The reason I'm successful is...?

Until now, I have only highlighted success strategies without going into too much detail about how they work in my own life. Throughout this commentary, I will show you how I went from an average career to one filled with excitement, passion, and energy.

Until recently, I have always questioned my success. One question kept coming back to me, "Why me?" Throughout this last year I have been on a quest to figure out what steps in my life I have taken to become so successful.

Throughout the journey, I captured and documented the reasons for my success. The question of "Why me?" has changed to, "The reason I'm successful is...?"

Without question my success is directly linked to my daily rituals. I'm not sure who cultivated my daily rituals; it might have been my parents, or teachers, I do not really know. I have always had positive rituals but I have not always been deliberate. I know luck has been on my side.

Many instances of success or failure are achieved through luck. But when I started my career, I did not have a clear picture of what it took to be successful. I used goal setting sporadically through my career and some of those goals were not aligned with my life's purpose and mission. I stumbled on positive success strategies along the way. I figured it out through luck. I do not want you to make my mistakes.

Luck can be just one pathway to success; however, success leaves clues and success can also be mirrored. For those who want to achieve greater success, you can disregard luck and take steps to lead a deliberate life. With a deliberate daily plan, success can be yours.

Of course there will be many who say, "Chief, I just don't have the time to make meaningful changes." I am not asking you to change everything at once. Rather, start with just one thing to improve and build from there.

In the last year I have re-energized my career and I now charge through each day with passion, drive and focus. I have made small adjustments and they have drastically affected my performance. By making small deliberate shifts, you will not be leaving success to luck.

To fuel my daily actions with laser focused growth, development, and performance I now use a personal strategic plan. Personal strategic planning is a method that will help you determine not just who you want to be but why. It focuses not just on goal setting but also on determining the most important values to you.

Even if you get out of sync with your goals, your plan will be there as a way to get back on track.

Here is a look into my personal strategic plan. Afterwards, I will provide an exercise where you can construct your own personal plan.

"A daily call for specific action."

Part 1: I start with a theme that is a single sentence that encapsulates how I want to be successful:

Success does not come from a few actions but rather a series of small ones built up day by day.

Personal vision and mission statement: I have a personal vision and mission, just like a business, that governs all of my actions and drives me towards my goals.

I will inspire, promote, and celebrate a daily call for positive action. I envision the creation of an ever expanding network of high quality people. I will work with others to inspire, promote and celebrate a culture that continually raises standards.

I, Chief Master Sgt. Stuart Allison, know that my purpose is to passionately live life to the fullest, grow and develop daily, inspire and motivate others, and treat all people with dignity and respect.

Personal legacy statement: When I reflect, I remind myself of what I want to be remembered for:

I will look back knowing that I served living life to the fullest, growing and developing daily, inspiring and motivating others, and treating all people with dignity and respect.

Personal philosophy: This mantra always runs through my mind:

Actions speak louder than words.

Values: I have two sets of values. I move toward one set and away from another. They provide the basis for my daily reflections. It is not enough to simple ask, "Am I reaching a set of positive values?" You must also ask, "Do I practice values that derail me on the path to success?"

"Toward" values: This set of values provides concrete guidance for the values I want to live each day of my life.

I value integrity. I only set goals and take on commitments that I know I can achieve. They might be challenging but I must be honest and clear with myself that I can succeed.

I value loyalty. I'm loyal to my commitments, values, and relationships.

I value success. I focus on achieving success daily and sharing success strategies with others.

I value excellence. I strive for excellence in all I do.

I value fitness. I exercise daily.

I value daily growth. I read daily and reflect

I value role models. I utilize role models...they provide a view to what is possible.

I value teamwork. I develop a culture that promotes positive teamwork.

Away values: These values are ones that I do not want to be part of my life.

Ruthlessness: I will never again indulge in the debilitating attitude of ruthlessness.

Negative attitude: I will never again display a negative attitude.

Humiliation: I will never again indulge in the debilitating attitude of humiliation.

Jealousy: I will never again indulge in the debilitating attitude of jealousy.

Hate: I will never again indulge in the debilitating attitude of hate.

Daily roles: As a leader, I must develop myself, become a role model to others and remain a faithful servant to the leaders above me.

I will be a world-class athlete daily.

I will be a strategy scholar daily.

I will be my commander's ambassador daily.

I will be a driven, zealous, reflective leader daily.

I will be an animated energetic Air Force communicator daily.

I will be an ultimate peak performance coach daily.

Your turn: Use the steps below to create your own personal strategic plan:

With the steps below, you will be able to create a plan like mine above. The steps are not in the order of the actual plan; they are in the order that will best help you develop your plan. The foundation of the plan starts with your values. From there, you set your goals. Finally, you create your encapsulating mission and mantra statements.

- 1. What are five to seven values you want to live each day?
- 2. What are five to seven values that you don't want to live each day?
- 3. Create a personal code of ethics. Write out how you will accomplish them.
- 4. Create your personal legacy statement. For what do you want to be remembered?
- 5. Write down your daily roles—e.g. leader, role model, parent, athlete, etc. Set high-level goals of what you want to achieve in each role.
- 6. Create your mission statement. Write a paragraph that brings together the ideas from steps one to four.
- 7. Create your own personal mantra: What is one statement that you will repeat to yourself to remind you about achieving all the parts of this plan? This can also be a quote that you like, too.

I wish that I had a plan like this when I started my career in the Air Force. It would have saved me many false starts and journeys down wrong paths. Some success is due to luck, but the vast majority of it is planned. A personal strategic plan will keep you grounded and focused on your goals. You will know whether or not you are moving forward on the path to success.

Welsh: Air Force must get handle on pay, benefits

GRAND FORKS AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. (AFNS) -- The Air Force must control the growth of pay and benefits or the service will be hard pressed to perform its primary mission to fight and win America's wars, the service's top officer said here Nov. 25.

Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Mark A. Welsh III said pay, benefits and medical costs constitute about half of the Air Force's budget -- and those costs are growing.

Left unchecked there will come a time when the service cannot do its job "because all we're doing is paying our people," Welsh said. Some experts believe this will occur in 2023, others by 2032.

All service leaders agree there's a problem, he said.

The general said this is not a scare tactic on the part of senior leaders in DOD.

"There is absolutely no motivation for a service chief to try and scare people in his service -- none," Welsh said. "Everything we do is about taking care of them. Nobody cares more about the men and women in our services than the service chiefs. And nobody wants to do what's right for them more than we do. Scaring them is the last thing on our minds."

Welsh said no service leader is talking about cutting pay and benefits, just slowing the growth. He speaks of managing growth in a different way.

"Our people will understand that," the general said.

The U.S. Congress, the Department of Defense and the services

have over the past 20 years provided excellent benefits and comparable pay to military members. "We've all benefited immensely and we thank them for that,"

Welsh said. "But it is time to slow it down a little bit until we know we can do our primary job, which is fight and win the nation's He wants Congress to consider things like slowing down the

growth of the military pay raise for the next couple of years while DOD grapples with fiscal issues caused by sequestration.

The service chiefs understand and accept that the department must do its part to deal with America's national debt.

"But no one would argue the mechanism of sequestration is the most effective way to do that. It's absolutely not," Welsh said.

The way sequestration operates is the problem, he said.

"Every business in the world -- if it wanted to downsize and refocus -- would take down infrastructure the first couple of years, reinvest the savings in the product lines that work and then make the cuts over the second half of the 10-year period," Welsh said.

This is not the way sequestration operates. DOD cannot touch infrastructure and personnel accounts are protected. The money has to come from somewhere and that means funds for modernization and readiness will be hit most heavily.

"We haven't been allowed to slow growth on the pay side or the medical side or do anything about infrastructure costs, so everything is going to come out of modernization, force structure and readiness," Welsh said. "There is no other option. That's where the money is."

November 2013 Courts-Martial, Article 15s, and Discharges

In November 2013, two members were punished under Article 15, Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ). There were no courts-martial or administrative discharges closed during the month of November

Article 15s (2)

A staff sergeant from the 509th Munitions Squadron received an Article 15 for dereliction of duty. Punishment was reduction to grade of Senior Airman (suspended). forfeiture of \$300 pay per month for 2 months, 20 days extra duty and a reprimand.

An airman first class from the 509th Security Forces Squadron received an Article 15 for dereliction of duty and failure to go. Punishment was reduction to Airman, 20 days extra duty and a reprimand.



Comment

For the month of November, the number of nonjudicial punishment actions is lower compared to recent months. With a total of only two nonjudicial punishment actions,

zero discharges and zero courts-martial, it would appear during the month that misconduct is down. We can only hope that this is the case while also remembering it takes several months or more to determine if a decrease in misconduct is something other than temporary. We should all be proud of ourselves for being responsible in our behavior, and for being good wingmen to our fellow Airmen. With that being said, continue to be mindful of your behavior and that of your fellow Airmen; consider the consequences of your actions and the effects your actions may have on the mission, your coworkers and even your loved ones.

45 AFSCs removed from SRB list as AF gets leaner, smaller

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RAN- DOLPH, Texas (AFNS) -- Forty-five AFSCs will no longer be eligible for the selective reenlistment bonus effective Dec. 5
with the advent of the new selective reenlistment bonus list, Air Force officials announced Nov. 26.

SRB eligibility changes posture the Air Force for a smaller force driven by sequestration, said Brig. Gen. Gina Grosso, the Air Force director of force management policy.

"The SRB program is a retention tool," Grosso said. "As the force gets smaller, skills that were under-manned are no longer short and we are adjusting the bonus program accordingly."

Critical and emerging career fields with high operations demands and low manning -- such as battlefield Airmen and cyberspace specialties -- still require attention, the general said, so some AFSCs will remain on the SRB list. As of Dec. 5, AFSCs on the SRB list will include the following:

Due to recent changes in Department of Defense policy, Airmen who are in an AFSC being removed from the SRB listing will no longer have 30 days to reenlist from the date the AFSC is removed. Instead Airmen in an AFSC being removed will have through Dec. 4 to reenlist and receive an SRB. Anyone reenlisting on Dec. 5 or later will use the new SRB list. In addition to these changes Airmen will no longer be able to request accelerated SRB payments.

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No notes, no names: Life consultants provide anonymous counseling

With all the difficulties of military life -- deployments, constant moves, ever-changing shifts -- comes the occasional need to just unload all the stress and worries.

The Military and Family Life Consultant (MFLC) program provides an avenue for Service members and their families to talk to a licensed civilian counselor for free.

There are two MFLCs here at Whiteman, one who talks to adults and another who speaks with youth. In both cases, there is assurance in confidentiality. Both offer brief counseling that is solution-focused.

"The MFLCs are unique in that there's no rank intimidation," said Senior Master Sgt. Mona Wendzillo, NCO in charge of the Airman and Family Readiness Center (A&FRC). "Each counselor rotates out about every six months, so it's not a standing member of the community who you are talking to. It's not somebody you sit next to in church or shop next to in the commissary.

"And they don't take down any notes or names," she added. "So you can be

totally open talking about your issues."

Wendzillo added that although they like to advertise all the other avail-

able resources including the chaplains, Family Advocacy, Mental Health and Military OneSource, military members have less concern about career impacts when it comes to talking to an MFLC.

MFLCs offer complete confidentiality aside from reports of child abuse, domestic abuse, harm to self or others, and other "duty to warn" situations.

Rebecca White, 509th Force Sup-

Rebecca White, 509th Force Support Squadron flight chief, added that the youth MFLC provides services that are not widely known about, something they hope to change.

"It's our best-kept secret, but we don't want it to be. Youth MFLCs can be substantial in helping children," said White. "The MFLC can teach them coping mechanisms, conflict resolution, respectful behavior and about anti-bullying techniques. There is a lot of stress being part of a military family and a lot of these methods can be preventive instead of reactive."

To get a hold of the adult MFLC, call (660) 631-7985 and to get a hold of the youth MFLC, call (660) 631-9001. For more information, you can also call the AFRC at (660) 251-1949, MFLCs can hold meetings either on or off base – just not in a person's residence.

All MFLCs have either a master's or doctorate degree and are contracted from outside the military to provide these services.

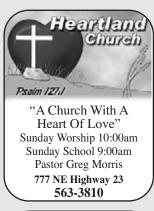
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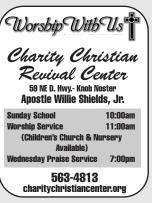




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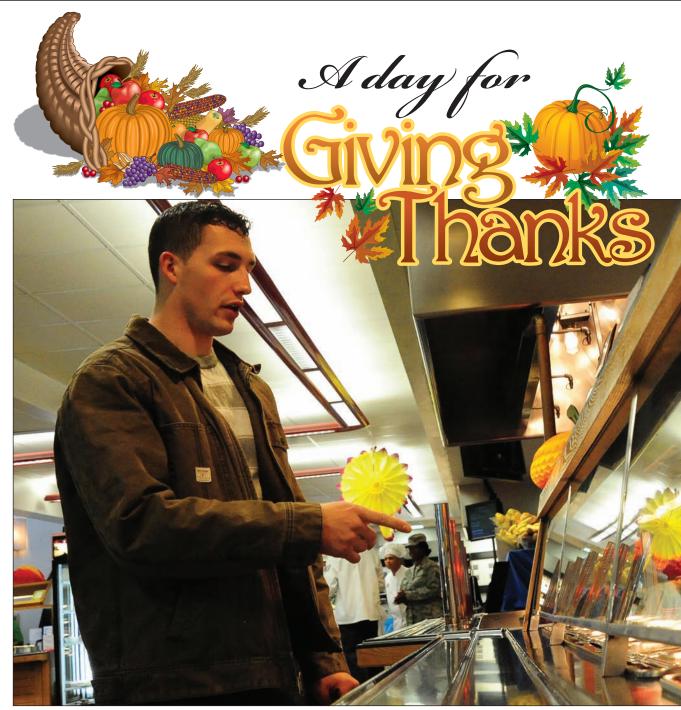

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Dog park opens at Whiteman

A ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new Whiteman Dog Park was held Dec. 3.

The park, which is located near the intersection of Houx Drive and Sijan Avenue, provides a place for dogs and their owners to socialize.

"We don't have a fenced-in yard here and our dogs have a lot of energy, so they needed a place to run around," said Mandy Barker, whose husband, Airman 1st Class Alex Barker, is assigned to the 509th Civil Engineer Squadron.

She added that her husband came up with the idea after seeing similar dog parks from their hometown in North Carolina. The successful project took effort on the part of many Whiteman organizations, including the 509th CES and Balfour Beatty Communities.

The rules of the dog park are:

- Hours are from dawn to dusk
- Owners must clean up immediately after their dog
- Dogs must have current registration and vaccination

- Dogs must be leashed outside the fenced area
- No children under age 12 are allowed unless with an adult
- Dogs must be supervised at all times
- Dogs exhibiting aggressive or overly dominant behavior must be removed immediately
- No female dogs in heat are not allowed
- No puppies younger than 4 months are allowed
- Only dogs and their owners/companions allowed in this area. Any other activities are prohibited.
 - No eating, drinking or smoking is allowed in the park
- Dogs prohibited in base housing are prohibited in the dog park, including: pit bull (American Staffordshire or English Staffordshire bull terrier), rottweiler, Doberman pinscher, chow, wolf hybrids & other dogs demonstrating dominant/aggressive behavior
 - In case of an emergency, call 911.

Also, all people and dogs who enter and use the dog park enter at their own risk. Park users agree to fully comply with posted rules and take full legal responsibility for any action of their own dogs. Using the park constitutes acceptance of the above rules.

Holiday safety tips

The winter holidays are a time for celebrating with family and friends, that means more cooking, home decorating, entertaining, and an increased risk of fire due to heating equipment. Did you know that nearly half of all holiday fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source and that two out of every five home decoration fires are started by candles? The following are a few tips from the National Fire Protection Association to help you have a happy and safe holiday season.

HOLIDAY DECORATING

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Connect no more than three strands of mini light sets and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of LED

strands to connect

- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.

HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.

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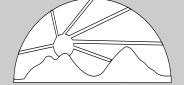
