High year of tenure changes take effect in 2013

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO - RANDOLPH, Texas (AFNS) -- High year of tenure changes announced in December will go into effect in September 2013, Air Force Personnel Center officials reminded affected Airmen on Aug. 16.

Changes will affect senior airmen, staff sergeants and technical sergeants, said Lt. Col. Tara White, AFPC retirements and separations chief, who explained that high year of tenure refers to the maximum number of years enlisted Airmen in each grade may remain on active duty.

In 2003, HYT was adjusted upward to retain experienced Airmen during a robust economic era. In 2010, the Air Force began the process to normalize HYT, reducing senior airman, technical sergeant, master sergeant and senior master sergeant levels. In December 2011, the Air Force announced that HYT would continue to be adjusted beginning in 2013

Beginning in 2013, high year of tenure limits for senior airmen will be reduced from 10 years to eight years; staff sergeant 20 years to 15 years; and technical sergeant 22 years to 20 years.

As a result of HYT, AFPC cancelled some assignments, but those cancellations have no effect on promotion eligibility, White said. Airmen who are otherwise eligible to test for promotion will be able to test during the next cycle.

Although Airmen affected may be selected for promotion before they reach HYT, assignments are selected in most cases between 15 and 18

months in advance, and Airmen must have retainability at the time of selection to ensure a last-minute assignment decision isn't necessary.

"Normalizing HYT helps develop and maintain the right balance of experience in the Air Force," said White. "The future of the Air Force depends on balance in numbers, ranks, experience levels and career fields, so HYT is one way we can achieve that."

Command Post: more than just the Giant Voice

Have you ever wondered what the command post's function is on a day to day basis? For starters, there is far more to it than simply taking phone calls and making announcements on the base giant voice system. The command post on every installation performs a unique function for the wing, and the roles and responsibilities of command post controllers vary greatly. These functions, as well as personnel assigned, are dependent on the MAJCOM, assets assigned, and mission.

Regardless of those things, the basics of a command post controller's responsibilities are the same: command and control. The command post's role in support of C2 is to alert, direct and report and is the wing commander's focal point for carrying out C2 of the assigned forces of the wing, in day-to-day operations, contingencies, all the way through times of war.

The command post can be compared to the human brain, which operates as the center of emotion and thinking, and as the brain works and sends out impulses, other organs respond. In a like manner, the command post is essentially the nerve center for the wing's operation. As it works, support agencies respond by carrying out assigned

tasks in support of the wing's mission. The mission here at Whiteman is a unique one as it encompasses both a conventional and nuclear role, which brings with it additional responsibilities for everyone, to include command post controllers.

In particular, the Nuclear C2 mission, better known as NC2, requires every controller to be thoroughly familiar with the actions directed by CJCS and USSTRAT-COM Emergency Action Procedures. These procedures allow for an assurance to USSTRATCOM that the required actions will be taken within minimal preset times for employment of assigned weapon systems. All of these actions are tracked and reported by command post controllers using NC2 systems to report to Higher Headquarters, keeping the decision makers aware of the status of resources and assets required to protect our nation's interests.

Prior to controllers being certified, there is a rigorous 120-day training schedule which immerses them in CJCS and USSTRATCOM Emergency Action Procedures as well as local operating procedures.

These procedures center largely around NC2 actions in the execution phases of Emergency War Orders and the direction of C2 actions supporting Emergency Plans, Operations Orders, Operations Plans, relaying NC2 instructions for the launch, execution diversion recall recovery recycle.

and reconstitution of forces. Once all training is complete, each controller is required to have a personal interview with the Wing Commander for certification and is certified only after they have demonstrated their ability to carry out their assigned responsibilities.

On any given day command post controllers receive, process, and take action on emergency action messages affecting assigned forces. These messages may direct actions allowing for security posturing, placing our forces in the best position to survive an attack and then respond in kind.

Additionally, a major portion of daily duties involves coordinating with internal and external agencies for the wing's flying activities and any other activity affecting resources and personnel.

Because of the command post's involvement in every aspect of the wing's mission, one can see why it is absolutely imperative that accurate, timely, and relative information is provided each and every time.

The wing commander has an awesome responsibility over his assigned forces, and the command post plays an integral role in helping him carry out those duties.

As the wing commander's executive C2 agent, the command post is vital to the operation of the wing and a critical component for nuclear deterrence and global power for the United States of America

In keeping with the values of individual responsibility for mission success, and respect for the worth and dignity of every Airman, Air Force Global Strike Command recently selected an airman with the 509th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron as its nominee for the 2012 General Lew Allen Jr. Trophy.

Senior Master Sgt. Gregory Bicknell, 13th Aircraft Maintenance Unit Aircraft Section Superintendent, is one of two AGFSC nominees for the award, which honors the accomplishments of a baselevel officer and senior NCO in aircraft, munitions or missile maintenance directly involved in aircraft sortie generation. This is the first time Bicknell has been nominated for this award

"This is very humbling to say the least," he said. "I want my wife, Nikki, and my two girls, Rylee and Karmen, to know I appreciate their support always and love them dearly for it.

"As aircraft section superintendent, I get the privilege to work alongside phenomenal maintainers on a daily basis. Without them, we would have an aircraft ramp full of extremely cool planes that can't fly and then there would be no mission. As to where my particular job fits into the overall AFGSC mission, I would say right between 'equip them to succeed' and 'trust the experts."

Bicknell said that while he is excited about his nomination and recognition, he has an even greater appreciation for the

Airmen who keep the mission going.

"When a B-2 launches, does a stadium fly over, or performs in an air show, most spectators are impressed with the aircraft itself. However, if they only knew the dedicated efforts of the Airmen that made it happen, I believe they would have even greater gratitude for what is done behind the scenes. I know I do."

Bicknell also added that no matter what, Airmen should always strive to do their best, because someone is recognizing their efforts every day, regardless of whether they are good, bad, or indiffer-

"I want [Airmen] to know that if they are truly working hard and bringing a positive attitude to work on a daily basis, someone is already recognizing their efforts, whether they realize it or not. Whiteman offers In-Service Recruiting opportunities

Many Airmen find themselves questioning whether serving as Active Duty Air Force is right for them. And in this question, the decision to part from the military can be a difficult one.

The In-Service Recruiting Program makes this decision easier, allowing Active Duty service members to transition to a part-time military role in the Air National Guard.

In 1998, the ISR program was implemented with only three Air National Guard in-service recruiters. More than a decade later, the program has more than 20 recruiters responsible for multiple territories across the globe.

One of those ANG in-service recruiters, Master Sgt. Stephen Agnelli, is now located in the 509th Bomb Wing building. His goal is to assist Active Duty Airmen with transitioning to more than 140 Air Guard units in the United States, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Virgin Islands through the Palace Chase and Palace Front programs.

Palace Chase allows eligible Air Force members to honorably exit the Air Force early and serve part time in the Air Guard Service members must have half their commitment served before being eligible to apply to Palace Chase. Palace Front allows a seamless transition into a part-time military position with the Air Guard, with no break in military service.

Each individual has their reason(s) for the transition, and Agnelli suggest the following reasons why Active Duty Airmen may want to join the Air Guard:

1. Airmen may be looking for geographical stability or want to remain in one permanent

area.

- 2. Airmen may want to focus on school and attend it full time while serving part time Guard.
- 3. Airmen may miss their family, and the Guard can find them a slot close to home.
- 4. Airmen may have been turned down for Active Duty cross training. The Guard may

have an opening for the career field of choice.

According to Agnelli, service members will most likely be able to retain their current rank, and their previous military time will transfer with them, counting toward their retirement.

Air National Guard Airmen receive a monthly paycheck for their work. They are re-

quired to perform one weekend per month and accomplished 15 days of annual training per year. They can also take advantage of benefits including Service Members Group Life Insurance, health and dental coverage.

Much of the behind-the-scenes work in Force Support Squadrons goes into ensuring the quality of life for Airmen. The FSS mission is streamlined across the Air Force to enhance readiness and promote esprit de corps at home and abroad.

While serving as the 386th Expeditionary Force Support Squadron sustainment services flight commander, Capt. Amanda Patton dedicated her efforts to help serve more than 4,000 personnel in Southwest Asia. The 509th Force Support Squadron military personnel section chief returned June 12, from her six-month deployment.

Her responsibilities included ensuring the base populace had access to food, water and lodging. She also oversaw the fitness center, sports operations, linens, and crisis and humanitarian response.

"We offered fitness programs because it was important that the Airmen had an outlet and spent time exercising," Patton said. "The programs were designed to help Airmen meet fitness standards. We also held monthly 5K runs to boost morale."

Another area Patton worked on was ensuring rations were stocked, water was distributed and power continued services.

"I dealt with a lot of power outages," she said. "It got really hot when it was more than 100 degrees, which created frustration; we handled the issues to the best of our ability for our Airmen."

Another challenge in her position was han-

dling a customs strike because a lot of their food products came from outside the border.

"The food strike took about a week to resolve

but service sustained uninterrupted," Patton said.
While Patton was faced with trials, she said

what she gained overall was a positive experience she will never forget. "It was a real learning experience," she said. "I

was also fortunate enough to work alongside and be deployed with some of the best people I have ever met."

In addition to her duties, she also volunteered;

with the company-grade officer council, and base clean-up. She also had the opportunity to work with the honor guard detail at a dining-in function.

According to her deployed supervisor, Lt. Col. Heather Meyer, Chief, Manpower, Personnel and Services, Office of Legislative Liaison for the Secretary of the Air Force, said it was not uncommon for Patton to lend a hand and be one of the first ones to step up in any given situation.

"Captain Patton was an incredible leader at our deployed location," Meyer said. "She was able to quickly galvanize Airmen from five different locations into a hard charging team providing top notch services underpinning the 386th AEW's mission success. Meanwhile, she was an informal leader for the Airmen from Whiteman during the deployment; she's a real unifier."

Although Patton's deployment was notable, she said she missed her family, friends and her puppy, Baxter.

"I don't think any other deployment could live up to this one, but of course I would go again," Patton said. **Advertisements**

WARNING: Side effects may include resilience, stamina, improved Fitness Assessment scores, mental clarity, energy, self-confidence and much more interesting Friday nights.

This is the warning that individuals should heed when they enroll in the Better Body, Better Life class. The new class kicked off July 17 at the Whiteman Health and Wellness Center, and is a new innovative weight management course being offered across the Air Force.

The five-week class is designed to help individuals seeking to lose and maintain their weight by helping participants identify personal goals along with a way and making behavioral changes to meet those goals.

The course is open to everyone and is especially targeted to those Airmen who fail their fitness test due to abdominal circumference.

The program is broken up into modules, to be delivered consecutively, and designed to be flexible, and fluid to allow participants to enter the program at any time, as each module stands independently.

Each module has a nutrition, physical activity and behavior change section with topics such as portion sizes, dining out, sleep, meal planning, plateaus and dealing with slips and stress.

The class stresses a more hands-on and real life application, which reduced the typical 'death by Power-Point' class many people are familiar with.

The class is facilitated by the HAWC's registered

dietitian and discusses nutrition, physical activity and behavior change. The class also discusses how foods and physical activity effect genders differently when it comes to weight loss.

Prior to the first class, each participant must complete an Air Force pre-class assessment, a three-day food record, preferably to include one weekend day, and register at www.myfitnesspal.com to self-assess caloric levels.

Participants must also arrive early to have their official weigh-in, height and abdominal circumference taken prior to beginning the program.

Participants can enter the revolving series of classes at any time. No need to wait for a new round to begin.

Air Force Ball set for Sept. 8

In celebration of the U.S. Air Force's 65th anniversary, Team Whiteman is hosting the Air Force Ball Sept. 8 at the University of Central Missouri Ballroom. The event will also commemorate the 70th anniversary of Whiteman Air Force Base.

An annual service-wide tradition, the Air Force Ball celebrates the heritage and history of the Air Force. The Department of the Air Force was created when President Harry S. Truman signed the National Security Act of 1947. It became effective Sept. 18, 1947, when Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson administered the oath of office to the first secretary of the Air Force, W. Stuart Symington, a position filled by presidential appointment.

Under the Department of Defense Reorganization Act of 1958, the departments of Army, Navy and Air Force were eliminated from the chain of operational command. Commanders of unified and specified commands became responsible to the president and the secretary of defense through the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

The act redefined the functions of the military departments to those of essentially organizing, training, equipping and supporting combat forces for the unified and specified commands. Each military department retained resource management of its service.

This year's event will also honor Whiteman AFB's 70th

During the spring of 1942, the massive buildup for World War II prompted the U.S. Army to search for a site near Sedalia, MO, as a glider training base. Among the areas considered were the state fairgrounds and a site in neighboring Dresden. The Sedalia Gilder Base was eventually located on an area known to locals as the "Blue Flats" located outside Knob Noster

The base reached its first major milestone on Aug. 6, 1942, when the Army declared the field officially open as the Sedalia Army Air Field. On Dec. 3, 1955, Sedalia Air Force Base was renamed



Whiteman Air Force Base in tribute 2nd Lt George Whiteman, Air Corp, U. S.

Whiteman lost his life Dec. 7, 1941, while he was attempting to take off o defend Bellows Air Field, Oahu, Hawaii, during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. He is believed to be one of the first Airmen killed during the assault which marked the United States' entry into World War II.

The keynote speaker for the event is Gen. William Fraser III, Commander, United States Transportation Command.




