# 'Whiteman will shine'

Maj. Gen. James C. Dawkins, Jr., Eighth Air Force and Joint-Global Strike Operations Center commander, visited Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri, Oct. 22-23, 2018.

Dawkins, a command pilot with more than 3,000 flying hours, has been stationed across the country and internationally. He has filled a variety of command and strategic roles, including 13th Bomb Squadron director of operations, 509th Operations Group commander and 509th Bomb Wing vice commander.

"I never thought I would come back as the Eighth Air Force commander, that's for sure," said Dawkins, laughing warmly, during an interview at Missions End. "To come back and have the bomber units on my team is incredible. It's both an honor and privilege to command 'The Mighty Eighth'. I couldn't be happier."

Dawkins and his wife, Daina, visited the base with Chief Master Sgt. Shelley R. Cohen, the Eighth Air Force IMA command chief.

"I wanted to see how the Airmen were preparing for the high-end fight," said Dawkins, during an interview. "I wanted to see what advances have been made, what updates to policies and procedures have been put in place since I was stationed here seven years ago."

During the visit, the general received mission briefings and toured a B-2 Stealth Bomber and its training simulator. He also spent time with each group on base to learn about how they contribute to the overall mission.

Dawkins spent a couple of hours with members of the 509th Security Forces Squadron. He toured the shooting ranges on base, firing both a shotgun and a grenade launcher.

He also learned about and practiced room-clearing procedures, dressing in protective gear with Brig. Gen. John J. Nichols, the 509th BW commander, by his side.

Members of the SFS then performed a live demonstration with the base's counterdrone technology.

"It has been great to come back and see what progress has been made on this base, preparing for any adversary we might face," Dawkins said.

He highlighted the wing's accomplishments to include approximately 6,500 flying hours, reduced planning time for successful

missions, new modifications to the B-2 and overall completion of backlogged required maintenance.

"It speaks volumes of the base's ability to come together," he said.

Hundreds of Airmen from Whiteman deployed to Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawaii, in support of U.S. Strategic Command. The total-force integration deployment challenged active-duty and Guard units to collaborate in air operations tactics and hot-pit refueling of the B-2, during which the aircraft is refueled while engines are still running. "What's great about that initiative was the opportunity to get into that expeditionary mindset," said Dawkins. "It allowed for us to learn how to operate in a new location while keeping the enemy on its toes."

Dawkins led an all-call assembly with members of the base to recognize them for their contributions and to discuss the future of their mission.

"I think they'll rise to any challenge that presents itself," he said. "Whether it is highintensity or prolonged conflict, or an unexpected maintenance issue, Whiteman will shine."






Free Wi-Fi, children's story times and craft events, and over 28,00t0 DVDs, board games, books, and more are available at the Whiteman Air Force Base library.

There to connect people to these resources, the library staff works to inform, empower and enrich the lives of the Whiteman AFB community.

Dennis Wilson, the Whiteman AFB Library director, said the rewards of visiting the base library are immeasurable, highlighting new additions at the library including the Chief of Staff of the Air Force reading list, 50 new board games and countless new-release books.

The Chief of Staff 2018 Professional Reading List includes six categories such as Leadership and Decision Making, Heritage, and Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force picks.

Wilson said the library acquired the new board games as part of an Office of the Secretary of Defense initiative bringing board games to libraries across the Department of Defense. The library also acquired several of the board games with local funds to enhance their collection.

"I think the sense of a physical board game and the connectedness of family or friends playing games is beneficial not only to individuals, but the family unit," Wilson said.

In addition to the CSAF reading list, the library offers a variety of other resources for education and entertainment.

Test prep is offered for the SAT, ACT, the Air Force Officer Qualification Test and the College Level Examination Program, among others. Prep materials include study guides and full-length practice tests.

Other educational resources include professional military reading, CAC-enabled computers and a nonfiction section.

"Our mission is a tri-fold mission," Wilson said. "One is support of the Air Force mission, in which we try to acquire mission essential resources, be it journals or publications, for individual offices. Second, education. It could be professional military education or voluntary, so we have a wide array of nonfiction as well as thousands of full-text journals, as well as lots of homework help, grade school through high school. Third, is quality of life for our Airmen and their families."

On the first and third Wednesday of the month from September through May story time is at 11:30 a.m., and during the summer months the library offers a summer reading program.

The library has regular hours six days a week, though individuals who have signed up have access to the library's online resources, which are available 24/7.

"Take Advantage of this tremendous resource," Wilson said, "not only for your professional development, but also just your personal recreation, your resiliency."

# Wright-Patterson AFB mother, physician tells story of heartbreaking loss

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Ohio (AFNS) — Dr. Laura Sidari is speaking out because her family suffered a horrendous loss last Christmas Day.

The Air Force psychiatrist at the Wright-Patterson Medical Center on Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, and her husband, Dr. Anthony Sidari, a rheumatologist, lost their 4-year-old son, Leon, to complications of influenza. He passed away at a medical facility elsewhere from bacterial pneumonia following the flu, two days following onset of symptoms on Dec. 23.

Although the Sidari family had vaccinated for the flu in prior seasons, Leon died prior to receiving his flu shot that season, Sidari said. He had been scheduled to be vaccinated Jan.

"Last year, if I had seen a story like my own, I would have prioritized the flu shot differently," she said. "As a physician, even I was unaware of the significant risk that the flu posed to my healthy child. Through reaching out to others, including other physician parents, I have discovered that I am not alone in that misconception.'

"Leon's story places a name and a face – a beautiful and loved and special human being - behind the numbers that are often buried in databases and scattered across headlines," Sidari said. "As difficult as it is for me as a mother, I share Leon's story so that someday other families may not have to. As I have devastatingly learned through Leon, flu-related complications are often aggressive and difficult to treat.

Healthy children may be more at risk for suffering a flu-related death. Research of flu-related deaths provides evidence for the flu shot providing a 65 percent reduction in risk for flu-related mortality in healthy children, and a 41 percent reduction in mortality

#### TRICARE open enrollment for next year begins soon From 509th Bomb

Wing staff reports TRICARE's open season for enrollment is November 12-December 10, 2018.

Open season is an annual period during which beneficiaries can enroll in a health plan for the next year. This includes switching from an individual enrollment to a family enrollment, or to enroll in a new TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select plan entirely

"This is the first time TRICARE has implemented an open season for enrollment," said 2nd Lt. Sarah E. Trachte, TRICARE operations and patient administration flight commander, assigned to the 509th Medical Support Squadron. "If members do not change plans during this timeframe, they will have to remain in

their current policy for one full calendar vear.

This restriction does not apply after certain lifetime qualifying events such as childbirth or marriage

Running concurrently with the TRI-CARE open season, the FEDVIP open season is the only time active-duty family members and retirees can enroll and obtain additional insurance, such as enhanced optometry benefits, said Trachte.

risk for children with pre-existing medical issues. Approximately 80 percent of children who pass away each season from flu-related complications did not have their flu shot that

season As of Oct. 6, there have been more than season, according to online information pub-

lished by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Many of these children died before reaching the hospital.

Sidari is quick to point out that she is speaking only from her perspective as a mother – not a pediatric specialist – who made sure her children received every vaccination recommended.

"I really wanted to understand the likelihood that we were going to lose our other children," she said. "That's how I found this information.

The mother, with the full support of her husband, now wants to dispel the common misconception that good health affords protection against the flu, and the entire Sidari family received flu shots at the Wright-Patterson Medical Center immunization clinic the first week of October.

The American Academy of Pediatrics and the CDC recommend the flu shot for everyone older than the age of 6 months with few medical exceptions.

The Sidari family faces this holiday season without their first-born, who loved Christmas. His mother remembers him as good big brother who was kind and sensitive, loved cats and gave compliments. Small things are what mattered to him.

"Nothing prepares you as a parent for coming home and having to unwrap Christmas presents for a child who never can," she said

"As parents, there are many demands on our time and energy, particularly around the holidays," Sidari said. "The flu shot can too easily and understandably slip through the cracks due to busy schedules.

"In my experience, it is worth prioritizing this time of the year. This is a necessary appointment. Bringing awareness to the flu shot will not bring Leon back. I do, however, be-180 children lost to the 2017-2018 influenza lieve in the healing power of connecting with others," she said.

Symptoms can include: runny nose, congestion, coughing, sore throat, cold sweats, high fever, headaches, muscle aches, fatigue, vomiting, and diarrhea.

Every day precautions include washing your hands with soap and warm water, coughing into your sleeve and sanitizing workspaces.

The Centers for Disease Control and prevention recommend children over the age of  $\mathbf{6}$  recieve a flu shot annually.



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# **Commander provides update** brief to Air Force leadership

TYNDALL AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (AFNS) - Chief of Staff of the Air Force Gen. David L. Goldfein and Chief Mas-

ter Sgt. of the Air Force Kaleth O. Wright visited Tyndall Air Force Base Oct. 27, for the second time since Hurricane Michael caused catastrophic damage.

Since Vice President Mike Pence announced plans to rebuild Tyndall AFB



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earlier this week, the base has been actively strategizing a way forward.

After taking time to recognize Airmen from around the base for their efforts to support the post-storm recovery, Goldfein and Wright received an update brief from Col. Brain Laidlaw, 325th Fighter Wing commander.

Laidlaw led with information on Task Force Harp, which is focused on the base's most important asset, its people.

'We are now leaning forward and squadron commanders are looking down their rosters, person by person, trying to figure out what works best for each situation," he said.

The status of Task Force Phoenix came next, which is responsible for infrastructure.

Laidlaw said their job is to save what they can and, from there, build the base that is needed.

To support that mission, 1,200 people have been brought in so far.

"Every single one of these people were sent here for a reason and they have been doing amazing work," said Laidlaw. "We are taking people in as fast as we can feed them and as fast as we can find a place for them to live and every single one of them is doing exactly what we asked them to do."

In addition, he announced the base

now has power and they are carefully and systematically turning on various circuits. The sewer is fully operational to include the waste water and treatment plant.

Of the 704 buildings, not including housing, more than 300 have been inspected and at least 37 percent are fixable

"If you would have asked me two weeks ago how many of our buildings we thought would be operational, I would not have told you 37 percent," Laidlaw said. "That is a good news story."

His said he is in awe of what his team has been accomplishing.

"This has been a proud two weeks to be in the Air Force," said Laidlaw. "As traumatic as this has been for our community, the 1,200 people we have on this base are getting the opportunity to do exactly what we have trained them to do. We have the right people, right here."

Goldfein said he was impressed with the actions taken before the storm to ensure the safety of the Airmen and families there.

"You all saved lives," he said. "In 48 hours you evacuated 11,000 people off the base and 100 miles away and not a single injury. That is a record. I don't think that has happened in the history of this kind of storm."

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# Air Force awards Cyber Command's \$54.6M cyber weapons system

U.S. Cyber Command is one step closer to building its massive cyber weapons system, Unified Platform.

The Air Force, which is facilitating the acquisition, awarded Northrop Grumman a \$54.6 million contract to develop, integrate, deploy and maintain the system, which will be responsible for fulfilling offensive and defensive cyber operations, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance.

The award represents Cyber Command's biggest program acquisition at a time when the organization has little authority, with a \$75 million cap and a small, but growing, acquisition office.

"We are really hamstrung at the moment in relying on the current [contracting] vehicles out there from others," Stephen Schanberger, command acquisition executive for Cyber Command said during a panel at the last month's Billington Cybersecurity Summit. "And in some cases we've had to adjust our scope to match up to the contract versus waiting for them to put another whole contract vehicle or task order onto a contract."

The setup also restricts Cyber Com-



mand's ability to allocate dollars for services being performed, which can cause a lag in reporting and tracking progress, he said.

As for Unified Platform, which will connect the military services' cyber platforms and capabilities, Schanberger said the command expects to completely transition the program to the Air Force, which has been facilitating the acquisition, in fiscal 2019 but would retain onethird of the governing chairs overseeing the prototype program.

Cyber Command will also have influence over the requirements and what the "first deliverables will be and how that all gets implemented," he said, noting that how things will be carried out was to be determined.



quisition Contract. Two million dollars in fiscal 2019 funds for operations and maintenance -- including research, development, test and evaluation -- have been obligated since the award on Oct. 26, according to a Pentagon contract notice. Work is expected to finish in three years.







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# Airman leaves Dominican Republic to pursue the American dream

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AFNS) – Growing up in Consuelo, a small town in the Dominican Republic, an Airman from the 571st Mobility Support Advisory Squadron was torn between staying behind to help support his seven siblings or leaving to pursue the American dream.

"I came from a modest family," said Tech. Sgt. Rafael Escoto Roa, 571st MSAS air transportation specialist air advisor. "My father made just enough money to support the family."

When Escoto was only 16, his life drastically changed when their house burned down due to an electrical fire and his dad was laid-off from his job around the same time.

"That was a rough time," he said. "After my dad lost his job, he decided to migrate to the United States in search of better job opportunities."

During his father's absence, Escoto became the only male figure in the house with seven sisters and his stepmother.

After graduating high school, his dream was to go to college to pursue an education in Computer Science, but he knew that also meant he'd have to leave his family behind.

"My mom knew how much this meant to me, so she gave me her blessing and sent me to the U.S. to pursue my dream," Escoto said.

#### Moving to the United States

He packed his bags and started his journey into an unknown territory. Escoto first moved to Miami, but quickly realized he could not afford the schools there. He then moved to New York with hopes of getting some help to pay for schools through grants or scholarships. Yet again, he could not find schools or help.

After some research, Escoto became fascinated with the Air Force mission and decided to join in 1999. Two years later, the entire country was shaken after the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks.

"At that time, I was stationed at Hurlburt Field, Florida, and I was told I couldn't deploy because I needed to be a citizen," he said. "We had a lot of missions going out and I always had to stay behind because of my immigration status."

#### Citizenship, service, education

Escoto felt it was his duty to deploy with his fellow Airmen and he desperately wanted to serve the country that had helped his family for so many years.

"I was trying to find out a way that I could became a citizen, I wanted to deploy," he said. "I found out about the expedited citizenship program, so once I met the necessary pre-requisites I submitted my citizenship application."

Escoto said he waited with anticipation for the moment he could deploy with his team. "After becoming a U.S. citizen, I felt like I was finally part of the team," he said. "I was no longer the Airman that had to be left behind. I was right there with my team, going out the door and taking care of the mission."

While serving in the military, he also completed his master's degree in Cyber Security and several Information Technology certifications.

After almost 20 years of service, Escoto said he feels humbled and lucky to be retiring in one of the greatest units in the Air Force.

"To say that the 571st MSAS has been a highlight in my career is an understatement," he said. "Being able to have an impact on the Latin community has been a dream of mine for some time."

The 571st MSAS mission is to strengthen partner nation's capabilities through providing assessments, training, advising and assisting partner nations in developing their own airpower capabilities. The unit includes Spanish speaking Airmen and is aligned with the U.S. Southern Command area of responsibility.

#### Back in the Dominican Republic

One of Escoto's most memorable trips with the MSAS was during a mobile training mission to advise the Dominican Republic Air Force.

"My job as an air advisor is to help the U.S. Air Force to continue to build and foster relationships with the Latin community," he said. "It was very rewarding to see first-hand how with each followon engagement we're helping them improve their airpower capabilities."

Senior Master Sgt. Christopher Minnifield, 571st MSAS Superintendent, spoke highly of Escoto and said he has always been a valued member of the squadron.

"As a team sergeant, Escoto led all of our air advisors during the Dominican Republic training mission," Minnifield said. "He worked hand in hand with the partner nations leadership, to include their Chiefs of Staffs, coordinating all the logistics, personnel and training courses."

Aside from working with the Dominican Republic Air Force, Escoto was able to arrange an opportunity for him and his teammates to volunteer at one of the youth baseball leagues that he used to be a part of while growing up in Consuelo.

"I always wanted to go back to my town and do something for the community," he said. "When I saw those kids, I immediately saw a mirror image of myself at that age. Back then, I'd have never guess in a million years that I'd be where I am today."

"It was important for me that they could see me wearing this uniform," Escoto added. "That day, those kids saw someone that was in the same place they are now. I wanted to show them that in life we can all be part of something bigger than ourselves."
