# **USSTRATCOM Commander talks deterrence at Whiteman**

Gen. C. Robert Kehler, commander of U.S. Strategic Command at Offutt Air Force Base, Neb., visited Team Whiteman Friday and spoke about deterrence and the role Airmen here play in America's national security strategy.

The general, who is responsible for plans and operations for all U.S. forces conducting strategic deterrence around the world, was at the central Missouri bomber base to meet with 509th Bomb Wing leadership and the Airmen who operate the B-2 Spirit. The radar-evading plane is part of the bomber leg of the nuclear triad, and along with missiles and submarines provides a powerful deterrent force to nations that might wish America harm.

"Our ability to perform the kind of missions the 509th performs around the world, most recently in Libya, while at the same time maintaining the capability to be a nuclear deterrent is really the tremendous value the bomber force has today," General Kehler said, referring to the ability of the B-2 to conduct both conventional strike missions such as in Libya and Iraq, while also playing a role in our nation's nuclear triad.

The realignment of the Air Force's nuclear enterprise under Global Strike Command, returning deterrence to a place of prominence in the Department of Defense, has been a positive development for Strategic Command and the nation as a whole, the general said.

"I think that all the steps the Air Force took to enhance the nuclear enterprise have benefited us," he said. "It makes our nuclear force ultimately more safe, secure and effective, and that's Strategic Command's #1 priority: to make sure that we have a safe, secure and effective nuclear deterrent."

The bulk of the general's comments, however, focused on what he called the "entire range" of capabilities the U.S. military can use as a deterrent or bring to bear against its enemies. This spectrum of force extends from

nuclear weapons at the highest end to cyber-warfare and information operations on the non-kinetic side, he said.

"There is tremendous deterrent value with our conventional capabilities," he said. "There is deterrent value with our space capabilities and there's deterrent value with our cyber capabilities."

This wide range of strategic capabilities allows the U.S. to effectively deter nation states with nuclear capabilities while simultaneously engaging in conflicts against non-state actors such as al Qaeda, he added.

"There's a recognition that deterrence is about more than nuclear weapons," he said. "We've been given a number of responsibilities that go far beyond that: space, cyberspace and global strike, which includes conventional

Team Hurlburt has already lost two Airmen in preventable traffic-related mishaps in just the past few months. With summer travel plans taking shape and tourists flocking to our beaches, we know our exposure to risk will only increase in the weeks ahead.

For those who wonder why summer is such a critical time, try this approach.

If someone asked, "What's one thing you want to do before the end of summer?" How would you respond? Think about it for a second.

Your answer could range from: travel to see family and friends, go to the beach, play golf, hike, swim, go whitewater rafting, go jet skiing, ride a bike or any number of things.



In reality, the activities we participate in today are almost limitless, and each one involves some degree of risk, but I wonder if you would answer, "I want to live."

Sound strange? Maybe a little, but think about it-it encompasses everything you'll do this summer. It's about living through the summer with fond memories of family, friends and good times. This is much preferred to stories of scars, ambulance rides, hospital beds, or funeral homes.

Unfortunately, we know there is a good chance summer will bring injuries and some will be serious. We hope not, but hoping is not enough to prevent a mishap.

Last summer marked the first time in

three years the 1st Special Operations Wing didn't experience a fatality during the summer--this was a great achievement. But even with our success, a number of Airmen across the Air Force lost their lives in preventable mishaps; their families and friends didn't enjoy last summer as we did.

This is where safety plays a part. We must look beyond that first glance to better recognize risk and plan summer events accordingly. Remain alert to hazards and focus on the task at hand.

When with fellow Airmen, be a good wingman. It takes courage, but when the opportunity comes up, a wingman won't hesitate to take action above and beyond what is normally expected to keep someone else safe-even though it might seem unpopular at the time.

We are all familiar with the saying "work hard, play hard." And as we gear up for the summer, I want to thank everyone for the hard work they do every day. There is nothing wrong with playing hard either, as long as it's not an excuse for taking foolish risks.

In other words: don't do something dumb.

The 101 Critical Days of Summer is an opportunity to travel, enjoy time off, relax and have fun, but one of the best things you can do this summer is stay alive!


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# **BCC reinforces civilian-military bond**

A formation of T-38 jets roared overhead in the "missing man" formation, with one breaking out and climbing vertically, to close Saturday's 23rd Memorial Wreath Laying Ceremony May 21 at the Memorial Park Cemetery in Sedalia Mo

The ceremony honored 2nd Lt. George A. Whiteman, the Sedalia native and Smith Cotton High School graduate who was one of the first Americans killed in World War II and was posthumously awarded many commendations for his heroism and bravery. Lieutenant Whiteman died Dec. 7, 1941, as he at-

tempted to take off in his P-40B Warhawk aircraft during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

Air Force.'

The legacy of Lieutenant Whiteman would continue when the Sedalia Air Field was renamed in his honor as Whiteman Air Force Base Dec. 3, 1955.

"I believe Lieutenant Whiteman would be so proud to know how wonderful the relationship is between the community he grew up in and the Airmen, Soldiers and Sailors at the military installation just down the road that was named in his honor," said Lt. Col. Kenneth G. O'Neil, 509th Security Forces Squadron commander and Air Force Global Strike Command member.

Members of Lieutenant Whiteman's family laid a memorial wreath on his gravesite before members of a Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2591 detail fired three volleys of shots.

> "It is his legacy and spirit that we honor and remember him on this day," Colonel O'Neil said. "We are thankful for Lieutenant Whiteman for that fighting spirit he demonstrated and how that spirit resounded through evolution of our Air Force."

> In addition, David Rouchka, member of the Military Affairs Committee said, "Freedom has a

price. Freedom doesn't just happen. You have to nurture it and work for it and there are certain individuals who make the ultimate sacrifice to maintain the freedoms we enjoy today."

Airmen from the 509th SFS, Smith-Cotton High School Junior Reserve Officer Training Corp and members from the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2591 were in formation as part of tradition.

Next year's memorial service is scheduled for May 19, 2012.

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

# Airman takes the plunge with U.S. Army Sappers

Senior Airman Estiven Gonzalez, 509th Operations Support Squadron survival, evasion, resistance and escape specialist, joined the 35th Engineer Battalion Sapper Leader Course May 17 and 18 at Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., to jump from a UH-60M Black Hawk helicopter

SERE specialists teach aircrew everything they need to know to survive any environment, which could help them on missions and in the event their aircraft went down. To effectively train other Airmen on how to exit an aircraft while still flying and to maintain his own currency as a certified jumpmaster, Airman Gonzalez took to the skies with the Soldiers of the 35th Engineer Battalion.

Prior to a jump, all must be briefed and authorized to carry out the particular jump and ensure they are properly equipped. Airmen Gonzalez and the Sappers conducted a brief and jump rehearsals 24 hours before boarding their aircraft.

Day one started with the 35th Engineer Battalion recertifying jump statuses. The Soldiers and Airman Gonzalez packed parachutes, practiced exiting an aircraft and parachute control, and briefed a jump plan, which included positions and the drop zone. After hours of refreshing on techniques, the day ended.

Day two brought a focus on safety. Airman Gonzalez and the Sappers performed checks on each others' equipment to ensure proper assembly. Once a jump master had quality checked their gear, the jumpers boarded the Black Hawk.

The jumpers released at 15,000 feet, waited six seconds until their parachute deployed and guided themselves safely to the ground. Thirty jumpers went up and 30 jumpers landed safely.

kinetic and non-kinetic planning." The sum of those capabilities is what enables Strategic Command to deter attacks, and if deterrence fails, to defend against attacks, he said.

While he oversees command and control of the nation's most powerful weapons, the general said he is most concerned with taking care of the men and women who volunteered to serve.

"What keeps me up at night is whether we are adequately taking care of the magnificent young men and women who choose to serve with us," he said. "There is no operational issue that keeps me awake at night, and the reason is that the operations are in the hands of experts like you at the 509th."




