Air Force extends high year of tenure for E-4s through E-6s

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) – The Air Force is extending the high year of tenure (HYT) for senior Airmen through technical sergeants beginning Feb. 1, 2019.

The memo, signed Oct. 18, 2018, extends the high year of tenure from eight to 10 years for senior Airmen, from 15 to 20 years for staff sergeants and from 20 to 22 years for technical sergeants.

Airmen in these ranks who reach their HYT prior to Feb. 1, 2019, or those who are currently approved for separation or retirement under the previous HYT limits, may submit a request to extend their HYT beginning Oct. 24 to the updated limit if government funds have not been expended on their separation or retirement, such as moving expenses.

"This is just one of the ways we are working to manage the talent we currently have," said Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force Kaleth O. Wright. "Adjusting the high year of tenure policy will allow us to keep Airmen we've trained and developed over the course of their careers, and allow them to continue to serve their nation to the best of their ability and pay it forward, by training the next generation of Airmen who are right behind them."


The Air Force will use the flexibility to retain talented mid-tier Airmen to provide training, leadership and mentoring to the growing number of accessions who are joining the force.

"As we grow the force, we need to retain technically skilled experts across our ranks," said Lt. Gen. Brian Kelly, Air Force deputy chief of staff for manpower, personnel and services. "By extending high year of tenure, we're able to leverage our talented, seasoned professionals to train, develop, and lead new Airmen to accomplish current and future mission requirements."

The Air Force will consider using career job reservations and noncommissioned officer retraining programs as needed to ensure that its growth is deliberately targeted to meet the needs of the National Defense Strategy.

"These force-shaping tools are critical to ensuring the investment we've made in enhancing our Airmen's technical skills are leveraged and allocated across the force de-

TERMS

HYT extension does not change an Airman's expiration term of service, therefore Airmen wishing to extend their enlistment will need to contact their local MPF to request an extension or reenlistment.

POLICY

The HYT for SrA through TSgt with a current HYT of Feb. 1, 2019, or later will change to the new HYT limits. Airmen may submit requests to extend HYT beginning Oct. 24.

ADDITIONAL TERMS

Those who are currently approved for separation or retirement under the previous HYT limits may submit a request to extend their HYT to the updated limits through their respective commanders, if no government funds have been expended on their separation or retirement transition.

liberately," said Kelly.

Senior Airmen through technical sergeants with an HYT of Feb 1, 2019, and later, will automatically have their HYT adjusted by AFPC in accordance with this policy. Those hitting HYT prior to Feb. 1 can request an extension via the virtual

manpower and personnel flight.

"Service in the Air Force is an honor, not a right or an entitlement," Wright said. "Supervisors and commanders will continue to ensure that proper conduct and mission performance are the primary factors in determining continued service."

CCAF no longer required for promotion

LITTLE ROCK AIR FORCE BASE, Ark. (AFNS) — Due to an update to the enlisted personnel handbook, an associate's degree from the Community College of the Air Force is no longer required for promotions, however, master sergeants still have to keep education in mind for their enlisted performance reports.

While the CCAF itself is no longer required, an associate's degree or higher is mandatory for promotion to senior mas-



ter sergeant, according to the revised Air Force Handbook 36-2618, The Enlisted Force Structure.

For master sergeant EPRs, the CCAF block will now be marked "yes" if an Air-

man has been conferred for an associate's or higher degree from a regionally or nationally accredited institution prior to the static closeout date. Revisions will be made to AFI 36-2406 Officer and Enlisted Evaluation System, and AF Form 911.

The change in degree requirements may help enlistees coming into the service with credits or completed degrees from the civilian world receive proper education recognition. It may also help those who want to pursue degree programs outside the Air Force during their time in the service



The B-2 Spirit is an American heavy penetration strategic bomber designed to break through dense anti-aircraft defenses without being detected.

But, before the B-2 Spirit is ready to take stealthy flight, it must pass the discerning eyes and careful hands of the Whiteman Air Force Base maintenance team

Skilled Airmen of the 509th Maintenance Group (MXG) and their Missouri National Guard counterparts assigned to the 131st Maintenance Squadron collaborate to perform the specialized type of maintenance that keeps the Stealth Bomber under the radar: low observable, or LO, maintenance.

"The materials we work with are relatively delicate, so any changes in the atmosphere can damage the adhesives we use," said Staff Sgt. Alexander Ramirez, an LO technician assigned to the 509th MXG. "The aircraft comes back with at least a few maintenance needs after each flight."

LO technicians evaluate, install, remove and repair the low-observable coatings.

"We have to work hand-in-hand with a lot of other shops on the flight line," said Ramirez. "If they have to get into certain panels or remove any fasteners to complete different types of maintenance, we need to remove the LO materials. Once they've finished, we go through and reapply everything."

Low-observable maintenance can take anywhere from 30 minutes to half a day to complete, said Ramirez.

Careful inspection

After maintenance is complete, members of the signature diagnostics section come through to inspect the aircraft.

"It is our job to basically monitor the B-2's signature health," said Staff Sgt. James B. Finn, a signature diagnostics (SD) technician assigned to the 509th MXG.

Finn and other members of the SD team perform regular inspections after each round of maintenance is complete. The SD team processes the results of their inspections and reports their findings to LO.

"After the LO techs are done, we go through," said Finn. "It's important to have multiple sets of eyes to ensure nothing is missed."

There is a multi-tier inspection system. For example, first, there is a visual inspection with flashlights. Next, specialized tools are used to conduct point inspections of the energy coming from the B-2. Further, more in-depth inspections are conducted on a less-frequent, as-needed basis.


"It can be repetitive," said Finn. "But when I take a step back and look at the defects we've found, I'm reminded of why what we do matters."

Finn said part of the maintenance team's newcomer orientation process is to demonstrate to new Airmen how defects react to radar.


"Understanding how each defect could potentially impact the safety of our pilots is key to what we do," he said. "When the pilots go out to train or fly a real-world mission, the quality of our work matters. If we haven't done our best to ensure maintenance was performed up to standard, they cannot pull accurate information readings."

Senior Airman Austin K. Choate, an LO journeyman who has been assigned to the 509th MXG for more than two years, performs a wide variety of maintenance on the Stealth Bomber.

"I take a lot of pride in what I do," said Choate. "I know that if I put it on the jet, my name is attached to it. I will get it right."

509th Medical Group hosts open house for network providers

509th Bomb Wing Public Affairs The 509th Medical Group (MDG) recently hosted an open house event, inviting Tricare network providers to Whiteman

Air Force Base, Missouri.

Providers from all around the local area, including Warrensburg, Knob Noster and Sedalia, Missouri, came to the installation to learn the mission, see how their services support it, and even get up close to a B-2 Stealth Bomber.

"The main purpose of the open house was to give our local network providers a first-hand view of the Whiteman mission and how they contribute," said 2nd Lt. Sarah Trachte, Tricare operations and patient administration flight commander from the 509th MDG. "In addition, it allows our on-base providers the chance to meet with faceto-face with providers in the network and build long lasting partnerships."

"The 509th MDG provides trusted medical support, com-

munity health and wellness and develops and sustains missionready medics to support Combatant and Joint Force Commanders," said Col. Chrystal Henderson, the 509th Medical Group commander. "The group also provides health services for more than 12,000 beneficiaries."

Much like the maintenance that goes into supporting the B-2 Spirit, it is equally important to maintain the human weapon system by keeping Whiteman Airmen healthy and in top-notch shape, said Henderson. However, since the clinic is an outpatient clinic, and not a fully functioning hospital, it often has to refer patients to offbase providers for their health care needs.

"The 509th MDG relies on our network providers to provide additional services not offered within our clinic," said Trachte. "These providers ensure that our active duty members and their dependents have all their health care needs met."
