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


The Department of Defense (DoD) and the Brain Injury Association of America recognize March as Brain Injury Awareness month to increase awareness of Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI). According to the Centers for Disease and Prevention (CDC), each year 1.7 million people are diagnosed with a brain injury. The Defense Centers of Excellence for Psychological Health and Traumatic Brain Injury defines a TBI as the result of a blow or jolt to the head that disrupts the normal function of the brain. Not all blows or jolts to the head result in a TBI. Injuries can be closed or penetrating head wounds and will range in severity from mild to moderate to severe. The most common form of TBI in the military is mild TBI, also referred to as concussion. According to Defense and Veterans Brain Injury Center, from 2000-2014(3 QTR), more than 313,816 service members have been diagnosed with TBI.

This year, Congress has designated 16 March as Brain Injury Awareness Day. During March, MHS will focus on the issue of TBI. We will provide tools and resources to help educate service members, their families, retirees and DoD civilians about the prevention and treatment of TBI while highlighting ongoing MHS research and breakthroughs that are helping to improve and prolong the quality of life for those living with TBI.



Whiteman Bowling Center nears completion

Just across the intersection from the 509th Bomb Wing Headquarters building, the new Whiteman Bowling Center is nearing completion.

The Bowling Center is a Quality of Life (QoL) initiative for Team Whiteman anticipated to open in mid-May 2016.

Like the current Stars and Strikes Bowling Center, the new Bowling Center will also have 16 lanes. However, the new facility is significantly larger than its predecessor.

"The project increased total square footage from the old facility by 17 percent," said Mark Wheeler, 509th Civil Engineering Squadron's Engineer Flight chief. "The current facility is 16,600 square feet, but does not have adequate seating for the snack area, nor party rooms, or a game room. By expanding the kitchen area, seating area, traffic flow, and adding two party rooms and a game room, the overall building footprint has increased 17 percent to 20,400 square feet."

Another new feature will be large projectors above the pins to allow bowlers to watch sports games, music videos, and other video entertainment options. Additionally, flat-screen monitors above the ball returns will be linked to a new entertainment system, a feature that will enable users to bowl traditional games or play a variety of modified game sets.

The Stars and Strikes Bowling Center has been rated one of the most popular dining options on base, and the new Bowling Center will continue to provide outstanding service while featuring a larger dining area, expanded kitchen and outdoor seating options.

"The staff and I are extremely excited about the new facility and all the advanced state of the art equipment we will be offering," said Pat Schneider, the Bowling Center manager.

Next to the dining area, guests will be able to use a large game room with arcade-style games and billiards tables. The new Bowling Center will also feature two new party rooms that can be combined into one large room. Both will offer connections to the base computer network for commander's calls and other meetings.

A common question is how we funded the Bowling Center project in the current fiscal climate. This project was fully funded with Non-Appropriated Funds (NAF), not through Appropriated Funds (APF). NAF money is generated directly from the community, while APF money is approved by Congress and has rigid rules surrounding its use. For example, facilities like the Whiteman Fitness Center are primarily funded with APF money. As a result, we don't charge a fee for access to the Fitness Center or the base track. Facilities like the Bowling Center, on the other hand, earn money from their use and these profits are categorized as NAF funds. NAF money is more flexible in its use, allowing base leadership to allocate it toward various QoL improvements. These "pots" of money are separate and not interchangeable.

To put this into perspective, \$300,000 of the Bowling Center's total cost was directly funded by contributions from Team Whiteman. This means that the cup of coffee you purchased from the Mission's End and your Labor Day weekend boat rental from Outdoor Recreation directly helped to fund the new Bowling Center.


Once the Bowling Center is operational, the money it earns will combine with the NAF MWR funds from various 509th Force Support Squadron facilities and activities on base, helping fund future QoL initiatives and improvements.

"The facility will increase Whiteman's generated MWR funds and provide increased selfsufficiency throughout the Bowling Center's services," said Janet Judkins, the 509th Contracting Squadron's Infrastructure Flight Chief.

As members of Team Whiteman begin to use the new Bowling Center, this will directly help fund future QoL projects here at Whiteman and help make it a better place for our Total Force Team.



Say YES to volunteering

Youth Employment Skills (YES) Program is an on-base volunteer program for high school students and is offered through Whiteman Air Force Base Teen Programs. This program, underwritten by the Air Force Aid Society (AFAS), is a joint effort between AFAS and Air Force Services to offer high school students an opportunity to learn valuable work skills, "bank" dollar credits toward their postsecondary education, and have a positive impact on their base community.

YES allows high school students to "bank" \$6 in grant funding for every hour volunteered in an on-base function. Students may accumulate as many as 250 hours over all four years of high school combined, for a potential maximum of \$1500 toward their future vocationaltechnical or academic endeavors. In addition, the base is credited with \$2 for every volunteer hour; to be used in support of Whiteman Teen Programs (up to \$10,000 per year).

Teen Programs is looking for teens that would like to volunteer and base agencies that would like teen volunteers to learn various skills that will help them in future careers.

Student volunteer is interviewed for positions coordinated by Teen Coordinator and base agencies appropriate for the YES Program. YES volunteers are not be placed in the following positions: thrift store, cashier positions, chapel positions, base retail operations, waitressing, school program, or any Red Cross position.

"I always love how (Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Mark A. Welsh III) always says, 'Without airpower, you lose,' and I always like to finish that ... 'and without Airmen, there is no airpower,'" Cody said. "It's really important to remember that. We can have all this stuff, but without our Airmen, it doesn't happen."

The Air Force has seen continuous combat for the past 25 years. The men and women who serve in today's Air Force, most of whom joined after 9/11, are more engaged around the globe than back in 1991, but with fewer people, Cody mentioned.

"You go from 134 combat-coded fighter squadrons to 55," Cody said. "You go from about 946,000 active, Guard, Reserve, civilian Airmen down to about 664,000, yet we are more engaged today. That puts a tremendous toll on our people; it puts a tremendous toll on their families, and it's put a tremendous toll on our country."

Cody went on to ask the question, "Who are these Airmen and why do they serve?

"When you think about this dynamic, it's unlike any other dynamic that has existed in our history of (people answering) the call to service, so you have to get to know them a bit," Cody said. "It really reconnects you to why it's important, what we do and talk about here, because at some given point we are going to bring it right back to these men and women."

Cody went on to highlight some of the Airmen and family members from across

"I always love how (Air Force Chief of the Air Force who he had the chance to meet, saying that's what really motivates and inspires him.

"It's great what we are able to do for our country; it's great what we represent globally, but nothing is better than the men and women that do it for us and do it with us," Cody said. "We are a family. We're in this together and we will need each other to get through some of (the hard) times. What a great testament to what it means to serve. Beyond just doing great things for our country, you are doing it for the people who put this uniform on with you."

Cody answered questions from the crowd regarding military pay, retirement, healthcare, promotion testing and deployment dwell time. He ended his speech by awarding Airmen from the geospatial intelligence analyst career field the 2016 Etchberger Team of the Year Award, named after Chief Master Sgt. Richard Etchberger, the most recent enlisted Medal of Honor recipient who was killed in action on March 11, 1968, at Lima Site 85 in Laos.

"Our Airmen are proud; they are really, really proud of what they represent," Cody said. "They understand that it actually is a privilege to put this uniform on. It is always an honor for me to represent them to the secretary and to the chief and certainly to our elected officials to let them know exactly what it is that each of them do and what their families do in service to their country."



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
