Vanden Haak competed against 485 firefighters and finished the course in 1.33.17. Vanden Haak is assigned to the 509th Civil Engineer Squadron, Fire Protection Flight at Whiteman Air Force Base, Mo.

"I followed in my father Henry Vanden Haak's footsteps, who's a civilian chief firefighter in Oak Harbor, Wash.," said Vanden Haak. "I felt it was in my blood to give back to my community while striving for perfection in everything I do."

The firefighter combat challenge requires maximum effort in minimal time as it simulates the exertion needed to fight a fire and rescue a victim on a timed course. Air Force fire fighters competed against their peers from Australia, Canada, Europe and the United States.

# Vintage plane takes Whiteman Airmen back in time

A piece of the 13th Bomb Squadron's history paid a visit to Whiteman Air Force Base Dec. 2, as an A-26 attack bomber in the Battle of the Bulge was flown in.

Roger Woolsey, chief executive officer of Million Air, a private aviation company, made the 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-hour flight from Houston in the aircraft early that morning. He said A-26 Bombers had the longest service in the military, being used in World War II, Korea and Vietnam, and they were not retired until the early 1970s.

Woolsey said the A-26 he brought to Whiteman AFB had served in the Pacific and Atlantic theaters in World War II and in Korea. "I'll use any excuse to take it onto a base," he said, adding that his purpose is to keep the heritage of the aircraft alive.

Lt. Col. Mark Pye, 13th Bomb Squadron commander, said the aircraft is "a living testament to the sacrifices and great strength of those who went before us.

"The A-26 is in the middle of the 95-year history of the 13th," he said. "We are proud to see a historic piece of 13th and the Air Force."

Pye said having the A-26 on base presented "a unique opportunity for younger guys involved with the B-2" -- the stealth bomber that calls Whiteman home

Maj. Tim Sutton, 13th BS B-2 pilot, climbed into the cockpit of the A-26 said it i

s hard to compare it with the B-2. He said in the A-26 there were no ejection seats, one seat was from an old tractor, the cabin is not pressurized and it has no heater.

"That's hard because even in summer, it can get to freezing at altitude," Sutton said. "In fact," Woolsey said of his Friday morning flight: "The last 100 miles or so, it got kind of cold."

Sutton said many Airmen were interested in checking out the A-26.

"We envy the good old days of flying," he said, adding that operating one would be like going to a cabin in the woods with no TV or computer access compared with flying the high-tech B-2.

"Still, a lot of guys here are dying to fly this," Sutton said.

According to the 509th Bomb Wing History Office, the 13th BS flew the A-26 from 1945 to 1956. Also, when North Korea invaded South Korea in 1950, the squadron, flying A- and B-26s, conducted interdiction missions during daylight raids on enemy troops and lines.

Pye said the A-26 was converted to the B-26 and was the primary aircraft used in Korea. He said it was an eye-opening experience to see what the squadron forefathers used to overcome the enemy.

Woolsey takes the aircraft to bases and air shows across the country, making between 35 and 40 appearances a year. His goal is to keep the A-26's memory alive for those who flew her and those she helped save, he said.

Speaking of those with ties to the aircraft who come out to see it at air shows, Woolsey said: "You can spot them by tears, the reverence they exhibit. They will say, 'My father, my uncle flew one of these or was saved by one of these.""

Friday was the first time he brought the plane to Whiteman.

"It means a lot because it is part of their heritage," he said.

While calling the aircraft very reliable - it only had two minor mechanical issues during the entire 2011 air show season - Woolsey said it does not have one notable issue.

'She does drink a lot of oil," he said. "As we like to say, 'You fill her with oil and check the fuel.""

# Warrensburg, Whiteman remember Pearl Harbor

WARRENSBURG, Mo.-- Col. Andrew Gebara, 509th Bomb Wing vice commander, was the keynote speaker at a ceremony outside the Johnson County Courthouse Thursday to help remember the attack on Pearl Harbor. Local civic organizations, elected officials and members of Team Whiteman attended the Remembering Pearl Harbor 70th Event.

Exactly 70 years ago Thursday, America unexpectedly entered World War II during a surprise attack by the Imperial Japanese Navy on Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. Six Japanese aircraft carriers launched more than 300 fighters, bombers and torpedo planes against the American fleet anchored in the harbor. More than 2,400 Americans were killed, including the man for whom Whiteman Air Force Base would later be named.

Local civic organizations, elected officials and members of Team Whiteman helped remember the attack during a ceremony outside the Johnson County Courthouse Thursday. Col. Andrew Gebara, 509th Bomb Wing vice commander, was the keynote speaker.

"Pearl Harbor, the 9/11 of the twentieth

century, was an unmitigated disaster for the United States," Gebara said. "Before the day was over, the Japanese killed 2,402 Americans, wounded 1,282 more, and sank or damaged 16 ships and 188 aircraft – just in Hawaii."

The disaster was felt by all Americans, the colonel said, but it hit especially hard for one family in Central Missouri, who waited desperately for word of their son, George Allison Whiteman, a young Army Air Forces pilot stationed at Bellows Field near Pearl Harbor.

Whiteman, the eldest of ten children of John and Earlie Whiteman, was born Oct. 12, 1919, at the Wilkerson farm near Long-wood, Mo., in Pettis County. He graduated from Smith-Cotton High School in Sedalia and attended the Rolla School of Mines in Rolla, Mo., prior to enlisting in the service in 1939.

In the spring of 1940, Whiteman received orders to report to Randolph Field, Texas, for training as an aviator. He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Army Air Corps Nov. 15, 1940, and volunteered for duty in Hawaii early the following year.

As the sun rose over Oahu on the morning of Sunday, Dec. 7, 1941, the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor began. Lieutenant Whiteman got to his P-40B aircraft at Bellows Field and had just lifted off the runway when a burst of enemy gunfire hit his cockpit, wounding him and throwing the plane out of control. The plane crashed and burned just off the end of the runway. "At a time when the sky was full of enemy aircraft—353 to be exact—George Whiteman, without thought to his own safety, ran TO his aircraft," Gebara said. "At a time when I'm sure most others were taking cover, Whiteman coolly got to his fighter, started it, taxied it out, and took off in the middle of what he had to know was one of the biggest targets in the raid—the Bellows runway. He moved forward, despite the fact that he had to know he was going to almost certain death."

The news of Lieutenant Whiteman's death reached his family at 10:13 p.m. Dec. 7. In an interview with the Sedalia Democrat that evening, his mother, Earlie Whiteman, said: "It's hard to believe. It might have happened anytime, anywhere. We've got to sacrifice loved ones if we want to win this war." She gave the reporter a photograph of her son sitting in an aircraft with the inscription "Lucky, lucky me."

Lieutenant Whiteman is believed to be one of the first Airmen killed during the assault which marked the United States' entry into World War II. For his gallantry that day, he was posthumously awarded the Silver Star, the Purple Heart, the American Defense Medal with a Foreign Service clasp, the American Campaign Medal, the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign medal with one bronze star, and the World War II Victory Medal.

Another honor waited for Lt. Whiteman when, 14 years later, the newly reopened Sedalia Air Force Base was renamed Whiteman Air Force Base in his honor.

"You have a choice to make your life better no matter where you come from," she said. "I know the military isn't for everyone but the fact people join the Air Force means something attracted them to join."

Rodriguez encouraged Airmen to do the best they can while they are in and take advantage of the opportunities, so if they do decide to get out they can transition into the civilian world more prepared than they were when they came in.

"Try to at least get your associate degree done and learn as much as you can from your career," she said. "You never know how it can benefit you down the line."
