

Offut Air Force Base, Neb. — Team Offutt personnel have regained access to buildings and facilities to begin assessing damage and recovering items that were underwater less than a week ago from massive flooding in the area.

More than 20 buildings have been cleared for initial disaster recovery efforts, through a safe and methodical approach.

"The weather has really been in our favor and we are taking full advantage by moving as quickly as we can to properly clear facilities for entry," said Col. Michael Manion, 55th Wing commander. "Our bio-environmental and civil engineer teams, along with Offutt Fire

and Rescue, have done an amazing job throughout this process."

The ongoing efforts are led by the newly stood-up Recovery Operations Center (ROC). This team is made up of professionals from across the wing focused on not only clearing facilities, but also getting displaced personnel in other facilities around the base to ensure the mission continues.

"The ROC essentially took over the recovery efforts from the Emergency Operations Center, which had been operating since we first learned of the potential for flooding," said Lt. Col Vance Goodfellow, ROC director. "This team is more streamlined with regard to subject-matter experts who can make things happen quickly to ensure our recovery efforts don't miss a beat."

The runway is also now clear of water and debris and is undergoing a thorough evaluation to ensure flight operations can resume safely.

"Everything we are doing is with safety in mind," Manion said. "Obviously, our Warhawks are eager to begin flying operations from Offutt, but we want to make sure everything is safe before we start doing that."

The commander praised the members of the 55th Wing as well as those other units effected by the flood for their resiliency.

"I've just been in awe of how everyone has responded to this natural disaster," Manion said. "I'm truly blessed to serve with these patriots who continue to amaze me daily with their resilience and can-do attitude." News The Warrior Friday, April 5, 2019

A low observable (LO) journeyman with the 509th Maintenance Squadron was awarded the Chief's Choice Award for February 2019 on March 21, 2019, at Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri.

The Whiteman AFB Chiefs Group recognized Senior Airman Dillon Lund by for his contributions on and off duty.

Chief Master Sgt. Thomas Fisher, the LO flight superintendent with the 509th MXS, highlighted Lund's work.

"Senior Airman Lund is a Low Observable Technician assigned to the 509th MXS," said Fisher. "He is a key member of the tailpipe shop and his proficiency performing what is essentially depot-level maintenance tasks on aircraft engine sub-assemblies has helped the wing achieve historic B-2 spare engine levels.

Fisher also spoke about Lund's contributions outside of the LO shop.

"His efforts have helped the 442nd graduate 100 percent of its trainees in the past two years, well above averages across Air Force Reserve units," said Fisher.

Fisher also said Lund was instrumental in providing aid during a rollover crash outside Columbia, Missouri.

"He assisted the member in exiting the vehicle and helped stabilize a broken limb while redirecting traffic around the scene," he said.

The Warrior asked Lund a few quetsions about this accomplishment:

How does it feel being recognized with

I feel honored to be chosen for this award, and it brings me a sense of pride.

Can you please explain what you do during your normal duty days and how that contributed to the award?

On a normal duty day in the tailpipe shop, we inspect the damage on the inside

termined to be out of the limits it is removed from the aircraft and brought to us for intensive repair using specifically tailored radar materials and chemicals. These materials not only restore the inside of the aircraft exhaust, but can also be incorporated to high heat areas resulting from the jet engine. All composite and metal repairs are in an effort to maintain the B-2 Spirit mechanical and heat absorption requirements.

What does your volunteer work with the 442d Fighter Wing entail?

Volunteering for the 442d Fighter Wing entails training future Airmen on the next step of their Air Force career, which is Basic Training. We teach them memory work, drill and ceremony, and how to deal with the stressors they will deal with at basic training.

What makes you want to mentor trainees?

Being able to have a hand in shaping the future Airmen of the Air Force and seeing their success is the reason that I keep going back to volunteer at the 442d Fighter Wing.

Can you please describe the story of how you responded to the rollover accident near Columbia, Missouri?

I was coming back from Columbia, Missouri, when an Army M1083 driving in the westbound lane flipped and went through the center median, and came into the eastbound lane. After coming upon the accident I pulled over and assisted a couple other gentlemen in getting the door open and pulling the injured Soldier out and performing aid to the Soldier. After we got the Soldier stable. I directed traffic to help keep the highway from backing up until the highway patrol was able to get ahold

What impact did this have on you?

It was a sight that opened my eyes and made me react to the situation without hesitation.

Whiteman AFB Defenders sup

"Eventually we'll all be the retired, or separated as veterans," said Air Force Col. Christopher Callis, commander of the 509th Mission Support Group at Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri. "We've grown accustomed to having teammates always there to help us while on active duty, why shouldn't this extend to postactive duty as well?"

When Callis met Todd Conner, a local veteran, through his church, they began to bond over their similar backgrounds. Callis has a background as a security forces Airman and Conner had served as a member of the security police during the Vietnam War.

"I knew from the bases where he was stationed he had to have been part of Air Force Security Police's Operation SAFESIDE, which he confirmed he was," said Callis.

Operation SAFESIDE was the Air Force's and Security Police's response to counter the increasingly effective North Vietnamese and Viet Cong attacks against U.S. air bases, Callis said.

"Mr. Conner and his wife Kathy invited me to visit their farm they'd purchased when he retired from the Air Force at Whiteman AFB," said Callis. "On my first visit, I asked if there was anything I could help them with"

The Conners said they could use some help clearing a shed that had collapsed due to bad weather.

"My first thought was what a great experience it would be for myself and some Defender volunteers to help a veteran that shared a common background," he said.

Callis and more than 15 other volunteers from the 509th Security Forces Squadron, as well as some their family members, came together on a cold, rainy Saturday to help their fellow defender.

During an interview afterward, he elaborated further, emphasizing the importance of volunteerism and remembering their military heritage.

"In Security Forces, we hear stories about Opera-

tion SAFESIDE, but it's not all that common to meet someone who was part of one of these highly-trained, combat experienced squadrons," said Callis. "I think it is tremendously helpful for Security Forces Airmen to meet security police, Security Forces veterans to hear how challenging their experiences were, and to see that they made it through.

He said he believes it helps to build the confidence of SFS Airmen.



Secretary General touts NATO's benefits at joint session of Congress

U.S. Department of Defense

WASHINGTON — The North Atlantic Treaty Organization not only is the longest-lived alliance in history, but also is the most successful, NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg told a joint session of the U.S. Congress here today.

Stoltenberg, whose term as NATO's civilian leader was extended through 2022, marked 70 years of the defensive alliance. The Washington Treaty, which established the alliance, was signed April 4, 1949.

The secretary general's most repeated message in his address was "It's good to have friends." He was interrupted many times by applause from the members of Congress, members of the Cabinet and members of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He received many standing ovations during his speech.

Stoltenberg detailed the history of the alliance and the changes it has made to stay strong and relevant for 70 years. The alliance was formed in response to the millions of deaths in two world wars and the increasing danger the Soviet Union posed in 1949.

The 12 nations that formed NATO did so "with a clear purpose: to preserve peace and to safeguard freedom, with an ironclad commitment by all members of the alliance to protect each other," he said. "They made a solemn promise: One for all, and all for one."

Unprecedented Period of Peace

And it has worked. In 70 years, through the waxing and waning of Soviet might, peace has been preserved and freedom maintained, Stoltenberg said. "The Cold War ended without a shot being fired in Europe, and we have experienced an unprecedented period of peace," the secretary general added.

And this is in the best interests of all allies, on both sides of the Atlantic, he said.

"Ever since the founding of our alliance in 1949, every Congress, every American president, your men and women in uniform, and the people of the United States of America, have been staunch supporters of NATO," Stoltenberg said. "America has been the backbone of our alliance. It has been fundamental to European security and for our freedom. We would not have the peaceful and prosperous Europe we see today without the sacrifice and commitment of the United States. For your enduring support, I thank you all today.'

NATO has been good for Europe, but it has also been good for the United States. "The strength of a nation is not only measured by the size of its economy or the number of its soldiers, but also by the number of its

The United States is the preferred ally in the world, Stoltenberg said, adding that no other nation could have put together the defeat-ISIS coalition. It all started in 1949 with NATO, he said.

"Through NATO, the United States has more friends and allies than any other power," Stoltenberg said. "This has made the United States stronger, safer, and more secure.'

Stoltenberg turned to Vice President Mike Pence and House Speaker Nancy Pekosi — who were seated behind him as he faced the House chamber to deliver his address — and said, "Madam Speaker, Mr. Vice President, it's good to have friends."

But NATO is not a monolithic organization like the former Warsaw Pact that slavishly agreed with anything proposed by the apparatchik in Moscow, Stoltenberg

"We are an alliance of many different nations, with

different geography, history and political parties," he said. "This is democracy. Open discussion and different views are not a sign of weakness. It is a sign of strength."

There are disagreements among the NATO allies, he acknowledged. "The strength of NATO is that despite our differences, we have always been able to unite around our core task: to defend each other, protect each other, and to keep our people safe," he said. "We have overcome our disagreements in the past, and we must overcome our differences now, because we will need our alliance even more in the future."

Great Power Competition

Russia and China are great power competitors.

The struggle against terrorism is a generational fight, he said. "We have only just seen the beginning of the threats in cyber space," the secretary general added.

The alliance is being more assertive with Russia, Stoltenberg said, responded to Russia provocations with the largest reinforcement of collective defense in

"For the first time, we have combat-ready troops deployed in the east of our alliance," he said. "We have increased the readiness of our forces, tripled the size of the NATO Response Force, modernized our command structure, bolstered our cyber defenses, and we have stepped up support for our close partners, Georgia and Ukraine, sovereign nations with the sovereign right to choose their own path."





Will you be riding a sport bike?

Sport bike: Requires higher level of classes. ARC, BRC2U or approved sport bike course.

All other street bikes:

Any approved course.

Level 3: Sustainment Training

All riders: Any approved course.

Every 5 years!
