No fuel, no fight

Airmen assigned to the petroleum, oil and lubricants fuels flight of the 509th Logistics Readiness Squadron at Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri, are an important asset to executing strategic deterrence, global strike and combat support... anytime, anywhere.

These Airmen work to ensure aircraft are fueled whenever the mission calls for them to be ready to go.

"Our mission is vital because without clean fuel, we can't support the aircraft or the equipment needed around the base and thus, the mission can't be completed," said U.S. Air Force Senior Airman Joshua Thompson, a distribution operator assigned to the 509th Logistics Readiness Squadron.

Throughout their careers, these Airmen learn that attention to detail is an essential skill for the job. POL fuels flight Airmen need to be vigilant every day in order to avoid potential accidents that could occur with fuel

"It's important that we get everything right and that everything's within its limit to ensure there are no incidents," said Airman 1st Class Hali Conner, a laboratory technician assigned to the 509th LRS. "We

pull samples and test the fuel around base for water, additives and sediment like rocks, dirt or other particles. We also have the ability to lock out any piece of equipment if the fuel doesn't pass."

Sampling and testing the fuel around Whiteman is critical because this ensures the fuel is safe to use in an aircraft or any fuel-based system.

"Not doing our job correctly could potentially lead to an aircraft engine failure," said Thompson. "To prevent accidents, we need to be focused on what we are doing 24/7."

Although the job can be stressful at times, the LRS Airmen enjoy what they do and take pride in completing the mission.

"I like this job because there's always something new to learn," said Conner. "I've been in the lab for almost a year and before that I was a distribution operator. I think it's great that we have the opportunity to move around in this career field because it's good to know the different sections and their roles to accomplish the mission."

The fuels flight works all day, every day to ensure the fuel is passing inspection and moving correctly. With the help of the laboratory technicians, distribution operators and all other members of the fuels flight ensure the mission at Whiteman is being accomplished.

"Everyone has a purpose on base to support the mission, ours at the fuels shop is - no fuel, no flight," said Thompson.

EOD Airman wins NCO of the Year

Courage, selflessness, bravery, professionalism, vigilance ... The list goes on and on when speaking about traits that an individual should embody when dealing with explosives and other hazards on the battlefield.

One Whiteman Airman possesses them all.

Recently named Whiteman Air Force Base's 2017 NCO of the Year, U.S. Air Force Tech. Sgt. Michael Vallejo, a 509th Civil Engineer Squadron explosive ordnance disposal team leader, distinguished himself at home station and while deployed.

While deployed to Southwest Asia in support of Operation Inherent Resolve, Vallejo led five emergency responses and eliminated 20 unexploded ordnance items, ensuring the safety of 4,000 coalition forces, 49 aircraft and two airfields.

Vallejo was able to coordinate a 120-hour U.S. Army Air Assault course, which resulted in two EOD Airmen earning their Air Assault wings while downrange. This marked the first time in history that Airmen have graduated from the course while on a contingency operation deployment.

He continued to make a name for himself by coordinating large scale training events which he developed to focus EOD operators on real-time threats being faced down range. For one major event, he compiled intelligence on enemy tactics, techniques and procedures to coordinate with eight units from throughout the Central Command area of responsibility for a week-long field training exercise. Vallejo led 43 joint EOD technicians through 81 scenarios he developed.

While there, Vallejo then forward-deployed to Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan to support the forensics lab where he processed evidence acquired from multiple battlefields in the region leading to 16 enemy bomb makers being identified.

As a team leader, EOD technicians receive training on collecting evidence from post-blast scenes or during a normal IED response, yet Vallejo didn't really know much about the work going on behind the scenes. His time in Afghanistan allowed him to get better idea of what happens with the evidence that is collected.

"My time at the lab opened my eyes on the science involved in processing DNA, latent print, weapons, and electronic evidence. There's a lot of work those folks put in to try to get bad guys building IEDs to kill our brothers and sisters out of circulation," said Vallejo. "Honestly, while my first combat deployment had its exciting moments, I feel that my time at the forensics lab was the most fulfilling of my career."

That fulfillment Vallejo felt was further validated during Whiteman's 2017 Annual Awards Banquet when he was announced as NCO of the Year at the wing level. Vallejo was also presented a personalized flight suit by the 509th Bomb Wing commander, Brig. Gen. John Nichols, and the 509th BW command chief, Chief Master Sgt. James Lyda. Much to his surprise, he was awarded with an incentive flight in a B-2 Spirit.

"I had an incentive flight a long time ago, but to receive one on a B-2 bomber is something I did not expect," said Vallejo. "I don't think any previous incentive flights could top getting a ride on the stealth bomber."

Very few enlisted Airmen have the privilege of getting to fly in the B-2, a privilege that one can earn through hard work and superior performance.

"Tech. Sgt. Vallejo is a savagely aggressive leader with strategic vision that consistently exercises extreme ownership over all faucets necessary to project airpower in today's challenging world," said Senior Master Sgt. Alejandro Rodriguez, the 509th


Civil Engineer Squadron EOD flight chief. "He honed his abilities and skills to not only survive, but thrive in any hostile environment. He is an Airman warrior and it is my honor to serve alongside him."

Vallejo's attributes his success to the support system surrounding him.

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The Whiteman Air Force Base Tax Center is scheduled to open Thursday, 1 Feb 2018 for free advice, assistance, preparation and electronic filing of federal and state income tax returns through the Internal Revenue Service's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. Active duty military members, retirees, military dependents, and Department of Defense civilians may receive assistance.

TO RECEIVE TAX PREPARATION/E-FILING ASSISTANCE, YOU MUST BRING:

- Photo IDs Proof of identification (taxpayer/spouse)
 Social security cards (or ITIN card, if applicable) (taxpayer/spouse/dependents)
 Birth dates (taxpayer/spouse/dependents)
 Prior year tax return (they no longer have copies of prior returns for previous clients)
 Wage/income statements (i.e. W-2s, W-2G, 1099-B, 1099-R, 1099-G, 1099-Misc.)

- Interest and dividend statements (1099-INT, 1099-DIV)
 Affordable Care Act healthcare documents (IRS Form 1095-A, 1095-B or 1095-C)
- 1095-B or 1095-C)
 Dependent care information (daycare provider name, address, tax ID # and amount paid)
- Education credit information (1098-T and receipts or out-of-pocket expenses)
- Proof of bank routing and account number (for direct debits of direct withdrawals)
- Any other forms applicable to your return (i.e. "1098-E Student Loan Interest Paid", 5498 IRA contributions, 1098 Mortgage Interest Paid, real estate taxes)

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Whiteman wins best Strategic Bomber award

The 509th and 131st Bomb Wings were announced as the best Strategic Bomber units and winners of the 2017 Omaha Trophy award, Feb. 26, 2018, by U.S. Air Force Gen. John Hyten, commander of U.S. Strategic Command.

The Omaha Trophy, which dates back to the United States Air Force's Strategic Air Command, is presented in five official categories: Global operations, Intercontinental Ballistic Missile, Strategic Aircraft Operations, and Submarine Ballistic Missile.

The 2017 Omaha recipient organizations are:

• Global Operations Trophy: 460th Space Wing, Buckley, Colorado.

• ICBM:

341st Missile Wing Trophy: Malmstrom Air Force Base, Montana.

- Strategic Aircraft Trophy: Strategic Communications Wing One, Tinker Air Force Base, Oklahoma.
- Ballistic Missile Submarine Trophy: USS Alabama (SSBN 731), Naval Submarine Base, Bangor, Washington.
- Strategic Bomber Trophy: 131st and 509th Bomb Wings, Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri.

"This year's Omaha Trophy winners demonstrated the highest levels of excellence in support of our global warfighting command," said U.S. Air Force Gen. John Hyten, USSTRATCOM commander. "These recipients best represent the soldiers, sailors, airmen, Marines, and civilians across USSTRATCOM who are critical to our nation's most important mission: deterring attack and delivering decisive capabilities from, in, and through all domains wherever and whenever needed."

Previously only one trophy was awarded to the command's best wing, but has since evolved to five separate awards that represent USSTRATCOM's mission areas, their role in global operations and USSTRATCOM's continued emphasis on strategic deterrence. Selections are based on formal evaluations, meritorious achievement, safety and other factors such as community involvement and humanitarian actions.

"Our Airmen work incredibly hard to deter our enemies, assure our allies and keep our bombers flying; we are a world-class installation supported by the very best our country has to offer," said Brig. Gen. John Nichols, 509th BW commander. "This is a very big deal. The Omaha Trophy recognizes our vital contributions to both national and global security through strategic deterrence, global strike and combat support."

The Missouri Air National Guard's 131st Bomb Wing and U.S. Air Force 509th Bomb Wing at Whiteman Air Force Base were recently announced as co-winners of the 2017 Omaha Trophy in the Strategic Bomber Catagory.
