A-10 Thunderbolt II Joins Air Campaign against Taliban

KANDAHAR, Afghanistan— The United States Forces - Afghanistan and Afghan National Defense and Security Force's air campaign against the Taliban was bolstered with the arrival of a squadron of A-10 Thunderbolt II ground attack aircraft, assigned to Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri, Jan. 19, 2018.

Commonly known as the Warthog, the A-10's return to Afghanistan supports the increased need for close air support and precision strike capacity for a variety of efforts, including the strategic air campaign targeting Taliban revenue sources and counter-terrorism operations that continue to take place. These operations will also be supported by the placement of additional aircraft at Kandahar Airfield, including MQ-9 Reapers that provide armed overwatch and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance of the battlefield, and HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopters, to conduct personnel recovery and search and rescue.

The arrival of these aircraft follows a recent decision by U.S. Air Forces Central Command to realign aircraft, airmen, and assets already in the U.S. Central Command AOR to Kandahar Airfield, Afghanistan, to support increased airpower requirements of ANDSF and USFOR-A to implement South Asia Policy under Operation Freedom's Sentinel. Along with a detachment of KC-135 Stratotankers that have operated from Kandahar since September, the A-10s, MQ-9s and HH-60G will complement F-16s, C-130J, EC-130H and other aircraft supporting these operations from Bagram Airfield.

These increased assets will assist with the ongoing ANDSF strategic air campaign that targets Taliban revenue sources of which are aimed at aggressively taking the fight to the Taliban.

"The Taliban still has not felt the full brunt of American and Afghan air power," said U.S. Air Force Major General James Hecker, commander of 9th Air and Space Expeditionary Task Force-Afghanistan and NATO Air Command-Afghanistan. "With the arrival of new air assets and the growing capabilities of Afghan pilots, the Taliban will have a constant eye towards the sky as an integrated unified fight is aimed

directly to them."

In a matter of days A-10s will conduct their first strike against the Taliban, continuing the air campaign destroying narcotics production facility. Since November, 30 strikes conducted against Taliban narcotics production facilities resulted more than \$20 million in total impact on Taliban revenue.

Under the authorities granted in the South Asia Policy, precision strikes with A-10s will hit the Taliban where they are most vulnerable: their revenue streams and profits from developing and selling illegal narcotics.

Now the Taliban will face a more aggressive adversary in this air campaign as U.S. Air Force F-22s, F-16s, B-52s, A-10s and MQ-9s, along with support from Navy F-18s, will join in counter-finance operations.

"The A-10 provides planners even more options given its ability to deliver a wide variety of precision munitions and devastating firepower from its 30mm cannon," said U.S. Air Force Brigadier General Lance Bunch, chief, Future Operations, CJ35. "In the coming weeks, the A-10's operations will be integrated into our combined U.S. and Afghan air campaign to deliver destructive precision firepower that sends a strong impactful message to the Taliban."

The Afghan Air Force additionally will more than double their fleet of aircraft over the next seven years. Plans include the in-

roduction of AC-208 attack aircraft and UH-60 Black Hawk assault helicopters, as well as additional A-29 attack aircraft and MD-530 attack helicopters.

Two years ago, AAF pilots made their first flights in A-29 aircraft and MD-530 attack helicopters. Today, Afghan pilots fly transport, attack aircraft, and helicopters from three wings across Afghanistan.

In the past year, the AAF effectively incorporated A-29 ground attack aircraft, C-208 and C-130 mobility aircraft, MD-530, and Mi-17 helicopters into daily operations, aided by Afghan Tactical Air Coordinators positioned in Afghan National Defense and Security Forces to successfully integrate operations that enable battlefield successes.

"The growing Afghan Air Force is vital to the success of ANDSF on the battlefield," said Major General Mohammad Shoaib, commander, AAF. "Dedicated pilots and crews provide resupply, close air attack, casualty evacuation, and air assault capabilities to their brothers on the ground. The success of the Air Force is key to tipping the battlefield in favor of ANDSF. The Afghan Air Force is successfully fighting and growing at the same time increasing attack capabilities while delivering daily blows to the Taliban."

Together with United States airpower the AAF will continue to develop critical warfighting capabilities needed to help them in their task of defeating the Taliban and setting conditions for reconciliation.



The Whiteman Air Force Base Tax Center is scheduled to open Thursday, 1 Feb 2018 for free advice, assistance, preparation and electronic filing of federal and state income tax returns through the Internal Revenue Service's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. Active duty military members, retirees, military dependents, and Department of Defense civilians may receive assistance.

TO RECEIVE TAX PREPARATION/E-FILING ASSISTANCE, YOU MUST BRING:

- Photo IDs – Proof of identification (taxpayer/spouse)
- Social security cards (or ITIN card, if applicable) (taxpayer/spouse/dependents)
- Birth dates (taxpayer/spouse/dependents)
- Prior year tax return (they no longer have copies of prior returns for previous clients)
- Wage/income statements (i.e. W-2s, W-2G, 1099-B, 1099-R, 1099-G, 1099-Misc.)
- Interest and dividend statements (1099-INT, 1099-DIV)
- Affordable Care Act healthcare documents (IRS Form 1095-A, 1095-B or 1095-C)
- Dependent care information (daycare provider name, address, tax ID # and amount paid)
- Education credit information (1098-T and receipts or out-of-pocket expenses)
- Proof of bank routing and account number (for direct debits or direct withdrawals)
- Any other forms applicable to your return (i.e. "1098-E Student Loan Interest Paid", 5498 IRA contributions, 1098 Mortgage Interest Paid, real estate taxes)

Nutrition care easily accessible via telehealth appointments

FALLS CHURCH, Va. -- The U.S. Air Force Medical Service is working to increase access to high level nutrition care using tele-medical nutrition therapy.

With tele-medical nutrition therapy, or tele-MNT, patients get a referral from their primary care provider to meet with a dietitian via video teleconferencing anywhere in the world. The dietitian can guide them through a wide variety of issues, such as weight, celiac disease, allergies, hyperlipidemia, and hypertension. Tele-MNT provides a level of care not available in-person at many Air Force facilities that can help patients navigate complex nutrition needs and improve patient outcomes.

"Nutrition care is effective in disease mitigation and prevention," said Maj. Minette Herrick, chief of Health Promotion with the Air Force Medical Operations Agency. Tele-MNT makes it easier for patients to get assessments, diagnoses, interventions, monitoring, and evaluation for various conditions across the age spectrum."

Providing the tele-MNT services is not only helpful in disease management, but is also essential to Airmen readiness. AFMS Dietitians focus on keeping Airmen healthy and ready.

"There is a definite correlation between nutrition and readiness," said Herrick. "Weight and diet affects your ability to pass your physical fitness test. It also affects the ability to maintain ready forces and perform downrange."

The tele-MNT program started in November 2017, and has already received 30 referrals and made a positive impact on patient satisfaction.

"The program is starting to pick up as more patient sites open and people become interested in nutritional care," said Herrick. "We are hearing positive things already. Patients really love the convenience of the video teleconference and think it works well."

With positive feedback from patients, tele-MNT is aiming to add locations and bring on more dietitians.

"We want to expand the number of sites where patients can access tele-MNT to bring more nutrition resources to patients," explained Herrick. "Eventually we want to make it easier to provide nutrition care to where patients live, work, and play."

UCM Launches New Veterans Upward Bound Program

The University of Central Missouri recently received a new grant that creates opportunities designed to help veterans succeed in college. Veterans Upward Bound (VUB) is a free U.S. Department of Education program designed to help veterans refresh their academic skills and give them the confidence they need to successfully obtain a college degree.

Veterans Upward Bound can assist a veteran by offering:

- Basic skills development to help veterans successfully complete a high school equivalency program (if needed) and gain admission to college education programs.
- Short-term remedial or refresher classes for high school graduates that have put off pursuing a college education. Areas of interest: Math, science, reading, literature, composition, and computer basics.
- Assistance with applications to college or university of choice, financial aid, and scholarships.
- Personalized counseling for degree and career selection.
- Connecting veterans with outside available resources.
- Providing each veteran with an individualized academic plan that is developed based on personal needs and desires.

Eligibility Criteria:

- Be a U.S. Military veteran with more than 180 days of active duty service, and discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. *Veterans with fewer than 180



days of active duty service may apply.

- Meet low-income criteria, according to guidelines published annually by the U.S. Department of Education, and/or a first-generation potential college graduate.
- Demonstrate academic need for Veterans Upward Bound.


