' and the objective was for teens to experience a leadership

conference with other Boys & Girls Clubs of America from the mid-west region," said Kimberly O'Brien, 509th Force Support Squadron teen coordinator of Whiteman Youth programs.

As part of the leadership conference, the students attended a pre-conference at the University of Central Missouri and listened to professional communicators and keynote speakers before departing for Ohio.

Upon arrival, the students were involved in a plethora of activities which kept them busy during their trip. The students also spent a majority of their week on a community service project for a non-profit organization.

"The teens had the opportunity to pick

two sessions from a list of many workshop choices," said Mrs. O'Brien. "The engagement allowed the students to cultivate their education and broaden their horizons."

The students were able to choose the sessions they wanted to participate in which ranged from: Reserve Officer Training Course, sports in college, chat it up, choices, stop the violence, self-esteem for girls, racism, college admissions and manners.

In addition to the sessions were various speakers such as a county coroner, a comedian and a former police officer.

"The leadership conference helped students learn life skills in self-defense and self esteem, communication and social skills," Mrs. O'Brien said. "This whole

experience was really beneficial for them."

Not only was the experience a valuable one, but the group was unique because they were the only group from a military base according to Mrs. O'Brien.

"Overall, the outcome of the trip was positive," she said. "Our teens were exposed to other teens that lived in the inner-city and they learned what it means to be a leader and how to give back to the community."

The leadership camp was funded by an Air Combat Command grant they received which minimized costs for teens.

Keeping personnel, aircraft safe on the ground

It is commonly accepted that safety is everyone's responsibility. For one 509th operations flight, safety plays a critical role in protecting flightline personnel and assets.

Airfield management specialists from the 509th Operational Support Squadron highlight safety by managing aircraft arrivals and departures, responding to emergencies, and coordinating hazardous cargo.

"Airfield management has a lot of responsibilities as a flight," said Tech. Sgt. Traci Schroeder, 509th OSS acting airfield manager. "We file flight plans for pilots and can also follow the routes of the flight plans. We conduct numerous airfield inspections on a daily basis, ensure the safety of the airfield driving program and post notices to Airmen to alert pilots of any hazards in their flight path.

"We perform an airfield inspection every morning and once an hour throughout the day," she said. "We check for any foreign object debris or equipment that is out of place as well as make sure that drivers entering the airfield complete their tire checks for FOD and adhere to flightline driving regulations."

With a team of 14, one of the most visible airfield management missions is being the primary focal point for all arriving and departing aircraft, including transient aircraft.

"We've processed more than 1,000 flight plans here since January," Sergeant Schroeder said. "We've also logged more than 4,900 aircraft arrivals and departures, including transient aircraft."

Aircraft arriving to and departing from the base must file a flight plan with airfield management, who then logs the information in accordance with local guidelines.

Airfield management coordinates all in-flight and ground emergencies once notified by the air traffic control tower.

"The air traffic control tower uses the primary crash phone to notify us of an in-flight emergency or ground emergency," said Senior Airman James Carson, 509th OSS airfield management shift leader. "We in turn activate the secondary crash phone which allows us to notify numerous agencies at once with all available information. In addition, an airfield manager responds to the area to ensure it is clear and free of any foreign objects or other hazards once the emergency is terminated. Once the area is safe and clear, it is reopened for use."

Since January, airfield management has coordinated emergency response for more than 30 in-flight emergencies and ground emergencies.

They also administer the Bird/Wildlife Aircraft Strike Hazard program bird scares to promote a safe flying environment and conduct braking action tests in the winter to

ensure aircraft have proper traction to stop during inclement weather.

According to the Air Force Safety Center website, the BASH team's goal is the preservation of war-fighting capabilities through the reduction of wildlife hazards to aircraft operations. BASH teams handle anything concerning wildlife and aircraft operations, from hazard advisories to prevention to proper clean-up and collection should an incident occur.

Airfield management also manages the Airfield Driving Program for the 509th Bomb Wing. They oversee Unit Airfield Driving Program managers assigned by each squadron commander. UADPMs are responsible for training and certifying their personnel on airfield driving. The airfield manager or deputy airfield manager trains each UADPM and inspects each squadrons program annually to ensure they remain in compliance with local guidelines.

"We issue all flight line driving tests for everyone who needs to drive on the flightline," Airman Carson said. "We've issued more than 280 flight line driving tests since April."

"With more than 70 aircraft assigned, the mission generates many daily sorties," he said. "It is our job to manage the airfield which enables aircraft to take off and accomplish the mission." Airman Carson said.

"Few Airmen shoulder the amount of responsibility that airfield management Airmen do," said Capt. Donald Roley, 509th OSS Airfield Operations flight commander. "In the course of a normal shift, they could brief the base commander about airfield construction affecting flights, handle an in-flight emergency that involves lives and billion dollar assets and liaise with the Department of Agriculture on the best way to remove a wildlife hazard.

"We require our Airmen to perform at a level that far exceeds their rank and they consistently exceed our expectations," Captain Roley said.

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Running clinic steps up Airmen's performance

A running clinic at the 509th Medical Operations Squadron Health and Wellness Center here was recently held to help individuals increase their run performance both physiologically and mechanically ultimately helping Airmen better achieve the new Air Force fitness standards and for some, achieve better scores on their physical training tests.

"The running clinic educates Airmen on how to run more efficiently, which helps them improve their time on PT tests," said Dr. Nita Hawk, 509th Medical Operations Squadron, Installation Fitness Program manager.

Not only does the clinic help Airmen improve their running technique, it also shows them how to live a healthier lifestyle.

Recently, Nathan Berkley, a 509th MOS health and wellness intern saw a need to do more than hand out a running flyer.

Mr. Berkley said he was curious to see how people coming to the clinic were running. He created the running clinic in order to specifically show them how to improve instead of just telling them what to do

"I tell Airmen why doing a functional warm up is critical, and then I walk them through the warm up and show them how it speeds up their performance time, and prevents injuries," Mr. Berkley said.

"With the new PT standards, people would need to improve their performance in order to do well on the test," said Mr. Berkley.

The running clinic advises runners about the different aspects that contribute to the way they run, aiding improvement. Some factors for running to be taken into consideration are the rotation of the person's foot, posture and shoe selection.

"People usually don't take into consideration all these factors," Mr. Berkley said. "They just go out and buy the cutest shoe they can find and end up messing themselves up. Shoe selection should depend on what support a runner needs and what surface he or she is on."

So far, the clinic has had 97 percent success rate, helping Airmen become better runners and more health conscious.

"The running clinic helped me a lot as far as picking the right shoe and I learned a lot of good information about running," said Airman Menno Gingerich, 509th Operations Support Squadron. "Now, I just have to practice what I learned. I would recommend it to anyone."

The running clinic is available Mondays through Fridays

for anyone with a military ID interested in improving their athletic skills.

"With the running clinic, we can get this knowledge out to the base population more readily and effectively and it will make us more fit to fight," said Mr. Berkley. "Strong Airmen are harder to kill."






