'Spirit of Florida' first B-2 to surpass 7,000 flight hours

Since the "Spirit of Florida" B-2 first arrived at Whiteman Air Force Base in July 1996, its stealth and massive firepower have been used in missions around the world.

During its latest mission April 1, the aircraft and its crew celebrated a monumental milestone as it became the first B-2 Spirit to surpass 7,000 flight hours.

"This achievement is a testament to the men and women of both the 131st and 509th Bomb Wings who take a vested interest in the B-2 mission every day," said Lt. Col. Michael Pyburn, 131st Operations Group commander. "Milestones like this cannot be accomplished without the dedication they consistently provide around the clock."

With a fuel capacity of 167,000 pounds and 40,000-pound payload, the multi-role heavy bomber has a virtually limitless

reach. It is the only aircraft to combine range, precision, stealth and a large payload.

As one of only 20 B-2 stealth bombers in the world, the conventional- and nuclear-capable Spirit of Florida maintains

constant readiness to defend America's interests anytime, anywhere.

From the crew chiefs and maintainers who ready the aircraft for takeoff, to the pilots who control the Spirit of Florida, reaching the 7,000-hour mark has been an immense effort.

"We take a lot of pride in keeping our B-2s air-worthy," said Staff Sgt. Kent Sedgwick, the13th Aircraft Maintenance Unit dedicated crew chief assigned to the Spirit of Florida. "It feels great to work on something that has such a powerful presence."

"The 'health' of our aircraft shows just how much time and effort our crew chiefs and maintainers put into making sure everything is taken care of so our jets can take off at any moment."

Sedgwick added that the Spirit of Florida was also the first to reach the 5,000-hour mark, which it did in May 2007, and the first to reach the 6,000-hour mark, which it did in January 2010.

This Week in 509th Bomb Wing History: B-2 anniversaries

David Easley509 Bomb Wing Historia

April 1, 1993: The process of manning and equipping the 509th Bomb Wing at Whiteman Air Force Base, Mo., was begun. The wing had moved "on paper" from Pease Air Force Base, N.H., on Sept. 30, 1990, as the "509th Bombardment Wing, Heavy." It was then re-designated as the 509th BW on Sept. 1, 1991. The last aircraft flown by the

509th at Pease were the FB-111 and KC-135 Stratotanker.

April 1, 1997: The 509th BW declared to be initially operational capable.

April 3, 2002: Former Secretary of the Air Force, Dr. James Roche, visited Whiteman AFB and flew in the B-2.



Airmen volunteer at veterans home

Airmen from Whiteman Air Force Base collaborated with volunteer groups from the local community to make the Missouri Veterans' Home's second annual Easter Egg Hunt and family celebration in Warrensburg, Mo., March 30 a success.

The event was organized to boost morale among veterans and their families, said Melissa Wilson, Missouri Veterans Home director of recreation therapy.

"I think the event turned out great," said Tech. Sgt. Duane Edington, 442nd Maintenance Squadron NCO in charge of munition support equipment maintenance. "We had some good volunteers and the children had a great time. You could see it in their eyes when they were running around looking for eggs."

Edington was one of more than 70 volunteers from Whiteman Air Force Base who attended the event. More than 200 children from the Warrensburg area also participated.

"I know that the veterans are so happy when their families and loved ones do come here," said Wilson. "But I also know that it's important for the families to see their veteran loved ones here having a good time and being in such a wonderful environment."

Since the day's heavy rain did not allow the event to be held outside, the veterans and volunteers who attended the event hid more than 1,800 eggs throughout the interior of the veterans home.

"We have a wonderful volunteer coordinator who sends out volunteer requests to Whiteman and we got an overwhelming response, as always," Wilson said. "They are just so supportive of us."

Edington said having the children and volunteers showing up to speak with the veterans contributed to the positive turn out of the egg hunt.

"The event was important to the veterans and their families," said "Many times there aren't positive experiences at nursing homes or veterans homes, so it's really important that we create opportunities for veterans and their loved ones to make memories."

The veterans home's recreation and therapy department was directly in charge of sponsoring the event. Wilson came up with the idea for the annual egg hunt last year.

"My team and I work amazingly well together," Wilson said. "We get these ideas for events like the egg hunt, we go with them and we make them bigger and better every year."

As keeping the veterans happy is the goal of staff members, the egg hunt would not have been successful without the livelihood from the veterans, said Wilson.

"The veterans have sacrificed so much for our country and they are why we have such a wonderful support system from our community and the surrounding areas," Wilson said.

Overall, having veterans, community members and Airmen working together for a mutual cause has benefits on both the civilian and military sides, said Edington.

"You want the community to see what the military does and you want the military to see what the community has to offer," Edington said. "Having Airmen and community members in that close proximity helps everybody out in the long run."

Spring Cleaning 101: Tips for getting it done

It is also a good time to check common household products which could be out of date, including medications and supplements, air filters, food, cosmetics, batteries (especially for fire alarms, flash lights and battery-powered radios), paint and fire extinguishers.

8. Update or make an emergency plan

Develop or revise an emergency escape plan in case of a fire or other emergency situation. Get family members involved in making the plan and know at least two ways out of every room. Designate a clear meeting place. Practice the plan, as practice makes perfect. Make sure your street number is visible in case a first responder needs to find your house. March 2013 courts-martial, **Article 15s and discharges**

In March 2013, two Whiteman Air Force Base members were sentenced by court-martial, two were punished under Article 15, Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ) and four members were administratively separated from the Air Force.

Courts-martial

A staff sergeant from the 509th Security Forces Squadron was tried and found guilty by a special court-martial for violation of UCMJ Article 93, maltreatment, Article 134, indecent acts, and Article 92, dereliction of duty. Punishment was a reduction to airman, two months restriction to base, three months hard labor and a reprimand.

An airman first class from the 509th Communications Squadron was tried and found guilty by a special court-martial for violation of UCMJ Article 112a, use of a controlled substance, and possession of a controlled substance. Punishment was a reduction to airman basic, 45 days confinement, and forfeiture of \$1,000 pay per month for four months.

Article 15s

An airman first class from the 509th

Medical Operations Squadron received an Article 15 for use of marijuana. Punishment was forfeiture of \$300 pay per month for two months suspended, reduction to airman and a reprimand.

An airman first class from the 509th Security Forces Squadron received an Article 15 for dereliction of duty. Punishment was a reduction to airman, reduction to airman basic suspended, restriction to base for 15 days and a rep-

Discharges

An airman first class from the 509th Security Forces Squadron received a general discharge for minor disciplinary infractions.

An airman first class from the 509th Medical Operations Squadron received a general discharge for drug use.

A senior airman from the 509th Logistics Readiness Squadron received a general discharge for fitness failure.

A senior airman from the 509th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron received an honorable discharge for failure to meet fitness standards.

When pilots leave the watchful eye of the air traffic control tower, they are in the hands of radar, approach and control, also known as RAPCON. Once the pilots are cleared for takeoff and leave Whiteman's airspace, this operational 'middle man' comes into play.

RAPCON is a different group of air controllers from those in the ATC tower, and they observe radar systems coordinates flights and communicates

Pilots can feel secure knowing RAPCON is checking in 24/7 to ensure their safe departure and return. This is no easy task, but Whiteman's RAPCON team works diligently to ensure 100% mission completion.

"As air traffic controllers, we sequence and separate aircraft in the sky, making sure pilots get to and from their destination," said U.S. Air Force Staff Sgt. Samuel Baugh, 509th Operation Support Squadron air traffic control watch supervisor. "There are a lot of regulations we have to abide by,but the most important is to make sure pilots get to where they are going with no

RAPCON is important to the Whiteman mission because it functions as the voice and eyes keeping the pilots focused on their operations, said Baugh. Without air traffic controllers, it would be difficult for pilots to find their destination, plan for changing weather conditions, avoid aircraft collisions, and takeoff and land safely. It is for these reasons air traffic controllers must

"The training program is a year and a half long. When you get out of tech school, you are a 3-level, which is an apprentice," said U.S. Air Force Airman 1st Class Austin Yancik, 509th OSS air traffic control apprentice. "Any time you are operating the controls, you need a 5- or 7-level monitoring you."

There are seven positions each RAPCON professional must be familiar with: assist, approach, arrival, military operation area controller, clearance delivery, coordinator and finals. A 7-level is a watch supervisor, someone who s certified in assist, approach, and arrival

Once the apprentice receives approval from his supervisor, he or she is watched by a centralized evaluation monitor in order to obtain his 5-level, while performing his or her specific task.

Once an Airman puts on staff sergeant, he or she is eligible to train for 7-level certification, which is a yearlong process. Air traffic controllers, tower personnel and RAPCON have to train regularly to maintain basic job

The tower is responsible for observing everything on the flightline and every aircraft within line of sight, said Baugh. Once pilots leave the tower's sight, they communicate with RAPCON. RAPCON works with pilots while they are within Whiteman's airspace up until they reach another base's airspace. The RAPCON team at the receiving base will relieve Whiteman's RAPCON and assume responsibility for guiding the pilots to their destination.

At the end of the day, RAPCON is the possibly the most important middle man out there, guiding the B-2 and her pilots through the long hours of flight in between takeoff and arrival.






