# AFGSC commander visits Team Whiteman

Air Force Global Strike Command's new top leader highlighted the importance of the nuclear deterrence and global strike mission, during a visit here Jan 21.

Lt. Gen. Jim Kowalski emphasized the special trust and responsibility the command has as stewards of the Air Force's strategic forces.

"Nuclear deterrence provides the foundation for strategic stability among major powers by deterring adversaries and assuring allies," said the general.

He highlighted three challenges ahead for the

The first challenge is to consolidate recent successes while continuing to restore a culture that embraces the special trust and responsibility we have as stewards of our nuclear arsenal, the general said.

Second, while pursuing excellence in nuclear deterrence, it is important not to forget the conventional, or non-nuclear, missions in support of ongoing conflicts.

The third challenge is to sustain and enhance the current force, while preparing to meet the challenges of the future, he said.

Toward this end, it is important for Airmen to consider ways to increase productivity, while encouraging a culture of new and innovative ideas, he noted.

"I trust you to get the mission done with the precision and discipline required," he said, while sharing his secret to success.

"Discipline is the single most common characteristic of success--personal discipline and organizational discipline," he said.

'Your wing has had an impressive year," he concluded. "You've had significant achievements. What you do every day is important to our nation, to our Air Force and to each other."

# Which is more important...Competence or character?

Every year as I prepare for promotion I read the Professional Development Guide from cover to cover at least twice. Inevitably, as I'm reading about a particular subject, my mind will wander into a state of self-evaluation and dwell on whether I'm doing it the way the guide recommends. This year was no different; one thing in particular struck a chord with me. The notion of which is more important to being an effective leader, competence or character? The guide states "both are equally important; however, the lack of character will most often be the difference between good leaders and great leaders."

Paul Fussell, an accomplished writer and World War II veteran put it this way: "what if the leader, government-appointed or self-appointed, shouts "Follow me!" and no one does? When do men sometimes follow him, and shout enthusiastically too? Something called "character" must be apparent in the leader." As I read this, I was stopped dead in my tracks and wondered do I have it? When I yell "Follow me!" will my Airmen shout enthusiastically too?

I dissected the next three paragraphs trying to determine whether I possessed the three things that could enhance my character and possibly elevate me from good leader to a great one. Do I possess charisma, compassion and courage?

Charisma is the tricky one; it is defined as a special characteristic of leadership that inspires allegiance and devotion. Most, if not all, Airmen have allegiance and devotion, it's evident by our commitment to the Air Force with its high operations and deployment tempos. But "inspired" allegiance and devotion is what

we want, we want our Airmen to be excited to be here, not just because the Air Force Core Values state they should put "Service Before Self." In no way am I trying to diminish our core values, simply stating there is a tremendous difference in output when our mind set goes from "I have to" to "I want to." So how do we inspire each other and our Airmen? I've always felt that if I had a better understanding of "why" we do something I'm more compelled or inspired to support it. In my experience, most people are no different; they're curious and seek a clearer understanding and meaning of what is expected of them. When they get it they thrive. The tricky parts of being charismatic and the notion of answering "why" are often perceived as contrary to authority and sometimes frowned upon. Finally, when we display disingenuous charisma, our Airmen will pick up on it potentially eroding mission accomplishment. As we open ourselves up to enhance our charisma we often, by proxy, show our compassion.

Compassion, simply stated, is caring. When I first joined the Air Force 22 years ago, I would have never approached my flight chief for fear of getting my butt chewed, not only from him, but from every level of supervision in between. There was a stigma that they were larger than life and not to be bothered with our problems. Over the years I have seen a paradigm shift. I now firmly believe leaders, whether an airman 1st class in charge of a team or a chief, should be approachable, I'm not talking about the "open door policy." It shows that we genuinely care about our Airmen; their interest, hobbies, goals, families, etc... by doing so we enhance our commitment to each other and the mission. However, there is a delicate balance that must be

maintained. You must not become so close to problems that you are unable to give sound advice, or so engaged with subordinates that some may perceive favoritism. Experience and judicious application can and will alleviate some of these concerns.

The final trait of character is courage. As leaders, we must demonstrate courage in the face of adversity and in day-to-day decisions. We cannot afford to be seen as someone who will not stand on the right side of a situation or for them. Our Airmen will see right through us and will never stand behind us. Conversely, if we are seen as the champion of their causes or issues they will walk through hell and back for us. Our courage gives courage to them, helping them maintain composure in stressful situations. Finally, courage may mean having to stand alone, my favorite line in the Chief's Creed illustrates my point best; "Chief's are not ashamed or afraid to stand for the truth when it is unpopular, they can say 'no' with emphasis, although all the world is saying 'yes.'" Do you have the three things needed to enhance your character as a leader? Are you charismatic, compassionate and courageous?

Success is something we all strive for. In fact, in the Profession of Arms, failure can bring with it catastrophic consequences. Being great leaders will enhance our chances of attaining the goal of success. I challenge all leaders in our great Air Force to be; charismatic and inspire our Airmen's allegiance and devotion, be compassionate and care for our Airmen and finally be courageous and stand up for what is right. From the lowest Airmen to the highest General, as we face the Air Force's challenges of today and the future, will you be good or great? When you yell "Follow Me!" will your Airmen shout enthusiastically too?

# Gun Safety: Arm yourself with knowledge

In a fraction of a second, one mistake can change a person's life forever. When it comes to firearms, there is no room for error. Although the rates have steadily decreased over the years, hundreds of people are killed in accidents involving firearms. The majority of these accidents could have been avoided by firearm education and familiarization.

"Weapons safety is not something you learn about or brief to your people once and call it good, it needs to always be stressed due to the nature of our business," said Jerry Osban, 509th Bomb Wing Resource Protection/Crime Prevention Manager. "At any given time, any one of us can be armed and put in place to protect people or equipment or resources the Air Force determines are important. With that said, weapons safety

should go beyond the common sense topics such as don't point your weapon at anyone, never play with a weapon. It should cover gun ownership, and the responsibilities that go with it."

The National Rifle Association offers several simple rules to follow while handling weapons.

# 1. ALWAYS keep the gun pointed in a safe direction.

This is the primary rule of gun safety. A safe direction means that the gun is pointed so that even if it were to go off it would not cause injury or damage. The key to this rule is to control where the muzzle or front end of the barrel is pointed at all times. Common sense dictates the safest direction, depending on different circumstances.

# 2. ALWAYS keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.

When holding a gun, rest your finger on the trigger guard or along the side of the gun. Until you are actually ready to fire, do not touch the trigger.

# 3. ALWAYS keep the gun unloaded until ready to use.

Whenever you pick up a gun, immediately engage the safety device if possible, and, if the gun has a magazine, remove it before opening the action and looking into the chamber(s) which should be clear of ammunition. If you do not know how to open the action or inspect the chamber(s), leave the gun alone and get help from someone who does.

The NRA also stresses knowledge. Shooters must have an intimate knowledge of their weapon, their environment, their target, and what surrounds the target.

1. Know your target and what is beyond. Think first, shoot second. The shooter must not only correctly identify his or her target,

# Whiteman BCC highlights local community: Columbia

Whiteman has maintained a relationship with surrounding communities since it was the Sedalia Army Air Field in 1943, but over the past 20 years, the relationship between this base and local communities has improved. The Base Community Council, a group of more than 350 people representing 18 local communities, meets here once a month to reinforce this relationship.

"This council consists of representatives from the local area and is chartered to support Air Force Global Strike Command servicemembers from Whiteman," said Jesse Kellock, BCC president. "Working alongside the military is a wonderful opportunity for civilian BCC members to work toward mutual interests."

The Base Community Council objectives include: Identifying common interests of the civilian and military populations and supporting community efforts of mutual concern; getting full base- and community- leader participation to solve problems of mutual interest; increasing civilian understanding of the Air Force mission; giving continuity to the community relations program.

This diverse group of business, religious and educational professionals contributes to a large number of events and community planning. Each community is assigned a liaison squadron from Whiteman, and members of that unit participate in a wide range of events

Specific communities are featured each meeting, highlighting their outreach programs and concerns. The next BCC meeting is scheduled for Thursday and will feature Columbia, Mo.

"Columbia was founded in 1820, a community based on higher education, health care and insurance," said Donald Laird, Columbia Chamber of Commerce president. "It is one of the fastest growing communities in the state in employment opportunities."

"Columbia is the fifth-largest city in Missouri, and the largest city in Mid-Missouri," said Lt. Col. Mike Pyburn, 110th BS Commander and unit liaison for Columbia. "As the home of the University of Missouri, it ranks as the thirteenth most highly educated municipality in the United States and is an education focal point for the state of Missouri with Stephens College and Columbia College also located within city limits."

Columbia and Whiteman offer each other vital resources, Columbia with its education and community support and Whiteman with its national defense assets.

"Whiteman plays a critical role in the defense structure of our nation," said Mr. Laird. "It is important that we have an awareness of what's happening at Whiteman and how it fits in the bigger picture. We are fortunate to have a facility as such so close to our community."

The dormitory was upgraded to comply with current Air Force standards, according to Staff Sgt. Russell Kiser, 509th Civil Engineer Squadron NCO in charge unaccompanied housing.

Atlantis Hall and Endeavour Hall are next in line to receive the same changes in 2011 and 2012 respectively.

"I hope that the residents can see the amount of money and time that is being focused on the quality of life for single Airmen at the dorms," he said. "We are doing everything possible to ensure that the dorms are current, safe and state of the art.

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

# 1st Lt. Tom Meltzer

More than 6,000 miles from this Air Force Global Strike Command base, 1st Lt. Tom Meltzer, 509th Operations Group target intelligence, was called to serve his first deployment at Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan.

Lieutenant Meltzer departed Whiteman May 2010 for six-months and trained at the 186th Refueling Wing Air National Guard, in Meridian, Miss., for four weeks, where he learned rudimentary details about his deployed duties before returning to Whiteman.

"I trained for intelligence support for the MC-12W aircraft, which are both in Iraq and Afghanistan," said Lieutenant Meltzer. "I learned about the aircraft, its capabilities and how to provide support."

The MC-12W Liberty is a medium- to low-altitude, twin-engine turboprop aircraft. The primary mission is providing intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance, to directly support ground forces.

'The current air tasking order process which the military uses to plan the war does not allow for the flexibility needed by the ground force commander when fighting an unconventional war," he said. "Therefore, we would coordinate directly with the supported units to ensure mission specific objectives were communicated hours before the aircraft would take off."

We would put together mission information of target plans, mission objectives, and schemes of maneuver to enhance crew member's situational awareness in order to better support the warfigther on the ground."

During his day-to-day duties, he briefed air crews members before flights; two pilots, one a sensor operator and a cryptologic operator, and informed them of specific mission requirements.

'We monitored the mission and bridged gaps," he said. "After the pilots landed we followed up by providing feedback and an evaluation of the situation. It was a learning process for everyone involved."

"My deployment was rewarding," said



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




2. Be familiar with the weapon so you can operate it safely. Know where the safety is, how to insert and retract ammunition from the weapon, and how the weapon operates.

3. Be sure the weapon is safe to operate. Regular cleaning and maintenance of your weapon is paramount to the safety of all those around you when shooting.

- 4. Use only the correct ammunition for your weapon. If you aren't sure what ammunition goes in your firearm, go back to step one and familiarize yourself with your weapon.
- 5. Store guns so they are not accessible to unauthorized persons. When guns fall into the hands of persons not familiar with gun safety, the probability of an accident goes up considerably.

Staff Sgt. Kyle Westendorf, 509th Combat Arms Training and Maintenance instructor, said the majority of issues he sees at the range are instances when people stop paying attention to where their barrel is pointing while reloading or adjusting their gear.

"I had a student pull the trigger on an M9 handgun while the weapon was still in the holster," Sergeant Westendorf said. "The round exited out the bottom of the holster, hit the concrete by the student's foot and split into two pieces. One section of the round safely exited out toward the range. The other section came back in the direction of the instructor working the firing

line and he was hit in the back of the neck by some of the bullet fragments."

The first and most important rule of firearm safety is to keep the muzzle/bar-rel pointed in a safe direction weather the weapon is loaded or not, said Brian A. Tripp, 509th Safety Office chief of weapons safety.

"The difference between an accidental discharge of a fire arm and a tragedy is generally the direction it was pointed when the bullet leaves the barrel," Mr. Tripp said. "If the firearm is pointed in a safe direction it's an embarrassment, if it's pointed at yourself or others, it's a fatality."

While an inherently dangerous sport, shooting can be a very enjoyable experience as long as all who are involved handle their weapons properly, said Senior Airman James A. O'Kelly, 509th Operations Support Squadron unit deployment manager and weapons enthusiast.

"First and foremost, people need to understand that firearm safety is not derived from less guns, nor a fear of guns," Airman O'Kelly said. "Firearm safety starts with having respect for the weapon. Understand what its purpose is and the capabilities and responsibilities entailed with weapon ownership."
