Local WWII Hero Speaks to Whiteman Pilots

The local chapter of Daedalians, a national fraternal order of military pilots, hosted a local World War II hero, Kenneth "Wayne" Thomason, at Mission's End for a luncheon, providing pilots, past and present, a venue for sharing camaraderie and Army Air Corps heritage and tradition.

Following lunch at the Club, Thomason took the gathering back into the combat days of flying his single-seat, radial-engine P-47 Thunderbolt II ground-attack fighter, regaling fellow aviators with tales of when "gladiators" took to the skies with more than just fierce determination and pride, but also a healthy

sense of humor mixed with courage.

During his combat aerial patrols and escorts over the skies of Italy, Thomason recorded five enemy aircraft destroyed on one mission the day before Christmas. For his outstanding service on this mission, he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

He also recounted bailing out of a stricken P-39 into waters off the coast of Corsica, exercising the use of his life-saving "silk chute," and becoming a life-long member of the Caterpillar Club.

Those able enough to attend and participate in this exciting discussion of historic air power were happy to see that aviation enthusiasm and the thirst for patriotism has been passed throughout

the generations. General Thomas Bussiere, 509th Bomb Wing commander, as well as several squadron commanders in attendance, recognized Thomason's service and sacrifice, presenting him with both personal and unit coins.

After the luncheon, Thomason also took the opportunity to climb into an hour-long simulator to show how a real "stick-and-rudder" fighter pilot would fly the B-2 Spirit.

Patriots like Wayne Thomason, from diverse days of American air power, are yet one more example of the greatness of America's fighting forces.

2013 Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH) Rate Protection

BAH rates for 2013 for E1-E5 and O1 members at Whiteman AFB will decrease between 0.5% and 2.0% from 2012 rates. DFAS will automatically provide rate protection to the affected members.

BAH Rate Protection is designed to avoid reductions in a member's housing allowance when the member's actual costs remain unchanged. However, BAH Rate Protection is lost if there is a

change in status of the member, including demotion, Permanent Change of Station (unless waiver approved) or a change in dependency status.

From the Frontlines: Senior Airman Tara Loftin

The Air Force takes Airmen on journeys all over the planet. For Senior Airman Tara Loftin, 509th Force Support Squadron fitness specialist, the journey took her to Southwest Asia.

Leaving in April 2012 and returning in October, Loftin worked downrange as a quality assurance evaluator during her time overseas.

"Our job was to make sure contractors over there were doing their job properly," Loftin said. "We had a performance work statement listing all of their duties as contractors."

Even though most of the host nationals spoke English, the cultural differences sometimes made it difficult to provide quality assurance, according to Loftin.

"They didn't know some of the things we do in the U.S. in regards to health and safety," Loftin said. "We had to ensure certain expectations were being met."

The central focus of her mission was to ensure all aspects of the U.S. government's services contracts were accounted for, she said.

"If something wasn't being done properly, we had to perform write-ups and make sure it was brought to the attention of the contractors," Loftin said. "We had to make sure troops coming in had the best quality food and service that could've been provided to them."

Loftin's day-to-day duties varied throughout the duration of her deployment. She worked the day shift the first half of her de-

ployment, and the night shift during the second half.

"When I worked days, I checked the time and dates on all food items," Loftin said. "If the trash was overfilled, for example, I would make sure the contractor knew he needed to get someone to do that job."

In addition to providing quality assurance, Loftin escorted food trucks to and from the front gate of the installation.

"I also provided accountability for 'Meals, Ready to Eat' that were delivered to our warehouse," Loftin said. "We controlled more than 3,000 MREs during my deployment."

While the dayshift demanded daily mission inspections, the nightshift was a different

challenge altogether. During this shift,Loftin was responsible for controlling the dining facility inventory and ensuring contractors could pass health inspections.

"We made sure expired food from the storage area was thrown out, and made sure incoming food was organized in first-in-first-out order," Loftin said. "The nightshift entailed a lot more organizing and making sure items were prepped for the busier dayshift."

From ensuring contractors were properly handling food by day, to inspecting inventory items at night, her deployed mission was completely different to her mission at Whiteman. Loftin worked in the dining facility while deployed and works in the fitness

center at here on base

A big difference between her deployed mission and her home-station mission was that her job at Whiteman is more hands-on.

"We don't have a contractor here at Whiteman because we perform the mission," Loftin said. "It was difficult being deployed and not being able to do the job. I had times where I wanted to do things myself, but wasn't allowed to."

"We couldn't even tell the local-nationals to perform a task," she said. "We had to tell the contractor to tell them to do the task."

The differences in duties also helped her appreciate her time in Southwest Asia.

"The best part about my deployed job was seeing how many different countries we helped support,"Loftin said. "It was really neat seeing our countries support each other."

Loftin said that another positive aspect of her deployment was having the ability to go outside the wire.


"It was a once-in-a-lifetime experience," Loftin said. "We had the opportunity to go white-water rafting or horseback-riding. Being able to see how the locals lived was a great experience."

In addition to getting a first-hand experience of the Southwest Asian culture, Loftin also volunteered at two local K-12 schools.

"We got to visit the children and see their schools," Loftin said. "We raised more than \$1,200 to provide them soccer jerseys, winter jackets and school supplies."

Experiencing the quality of life for the





Whiteman 'kicks' off Wing Fitness Day

The 509th Force Support Squadron sponsored the 2013 Wing Fitness Day at the Whiteman Fitness Center, Jan. 11.

"The event was used to introduce new instructors, new and existing fitness courses, nutrition classes and a health and fitness fair,"said Michael Taylor, 509th FSS fitness center director. "Healthy individuals are able to stand up to the rigors of military duty in an easier manner, which is essential to keep a fighting force."

Fitness reduces illnesses and stress, and improves mental well-being, said Tech. Sgt. Angela Gooden, 509th FSS Fitness Center NCOIC. The annual event also supports and promotes morale and social skills

"Moreover, Wing Fitness Day is devoted to assisting Whiteman members in fulfilling their New Year's resolutions and personal fitness goals," Gooden said

Throughout the day, many activities were offered, such as equipment orientation and Micro-Fit Assessment, which identifies where appropriate health improvements should be made. Additionally, the Fitness Center also provided demonstration of, and opportunities to participate in, fitness classes, nutritional class, metabolic testing and BOD POD, a composition measurement test.

The free event offered classes including Spin, Boot Camp, Extreme Military Training, Turbo Kick, Yoga, Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu and Step Aerobics.

More than 250 individuals participated in the Wing Fitness Day, and many said they look forward to meeting and maintaining their fitness goals.

"I enjoy working out, and Wing Fitness Day provided me with an overview of classes I haven't par-

ticipated in yet," said Kelly Lawhead, wife of Senior Airman David Lawhead, 509th Civil Engineer Squadron firefighter. "It was also a great opportunity to see more of what the Fitness Center and base health agencies have to offer."

The Fitness Center works closely with the HAWC staff, as both units' programs work hand-in-hand to promote health and fitness, according Taylor. Also present was Family Advocacy, Airman & Family Readiness and the Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Office.

"Overall, the Wing Fitness Day was beneficial because the hardest part is getting members in the door to see what we have to offer," Taylor said. "You wouldn't believe how many times we hear, 'I didn't know you had that.'"

Sometimes people just need a little push to get started on a life-changing journey, said Gooden.

"We offer assistance to start, and stay focused, on fitness,"Gooden said. "Our customers come in all shapes and sizes, but share one common idea of wanting to improve their fitness."

While budget cuts have been made, the Fitness Center still surpasses the standard of 15 classes per week, offering 24, said Taylor. Additionally, the staff aims to provide numerous special events.

"Our Air Force special events standard is to have four a year and we are planning to offer 22," Taylor said. "Additionally, we provide all five intramural sports – football, basketball, volleyball, soccer and softball.

The Fitness Center has events scheduled for every month in 2013. Customers can look forward to the Whiteman Winter Games, Family Fitness Day, Whiteman Triathlon, multiple wing 5Ks, the Striker Life half-marathon and more.





host nationals was an eye-opener for Loftin. It helped her appreciate how privileged she was to live in the United States, especially in comparison to the lifestyle of those who must endure lower standards-of-living.

Even though Loftin enjoyed her deployment, she missed several aspects of life at home, in addition to her friends and family.

"I missed real food that didn't come from the dining facility," Loftin said. "Also, in the dorms, my bed was right next to the door, which slammed all night. Being able to sleep alone in my quiet bedroom was nice."

Overall, the deployment to Southwest Asia proved to be a learning experience for Loftin.

"The deployment was an excellent way for Loftin to gain breadth of experience," said Staff Sgt. Alaina Baldowski, 509th Force Support Squadron assistant lodging manager. "She also won Airman of the Month while deployed and was picked number one out of 130 enlisted members for her excellent job performance, community involvement, volunteer efforts and self-improvement."

Taking advantage of working with the host nation and being involved with sister services was an opportunity for Loftin to gain leadership and teambuilding skills, said Baldowski.

"My job at Services gave me a greater sense of what I do for the Air Force," Loftin said. "Without Services, Airmen wouldn't have a place to eat, sleep, work out or enjoy recreation."

BASH program saves lives, money

Whiteman's aircraft are not the only birds that rule the skies over cessful sorties, thanks in part to the efforts of 509th Operations Support disaster. We won't have as many aircraft to perform or respond to mis-Squadron's Airfield Management Flight and its Bird Air Strike Hazard sions.' (BASH) program.

The purpose of BASH is to ensure birds do not pose a threat to flying aircraft. Without BASH, there would likely be an increased number of bird-related aircraft mishaps on base.

"When an aircraft gets a bird strike, it becomes non-mission capable until the repair process is completed," said Tech. Sgt. Ray ous bird strikes, airfield management specialists are taking necessary Northcutt, 509th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron flight safety superintendent."This can cause missed sorties and mission drops."

Equipped with pyrotechnics and shotguns, airfield management specialists participate in the BASH program all day, every day. The deter them from the paths of taxiing, flying and landing aircraft." BASH program maximizes mission efficiency and saves the Air Force millions of dollars, according to Myles.

When birds are spotted, airfield management specialists work with the control tower to describe the location, size and other details of possible aircraft threats. Because airfield managers have a responsibility to ensure the safety of aircrew and flightline assets, the airfield management shop typically handles most bird threats.

"If the U.S. Department of Agriculture is not here, we'll take responsibility for dispersing of the birds," said Senior Airman Synquae Wilson, 509th Operations Support Squadron airfield management ed, airfield management coordinators use BASH to keep birds from coordinator. "If it isn't safe for planes to fly in the area, we can suspend bringing Whiteman's mission to a grinding halt, said Myles. operations until the threat is cleared."

> Not only can a bird strike slow down the mission, but it can also cost Airmen their lives and deprive the Air Force of valuable resources. Since FY 2008, Whiteman has experienced 365 bird strikes; the resulting damage has exceeded \$285,100 in repairs, said Northcutt.

"We keep the grass cut and make sure there is no standing water on the airfield to attract birds," Wilson said."We do everything we can to

Keeping the grass mowed requires airfield management specialists to work with members from the 509th Civil Engineer Squadron to ensure the grass stays between 7 to 14 inches. They also kill all weeds that could provide homes for both birds and the animals they tend to eat.

"This keeps the area the least habitable as possible," said Senior Airman Dennis Myles, 509th OSS airfield management coordinator. "If there is no food for birds to look for, then they aren't going to want to come to the airfield."

With a dedicated team of Airmen who work 24/7, holidays includ-



After a two-week break for the holidays, the sound of basketballs bouncing off the hardwood floor could be heard once again as the intramural basketball season resumed Jan. 10.

Near the end of the third quarter, LRS held a 30-25 lead. AMXS-B cut it to 30-29 before LRS came right back with another three, ending the third quarter ahead 33-29. AMXS-B would not get within four points the rest of the game.

LRS came out in the fourth looking to finish off the comeback. Lead by Evseff and Daniell Branch, LRS played shut-down defense and hit their foul shots down the stretch. LRS would end every threat AMXS-B had by hitting clutch free throws, and closed out the comeback, 54-49.

"Free throws are always key," Evseff said. "A lot of teams allow comebacks by missing these opportunities, but we weren't going to let that happen to us tonight."

Evseff and the rest of the team are looking forward to the rest of the season and a potential playoff run.

"Our first step is making the playoffs, and then we think we are good enough to make a strong run at the championship," Evseff said.
