## Assistant Secretary of Defense visits Team Whiteman

The top defense official charged with defending the nation from nuclear, chemical and biological threats visited Whiteman Air Force Base this week to observe the Airmen responsible for maintaining and protecting America's credible nuclear deterrent.

Andrew C. Weber, Assistant Secretary of Defense for Nuclear, Chemical and Biological Defense Programs, met with Airmen, received a B-2 mission orientation and watched a portion of a security forces' exercise on the flightline.

"Deterrence, which our national security and that of our allies depends on, is mostly based on credibility," Secretary Weber said. "Our potential adversaries, be they North Korea or Iran, watch what you do here on the ground at Whiteman, because how you perform your day-to-day mission in the nuclear area really signals to the rest of the world how credible our deterrent is.

"Some people say we never use nuclear weapons," he added. "The truth is we use nuclear weapons every day to keep the world safe and to prevent countries like North Korea from doing us or our allies harm."

During his visit, the secretary sat down with bomb wing broadcasters to talk about some issues affecting Team Whiteman, including the nuclear mission, the New START Treaty and the realignment of munitions squadrons under Global Strike Command.

The reason for his visit was very simple, the secretary said.

"I wanted to meet the Airmen and let them know how vital the nuclear mission [they perform] is to our country," he said. "On behalf of Secretary Gates and President Obama, it's important that we let the Airmen understand the context they work in and how much we rely on what they do day-to-day to maintain a safe, secure and effective nuclear arsenal."

The secretary also addressed the importance of the New START Treaty, which was one of the Obama Administration's top foreign policy priorities and which was ratified by the Senate last year. In addition to reducing the number of

strategic nuclear missile launchers by half, the treaty also established a protocol for continued inspection and verification of Russian and American strategic assets such as long-range bombers.

The new treaty "allowed us to begin inspections back and forth; Russian inspectors coming here to the U.S. and our inspectors who work for the Defense Threat Reduction Agency visiting your counterparts in the Russian Federation," he said, speaking to Whiteman Airmen. "What this gives us is stability and predictability in the nuclear relationship with Russia, and allows us to verify that they are indeed making the reductions called for in the New START Treaty."

Secretary Weber also addressed the realignment of munitions squadrons from Air Force Materiel Command to Global Strike Command.

"As Global Strike Command went into full operational capability, it's only natural that its responsibilities would ramp up over time," he said. "Transferring the munitions squadrons to that chain of command is a natural next step as Global Strike Command matures."

Not all nuclear, chemical or biological threats can be solved purely through deterrence, the secretary noted. One of his most pressing concerns is that non-state actors such as al Qaeda might acquire weapons of mass destruction.

"As President Obama has stressed, and as was made clear in the nuclear posture review released last year, what we worry about most is the potential for nuclear terrorism," he said. "It's non-state actors like al Qaeda and its affiliates getting their hands on the most dangerous kinds of weapons that we worry about, because they're the ones using force, using violence to target civilians and Americans abroad and our soldiers on a daily basis."

Brig. Gen. Scott Vander Hamm, 509th Bomb Wing commander, expressed his appreciation for the secretary's visit.

"Secretary Weber's visit was an opportunity to demonstrate the outstanding professionalism of our Airmen," he said. "As the senior defense official charged with defending our nation from nuclear, chemical or biological threats, he recognizes that the deterrent mission performed here every day by our Airmen is a key part of our nation's security."

# Leadership: It's all in the definition

According to Webster's online dictionary, a manager is defined as a person who conducts business or household affairs or also a person who directs a team or athlete.

While that certainly applies in many workplaces and baseball fields across the nation, there are limitations on how that covers our role in the military. In fact, even Webster's acknowledges the difference, stating that a leader is a person who directs a military force or unit and has commanding authority or influence.

Let's take a closer look at that definition. The first part is fairly straightforward. Regardless of your rank as an officer, non-commission officer or civilian, somewhere along the way you have demonstrated the core competency to direct a military force or unit.

You have learned the processes and requirements for your organization to succeed, and you are now being entrusted with the reins to continue in that light.

The second portion of the definition is where the hard part lies.

Unfortunately, in just my relatively short time in the Air Force, I've witnessed a decline in what I would consider "commanding authority or influence."

I believe one of the easiest ways to measure leadership is one's ability to make a

decision, and that invaluable trait seems to be slipping.

How many times have you seen more time spent in discussing two alternatives, both of which would eventually lead to a desired outcome, than it would have taken to just pick one and go? All too often, the task could have been accomplished by the time a decision is made on which way to go about it. That's not to say that decisions should be made hastily, but the time spent analyzing options should be proportional to the associated risks, if any, of choosing one course of action over another.

Another aspect of leadership that would appear to be in decline over the last several years is creativity in finding more efficient ways of doing business. Even as we face a rapidly changing world, we seem to be stuck in that miserable rut of "that's how we've always done it."

I will acknowledge that our guiding instructions are on a trend that takes away much of our ability to be innovative. We simply must, however, continue to look at every aspect of our operations within our local control for redundant and unproductive processes that in the end offer no gain to our efficiency or combat lethality.

Leaders should constantly seek ideas from their teams on how to maximize force. If deemed appropriate, they should then do everything within their



authority to enable the execution of those changes. That provides a culture for creative thought, and will keep the wheels turning for further improvements to come. We are continually asked to do more with less, so please continue to search for creative and efficient ways to maximize our effectiveness with what we have. Listen to your folks and take a close look around, you may be surprised at the improvements we can make locally, and still be plenty compliant with Air Force and Major Command directives. And remember, a mid-course correction to a plan is not an admission of a poor plan, or a sign of weakness...it's our job as leaders!

# Are we growing the best Airmen?

I recently attended what is likely to be the last professional military education of my career, the Air Force Chiefs' Leadership Course. A lot of information was covered over the 10 day class but to me, two messages stood out.

One was an assurance that I and the other 200-plus chiefs and chief selects in attendance had not arrived. In other words,

we had not achieved the highest rank in the Air Force to relish in the accomplishment as if we had crossed the finish line of a marathon. Our roles as chief master sergeants had just begun and it was a humbling responsibility.

The second message goes hand-in-hand with the first: the responsibility to grow our replacements, to leave the Air Force in capable hands when our time is up. Of course these lessons aren't only for Chiefs. Throughout my career, at every rank, I have strived to meet these goals and I believe most of the Airmen I know have done the same. The problem is that sometimes we lose focus and have to cross check ourselves. We must ask ourselves, are we meeting the responsibilities of our rank to the best of our ability? Are we doing the very best we can to grow our replacements? Are you?

This is not cosmic, nor as I said before, something that applies only to Chief Master Sergeants. Every capable Airman has the same responsibility; it is part of being good supervisors, wingman and team builders. There is no rank that affords the luxury of sitting back with the attitude that you've reached a resting point. You may have reached the top of a summit but instead of sitting on your laurels to rest, reach back and pull your Airmen up with you, even as you work to conquer the next

peak. This applies to every Airman in every position. Airmen that possess greater levels of experience and knowledge should pass that experience and knowledge on.

Sometimes the challenges we face in today's Air Force make growing our Airmen difficult. A busy inspection schedule and high ops tempo, along with limited manning, resources and time are some of these challenges. Often we fail to grow the Airmen that need the most attention because, let's face it, growing Airmen takes a lot of effort. It's convenient and saves



time to rely on our go-to experts. Doing this will quickly get the desired outcome but in the long run it hurts the Airmen in the organization.

The ones who are consistently tasked can get burnt out. The ones who are never chosen or grown will never reach their full potential. That is why, despite the challenges, we must persevere. It is vitally important to accomplishing the Air Force mission of the future that we take the time today to develop our Airmen.

As I begin my journey as a Chief Master Sergeant in the U.S. Air Force, many of the Airmen who have played pivotal roles in my career are retiring. I am thankful for their guidance, leadership and for setting the example by demonstrating a commitment to serve and develop their Airmen, no matter what. They did this at every position they served in, at every rank, and when many of them reached the rank of Chief Master Sergeant it was not the culmination of a career, it was another beginning...the beginning of growing the next generation of chiefs while getting the mission done.

No matter what rank you are, I recommend taking the time on a regular basis to evaluate how well you are developing your Airmen.

Are you doing the best you can?

# Whiteman member's IDEA saves AF thousands

William George, 509th Logistics Readiness Squadron vehicle repair and inspection technician, was presented \$10,000 May 2 for his submission to the Innovative Development through Employee Awareness program here.

IDEA has encouraged Airmen to think critically since 1998 and makes innovative ideas available to benefit the Air Force.

The Team Whiteman and Air Force Global Strike Command member was awarded for creating a run-flat tool to remove Bearcat tires, saving the Air Force thousands of dollars yearly.

"It was a surprise to me," said Mr. George. "I had never thought about turning my idea into the program, but I decided 'why not' and it worked out for me."

Mr. George said the check was a nice bonus, but it wasn't about the money; he built the tool to improve a broken process in his shop.

"The Bearcats for Security Forces use a run-flat inside the tire," Mr. George said. "When we tried to change the first tire we contacted the manufacturer, who shipped us two 1/2 inch steel rods and a small piece of plumber's strap bolted together. The idea was to squeeze the run flat together with the rods and align the bolt hole to secure the run flat.

"We attempted this but could not get it to work with their tool," he added. "My co-worker and I attempted this for three hours before we quit. We contacted three other bases and Global Strike Command

for guidance on replacing these tires, who all recommended replacing the whole tire as an assembly - tire, run flat and wheel."

Mr. George didn't like the answer he was getting, so he requested a price quote on the tire and wheel assembly. The cost: \$2,643 each. He checked the price of just the tire locally which was \$285 each.

With his previous mechanic experience, Mr. George said he knew he could design a tool and use a wrench to remove the tire more easily and for less money. He built the tool to bring the 2-piece run flat together, align the attaching holes

and insert the lock-bolt in place, which allows him to change a tire in less than 30 minutes now.

"Using my run-flat tool we are saving approximately four-and-a-half man-hours per tire by making the tire replacement a one-person 30-minute task," Mr. George said. "We have mounted more than 60 new tires in the last six months saving the Air Force more than \$100,000 and 200 labor-hours."

The tool has proven its efficiency and has been sent to multiple Air Force bases for use on their Bearcats armored vehicles.

The PRP Clinic is closed on weekends and at 12 p.m. the second Wednesday of each month for medical readiness training, federal holidays and wing down days.

# EOD memorial ceremony honors 15 fallen heroes

**EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (AFNS)** -- "We assemble here today to remember the sacrifice of (explosive ordnance disposal) technicians and comfort their loved ones left behind."

With those words, Navy Capt. Adam Guziewicz, the Naval School EOD commander, welcomed almost 3,000 people to the 42nd annual memorial service honoring EOD technicians past and present.

Fifteen names of EOD technicians from the various services killed last year were added to the EOD Memorial Wall, bringing the total of technicians killed in combat since World War II to 269.

Numerous dignitaries from all services attended the event, including Marine Gen. James F. Amos, the Marine Corps commandant. General Amos spoke directly to the families of the fallen.

"I'm humbled to walk among you this morning and share in this unique opportunity to commemorate and honor our EOD warriors," he said. "Each one is a genuine American hero and a national treasure."

General Amos spoke about the camaraderie in the EOD community and the great sacrifices each technician is willing to make. He reminded those in attendance that every

technician, regardless of service, begins his or her career as a student at the school which stands across from the memorial. Platoons from each service stood watch during the ceremony.

"The four services stand together in one place at one memorial forever honoring their heroes in the common mission they all were a part of," General Amos said. "This one wall represents a single team fighting together. No individual whose name is inscribed stood alone nor did they fall alone."

The general reminded those present that EOD operations continue today in both Afghanistan and Iraq, missions which are saving lives.

"You move toward danger while others flee, you create access on the battlefield, you clear compounds, you permit movement down dusty roads and ultimately you make an area safe for the people who live there," he said.

EOD Chief Demetrius O'Halloran, who is currently an instructor at the school, remembered his friend, EOD technician Tony Randolph. Chief O'Halloran said the two were together for about a year before he left for Iraq. EOD Tech Randolph remained in Afghanistan where he was killed in 2009.

"It was just devastating when it's one of your buddies," Chief O'Halloran said. "You never forget them or get over it and you

don't want to get over it. I look back on the good times we had when we did operations together."

General Amos promised the families they would not be forgotten. He said the nation's

responsibilities do not end at the gravesite.

"We owe each of you our debt of gratitude. We are honor bound to keep. You embody all that is honorable and good about the American spirit."

# Whiteman AFB April 2011 Article 15s, UCMJ Actions, Discharges

In April, four members were punished under Article 15, Uniform Code of Military Justice, and one member has been administratively separated from the Air Force.

## Article 15s

□ An airman first class from the 509th Security Forces Squadron received an Article 15 for drunken driving. # Servicemembers come together for Lambert Base clean-up effort

SAINT LOUIS -- 131st Bomb Wing personnel currently stationed at Lambert Air National Guard Base are pulling together to clean up and return the base to good working order after the April 22 category EF-4 tornado touched down and severely damaged many of the buildings located on the South side of the facility. The Lambert ANGB houses most of the 131st Bomb Wing's Mission Support Group and tenant units while the 131st BW headquarters, Operations Group, Maintenance Group and some Mission Support and Medical Groups personnel are stationed at Whiteman AFB.

A 131st Emergency Operations Center initiated plans to restore operations to the base shortly after the storm's passing. The 131st

Communications Flight created a plan to ensure base infrastructures were operational. The building that houses the 131st CF received minimal damage and was able to stand up the EOC temporarily until power on the north side was restored. Communications also coordinated efforts and assets with the 131st's Financial Management team to ensure that servicemembers would receive their pay on time.

Lt. Col. Mark Bradley, 131st Cyber Operations Officer, said that they created a workable plan and course of action and moved on it.

More than 150 Guard members were on hand to move salvageable resources to the unaffected north side of the base and assist in the recovery effort.

The 131st BW's Headquarters received the brunt of the storm. It was home to many critical services on the facility, including the 131st Medical Group. Critical records and medical equipment were moved as soon as possible

due to the increasingly unsafe conditions in the building.

The 131st MDG rose to the occasion with some members taking time off from their civilian jobs to aide in the recovery effort.

"I couldn't enjoy my day off knowing that everyone else was giving up their free time," said Senior Airman Emily Opfer, 131st MDG. "I'm happy to help."

Members of the 131st from all over the region provided assistance. Master Sgt. Bill Austin, 131st Logistical Readiness Supply Superintendent at Whiteman AFB, was among those who came to Lambert's aid.

Sergeant Austin drove 200 miles to assist with the contents of a storage facility that had been damaged by the storm, personally transported the cargo back to Whiteman, and returned to Lambert to further assist his Squadron in their moving to the North Side of the base.

Chief Master Sgt. Thomas Fowler, 131st

LRS chief of supply, said Sergeant Austin's expertise shows a true 131st BW Airmen spirit to help where most needed at this time and his knowledge in logistics will help us recover quickly.

Members of the 131st BW gathered in Hangar 1 at Lambert Field to celebrate their hard work and share a few laughs May 1. Members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2866 provided the Wing with food for their celebration, and despite the circumstance, the mood was optimistic and hopeful.

"We have been working extremely hard from when the tornado hit to now and will into future times," said Master Sgt. Mary-Dale Amison, 131st Bomb Wing public affairs superintendent and base photographer. "I was here Friday night shortly after the tornado hit and have reported each day after with my fellow Guardsmen, Marines and Sailors. We've truly pulled together as a military family. We're going to be ok."

## AF lodging officials announce new payment procedures

SAN ANTONIO (AFNS) -- As part of the Air Force's recent implementation of the new Citibank controlled spend account travel cards, funding for lodging costs will be pre-loaded on the card once authorization is approved in the Defense Travel System.

As a result of the CSA travel card implementation, Air Force Inns guests paying with the new CSA travel card will be charged the total room charges up to a long-term stay of 30 days upon check-in. Guests staying longer than 30 days will have their credit card charged on day 31 to

cover previous miscellaneous charges and room charges to cover up to another 30 day stay.

According to Capt. Bruce Staufer, the chief of lodging at the Air Force Services Agency, the new payment procedure will help avoid card declines for insufficient funds and ensure lodging officials capture the funds authorized for the traveler's lodging stay.

"Previously, all travelers were charged for their stay upon checkout or every 15 days for long-term guests, whichever came first," Captain Staufer said. "There al-

ways was the opportunity to pay up front at the guests' discretion, but no requirement. With the change to the new CSA card for official travelers, only funds for authorized travel expenses are loaded on a traveler's card."

An added benefit to this new procedure is speedier check-out times. The elimination of the need to preauthorize charges means guests don't have to return at the end of their stay to pay the bill, Captain Staufer said.

## Air Force Investigations agency recruiting NCOs as special agents

The Air Force Office of Special Investigations is the Air Force agency responsible for investigating major crimes and works against terrorist and foreign intelligence efforts. It is also constantly seeking exceptional non-commissioned officers for duty as enlisted special agents.

With more than 2,700 members, AFOSI has been the Air Force's major investigative service since August 1948. It provides criminal investigations and counterintelligence services to commanders of all Air Force organizations. To do that consistently well, AFOSI must constantly replenish its agent force and its primary source of new agents is the active duty enlisted force.

"Airmen from all career fields in the Air Force can join AFOSI and bring something to the fight," said Special Agent Angelina Montecalvo, Superintendent of the Applicant Processing Branch at Headquarters AFOSI. "We are constantly seeking top quality Airmen to join our team by retraining into OSI."

"The standards are high and it's tough to make the cut, but we know there are many good Airmen who meet the standards and would make great agents," said Chief Master Sgt. John Fine, Headquarters AFOSI command chief.

Chief Fine retrained into AFOSI 23 years ago from the Security Forces career field and said his career as a special agent has been very exciting and tremendously rewarding.

According to Agent Montecalvo, AFOSI's primary recruiting focus is on staff sergeants with five-10 years in service, technical sergeants with less than 1 year in

grade, and top quality senior airman who are eligible to retrain.

"We will consider others who don't fall within those parameters, but that's our primary target group," said Agent Montecalvo.

Once approved for retraining, all new special agent candidates attend training at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center in Glynco, Ga. The candidates must complete both the 11-week Criminal Investigator Training Program and seven weeks of AFOSI-specific coursework. Both courses offer training in weapons use, forensics, surveillance and surveillance detection, antiterrorism techniques, crime scene processing, interrogations and other topics.

After successful completion of a 1-year probationary period, some agents receive specialist training in economic crime, anti-terrorism service, counterintelligence, computer crimes and other sophisticated criminal investigative capabilities. Others attend 12-weeks of training to acquire skills in electronic, photographic and other technical surveillance countermeasures.

"Besides being inquisitive and able to interact with a variety of different personality types, agents must be able to take initiative and be detached enough to handle the possible shock in criminal investigations," said Agent Patrick Ervin.




